Light rail train raises questions about local impact

BY LAUREEN SWEENEY

News that a \$5.5-billion light-rail commuter network will not use the current Westmount train corridor was hailed by Mayor Peter Trent "at first blush" as being "excellent news."

But Trent and others told the Independent the plan raises many unanswered questions especially about its potential effect on residents who have been calling for quieter equipment for the existing commuter lines used by close to 100 trains a day.

These serve communities on the Vaudreuil-Dorion, Delson and Blainville lines, many of which, at first glance, will not be directly served by the new network.

The mass transit network was announced April 22 by the Caisse de dépôt et de placement du Québec, which will build and operate the system. The trains are to run 20 hours a day from South Shore Brossard over the new Champlain Bridge to Central Station and through the Mount Royal tunnel. Spurs will serve the airport at Dorval and the Highway 40 area of the West Island as well as the North Shore.

Public Security tracks down 'aggressively' begging teens

Public safety officers tracked down three teenage boys April 14 after they allegedly begged for money "aggressively" from a man in Westmount Public Library and were later identified as involved in an assault on another in Westmount Park.

In reporting the two incidents, Public Security officials said they were called to the library initially at 6:48 pm for young men begging for money from patrons. The suspects had left, but responding officers spoke to a victim by phone who stated he had left feeling intimidated.

One of the teens had aggressively asked him for money for food while two others acted as lookouts. A fourth person was possibly involved.

Armed with a description of the trio, officers found them in the comfort station in Westmount Park. One attempted to flee but was stopped. All were warned against begging in Westmount. They were identified as two 15-year-olds and one aged 14. One lived in Westmount, the others in Montreal. Their images were subsequently found continued on p. 16

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Greene exempted from evening-hour 'metering'

Parking inspectors to help out first-time users of new system

When the city's pay-by-plate parking system goes into effect May 2, parking inspectors will be paying special attention to "fielding questions" and helping users with the new pay stations, Public Security director Greg McBain said last week.

Preparing for the start, city council at its special mid-month meeting April 18 adopted updates to the city's parking bylaw to formalize hours of parking and maintain current rates at \$2 or \$3 an hour depending on location (see maps).

One departure from the status quo is that parking on Greene will no longer be subject to the current need to "feed the meters" on shopping nights – Thursday and Friday – between 6 pm and 9 pm.

This exemption is intended to encourage local shopping on the street consistent with hours already in place throughout the Victoria village.

Add time without losing any

One feature of the new Westmount system, also confirmed last week, is that – unlike in Montreal – users will be able to

top up payment and add on time without losing whatever already remains, McBain said. This will be possible by keying in the original transaction number.

How does a difference in rates allow cars to move from one rate zone to another under the pay-by-plate system?

The high-tech system will be able to inform parking inspectors as to how long a car has been paid for even if it moves to another zone before the initial time has expired. "If the car is paid, it's paid," McBain

explained.

Using the new pay stations

The city's two demo pay stations are expected to remain in operation after implementation of the system for anyone who still wants to practise, he said.

It was not known exactly how long the one behind city hall will remain in place. The second one, recently relocated from inside the Westmount recreation centre to the Public Security offices at 21 Stanton,

however, will be kept in use.

The first step is to key in the vehicle's licence plate. Then press the green "check" button to confirm. If incorrect, press the red button to delete and start over. This leads to the next step: allowing users to pay according to the hourly rate. Again, press the green or red button to continue and start printing the receipt.

The machines accept quarters, loonies and toonies as well as Visa and MasterCard payments.

Payment can also be made using a mobile phone and downloading the Passport app for Canada (see story April 19, p. 1).

On one of the demo machines, one person recently discovered it was necessary to press the green check button in order to start the entire process but this might have been because it was a demo machine, McBain said.

Bids opened for Prince Albert, Westmount Ave. work

Bids for the city's two main street reconstruction projects this summer were opened publicly April 20 at city hall. The total of both projects represents some \$5 million of the city's capital works budget. Final amounts won't be known until council approves bids May 2.

"At first glance, the bids seem to be within our budget allocations for these projects," said Councillor Patrick Martin, commissioner of Public Works, who attended the bid openings.

Three bids for Prince Albert ranged from \$1.44 million to \$1.87 million (taxes included), Martin said. Four for West-

mount Ave. ranged from \$2.85 million to \$3.25 million. The bids have yet to be verified to determine whether they conform to the city's specifications.

The reconstruction of Prince Albert continues and completes infrastructure work started last year between Sherbrooke and Côte St. Antoine. Bell crews are working on the street now.

This year's work on Westmount Ave. takes place between Belmont and the east side of Victoria as the second year of a three-year project including removal of streetcar tracks, infrastructure work and complete reconstruction of sidewalks and

New bike routes open

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Bismuth plays last SWAT game after organizing charity tourney for 28 years

He's been a driving force behind the SWAT Old Timers' charity hockey tournament that has raised more than \$300,000 since its start 28 years ago in aid of the Montreal Children's and St. Justine's hospitals.

And now Westmounter Claude Bismuth, the tournament's founding chair and main organizer, has decided to retire from playing on the Senior Westmount All Star Team (SWAT) and cede his spot on the team to someone on a long list of substitutes.

"I figured it was time to make way for the next generation," he told the *Independent* last week. Bismuth played his last SWAT game April 14 and was toasted by colleagues.

"He will be sadly missed by all his remaining teammates on SWAT, if not for his goal-scoring prowess, definitely for his infectious enthusiasm for the game of hockey and using sport to do something positive for the benefit of others," said city

director general Mike Deegan, former director of Sports and Recreation.

Deegan, who has known him for many years, noted that Bismuth was awarded the Ken Sinclair Trophy for Sportsmanship for 2015. This is presented for "selfless volunteer dedication to the community."

At age 67, however, Bismuth does not intend to stop playing hockey. He plans to continue playing in Westmount at least twice a week with the Executive league and the Old Timers pick-up league, both for players aged 35 and over. SWAT players are 50 and older.

Giving back

What Bismuth considers the most important part of his SWAT involvement, however, is the charity tournament in which the players "give back to the community," he said.

And "this tournament would not be where it is at, had it not been for the work ethic Claude has displayed over these years," explains continued on p. 5

Jim West, a longtime friend and team captain of SWAT.

"He has been single-handedly the number one fundraiser for the tournament, be it in terms of goods supplied for the auction, donations or his overall organizational skills – all for the benefit of the children's hospitals."

Bismuth attributed much of the success of the SWAT tourney to support from the city and the community, "which will help us continue." One of the tournament's consistent contributors has been Graham Fletcher of the Metro store, he said. "He's been a major donor to the cause throughout the years."

Bismuth is one of three founding members of the SWAT team itself who have remained active, he said. Another is Howard Hoppenheim. The other is former city councillor Nicolas Matossian, whose son and namesake lost a battle with brain cancer in 1987 just shy of his 18th birthday. While young Nicolas was a patient at the Montreal Children's hospital, he began fundraising for the hospital.

"In 1989, SWAT decided to carry on his efforts by holding an annual fundraising tournament," Bismuth recalled. "But I insisted the proceeds be divided between the two children's hospitals."

The event, always held on Westmount ice, raises its proceeds from the entry fees of eight participating Old Timers teams in various municipalities as well as a silent auction, program ads and a raffle.

Now semi-retired from a career in chartered accounting at the firm of Ernst and Young, Bismuth has lived on Upper Lansdowne since 1980.

"He'll be a tough person to replace," West said.

It is well known that putting bike lanes on residential streets is a safety hazard due to the presence of driveways every few meters. It also stigmatizes a street by suggesting there are traffic problems, causing property values to drop. Bike lanes are needed on busy commercial streets, not

Channelling cyclists into narrow lanes on residential streets creates a false sense of security and exposes them more to dangers. It is also disruptive to residents of those streets and their side streets. Accidents on the de Maisonneuve bike path prove this.

If we want to encourage active transportation and cut east-west through-traffic (despite Genivar's study concluding that Westmount has a highly active population and doesn't have traffic problems), our councillors should tell the STM to improve public transit with more frequent buses along The Boulevard, promote car-pooling and improve the pedestrian network.

No amount of paint and signs on our beautiful residential streets will convince drivers from adjacent municipalities to ditch their cars for bikes when travelling to, and especially uphill from, downtown.

A feeding frenzy ensued. Several neighbours gathered to marvel at this event, and some of us took pictures. The birds were so engrossed with their meal that we were able to stand quite close. This went on for several hours.

It turned out that these birds were not merely waxwings but the more exotic-looking bohemian waxwings. According to the Audubon Society Field Guide, these birds tend to inhabit regions of central and west North America and Eurasia. However, during the winter months, they've been known to wander eastward and northward.

The guidebook adds that to watch and hear these birds engaged in this mealtime frenzy is an experience not soon to be forgotten. That's certainly true.

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FROM THE 'SPANDEX CROWD:' NO POSTS ON GLEN

Re: the letter from Roger Jochym "Don't remove bollards at Glen – dangerous" (April 19, p. 10), over the last four years and at least 5,000 trips up and down de Courcelle/The Glen, I have on occasion experienced a vehicle intruding onto the bike lane at the south-east corner of St. Catherine and the Glen, in preparation to turn east (as taught in driver's ed.).

My tactic is to get in front of the vehicle to let the driver know that I am in the right place and they are not. Sometimes I have to tell them what's up. That situation may be irritating but it is *not* dangerous. Putting obstacles in the road that dramatically decrease the space I and every cyclist needs to maneuver around or away from an impending accident *is* dangerous.

While I've had one semi-close call with a car, I've had at least a dozen close calls with other cyclists, joggers, pedestrians and debris. Road-surface hazards are a daily occurrence so I don't even count them.

Last October, I had, so far, the unique experience of three young men coming at me on skateboards, slaloming through the posts, going south on the east side of the road, ie. the wrong side of the road, as I was pedaling up. Obviously if there were no posts, there wouldn't have been any slaloming.

More recently, April 3 at 7:45 am, there were only two people on the road between St. Catherine and St. Antoine. I was riding down the west side, (the proper side), and a jogger was running up "my" bike path! I didn't wait for him to jump onto the sidewalk, which is what he is supposed to do. I swerved left. No big deal, because there were no posts blocking my move.

I spoke to four acquaintances, members of the "spandex" crowd, about this situation and they all said they ride outside the posts, especially going downhill; however,

they move onto or nearer to the bike path when the posts are not in place.

Conclusion based on the experience of people who actually use the Glen/de Courcelle road a lot – no posts!

Furthermore, to suggest putting down a permanent concrete barrier is just plain stupid.

EXPLAINING CFIB STUDY METHODOLOGY

Last week, our [Canadian Federation of Independent Business, CFIB] January report on municipal regulations that affect small businesses in Quebec's 100 largest municipalities got some attention in this newspaper thanks to Westmount's last-place finish in our rankings ("Report ranks Westmount last of 100 cities in Quebec for regulations concerning small business," April 19, p. 9). We're glad the report got the attention because we believe that the first step to addressing the problem is knowing that there is one.

As Canada's largest association of smalland medium-sized businesses, with 109,000 members across every sector and region, and 24,000 in Quebec, CFIB is front and centre when it comes to voicing small business concerns.

Throughout our 45-year history of polling our members on various issues, two are consistently their top concerns: taxation and red tape. Having published regular reports on small business taxation at the municipal level in recent years, CFIB felt the need to also shed some light on the red tape side.

Small business owners cite municipal by-laws as a top red-tape concern. There are many challenges when it comes to evaluating and comparing the regulatory burden at the municipal level. That is why CFIB chose a balanced methodology for its report. All 100 cities were ranked according to 11 universal indicators that allow for an apple-to-apple comparison. The data was collected using various sources: the city's website, "mystery shopper" emails and of-

ficial CFIB phone calls, emails and letters to cities.

Therefore, a city that didn't respond to our email could still collect up to 65 points, which would have been more than enough to get a high ranking, given that the best city got 68 out of a possible 100 points.

To be fair to the different local realities, we also dedicated an important section of the report to best practices by cities. Many cities are commended for having a good small businesses environment, and we propose 18 recommendations to improve regulation in all cities.

We sincerely hope that these will inspire cities like Westmount to rise to the redtape challenge and do the best they can to help their small business community thrive. Many mayors are already proactively taking on these issues, and we are pleased that our report has prompted many more to focus on these issues in the year ahead, as Mayor Peter Trent said he would. After all, that is what the report is all about.

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St. Léon students may not

A reprieve appears to be in the works to keep next September's grade six students at St. Léon, the Independent learned last week. They had been facing transfer to a school facility in St. Henri to deal with overcrowding, which generated outrage from parents.

A decision to keep students at the school as long as the number of registrations remained at the current level was relayed to parents in a notice from principal Lili Beaumont dated April 21.

The notice also states the school committee along with the Commission scolaire de Montréal (CSM), which operates St. Leon's, will be preparing "an emergency plan" in the event student registrations rise significantly between now and August. St. Léon's is the only francophone elementary school in a large CSM territory that includes downtown Montreal.

More details are to be presented to parents at a special general assembly of the school May 3.

"We're very happy with this news," said Claudia Hernandez, a parent living on

Bruce Ave. (see story April 12, p. 1). "We seem to be safe for next year. We're now supporting the efforts of parents living downtown to obtain their own school."

The overcrowding of St. Léon on Clarke Ave. is attributed to the school's vast territory, which now extends east as far as University St. At the same time, the west boundary is being moved from Claremont to Victoria for the next school year.

This is another point of contention for Westmount parents such as Marie-Elaine Cusson, who lives on Prince Albert.

She said last week, however, that parents "have now been assured that the new boundary will apply only to new students and not those already attending St. Léon." Those living west of Victoria would be part of the school territory served by Notre Dame de Grace School on NDG Ave. just east of Girouard.

In a letter to Westmount's provincial legislator Jacques Chagnon delivered April 20, Mayor Peter Trent wrote that "the city does not understand" the plan that would have bussed grade six students from Westmount to a school "in the middle of the Turcot con- continued on p. 9

struction zone," on de Courcelle. He also points out the need to provide an elementary school downtown.

In a letter of reply the next day, Chagnon stated that after exploring the issue with parents he had "concluded" a new school should be considered. He suggested one be set up in part of the former Montreal Children's Hospital building at Atwater and Tupper, which is now vacant.

The decision, he added, lies in the hands of the school commission.

The April 21 letter from the school also announced the creation of a school newsletter, to be distributed via email and called "Info St. Léon," and a plan to update the proofs of residence of students.


Mood of the Market

The following article relates to offers to purchase Westmount residential dwellings that were reported by local real estate agents as having been accepted in March 2016. Because they are not final registered sales, the addresses cannot be made public but give a good idea of current trends in local real estate activity. The graph offers a picture of these trends over time.

The Westmount real estate market in March consolidated the gains made in the previous month, and volume remained very strong for the second month in a row, showing that buyers are in a hurry to snap up local properties before the market gets too strong.

News out of Vancouver and Toronto that real estate prices have become saturated and the bubble, which the Harper government had tried so hard to deflate, continued unabated, apparently has buyers voraciously grabbing up whatever they can Average adjusted price of a 'typical' Westmount home by month, Jan. 2008 to Jan. 2016, based on accepted offer dates



before the spring market pushes Westmount prices into the stratosphere.

Only one of the 14 sales reported (so far) for March was over \$2 million, but then again only one was less than \$1 million. We noted recently that the number of sales \$3 million and higher was increasing last year; so far this year, only

in that category (in January), but that doesn't mean there is no interest in the \$3-million-plus houses; there is plenty of talk among agents of deals brewing now.

The 14 one- and two-family sales in the March list include six that went below val-

uation (of interest, those six had been on the market an average 280 days, or more than nine months, while the other eight took an average 94 days to sell). While prices slid slightly, the sharp rise in the February market was reinforced by March's prices. We also found five new sales posted for February, bringing that month's volume to 21, the same as it was in

2012 but otherwise the highest volume for catch up eventually. February since 1999.

Condo sales

Only two new condo sales were posted in March, bringing the total for the first quarter of 2016 to eight with an average mark-up of only two percent, four above valuation and four below valuation and a range from \$295,000 to \$1,150,000. It is safe to say the condo market is not as hot as the single-family market, though it may

And while Westmount absorbed 14 sales in March to kick off the spring season, adjacent-Westmount was almost as busy with nine sales: three just north of Westmount, two just to the west, two just to the east and two more downtown. Five of the nine went for more than \$1 million and the rest were all over \$800,000, an indication those prices are beginning to catch up to Westmount levels.

Sonmor, Han Art's print exhibition: Rhythm and rhyme

Rhythm and rhyme dominate two Westmount exhibitions: Kevin Sonmor's exhibition of paintings that was at Galerie de Bellefeuille and Han Art's current print exhibition *Expansion of Aesthetics*. Son-





mor's repetition of colour or shape creates an eye-catching rhythm, while Georges Braques' graphic petals or Antoni Tapies' dynamic line introduces a rhyming note to their compositions.

From the Old Masters to modernity

Sonmor's exhibition at Galerie de Bellefeuille featured recent paintings from misty seascapes and jewel-tone still lifes to majestic horses. Painted in oils on canvas, this recent collection showcases Sonmor's classic technique and modern verve. In the mysterious scene "Dreaming About the Rainmakers," a canoe to the right of a bowl of grapes is outlined against a foggy shore

In "Merisi in Red," luscious grapes illuminated in red recalls Caravaggio's novel use of light. Set against a green and blue background, red creates a circular path throughout the composition. In contrast, the long-stem flowers of "Thin Lines on Red" float like equidistant notes on a music staff. In the mystical scene "Lighter Than Air," a winged Pegasus conveys Sonmor's skill as both narrator and draftsman.

For "Unstable Portrait," a trotting horse is painted with three hoofs in mid-air. Flying red sashes and streamers accentuate

its lively dance. In contrast, a plow horse's front and back view in "Coming and Going Portrait Study" captures the animal's quiet dignity against a stark, white background. The exhibition at 1366 Greene Ave. was eyecatching and thought-provoking.

From realism to graphic representation

At Han Art Gallery, the exhibition Expansion of Aesthetics: Graphic Works from the Modern & Postmodern Era features prints by the legendary Pablo Picasso, Georges Braque and Salvador

Dali. The imagery ranges from Leonardo Cremonini's etching of a sunbather to Josef Albers' abstract colour composition. Created within the past 50 years, rhythmic lines or shapes are evocative as well as representative of the subject.

In Braques' "Fleurs Bleues" (1962), a pattern of blue petals on white paper dominates this simple but eloquent composition. Antony Gormley's "Bearing Light" series of 12 black logo-like shapes of a hand, head and cross is equally graphic. Salvador Dali's figurative prints and James Brown's etchings of heads are created with fine lines, while Pierre Alechinsky's toned print of six images creates a comic-book narrative.

Loose, fluid lines dominates Antoni Tapies' calligraphic composition "Equation" (1987) and his large, white-on-black woodcut of an outlined torso, "Cos." This work together with Josef Albers' square color-field motif "WLS-XI" (1966) captures the rhythmic line and rhyming form that identifies a postmodern aesthetic. The one-of-a-kind exhibition continues until Sunday, May 22 at 4209 St. Catherine St.

include masterful works. Carefully conceived and crafted, these paintings and prints draw on the beauty and elegance of line and form. Whether representational or abstract, rhythmic colour with rhyming or repeated forms creates irresistible imagery.

on the security camera.

have been added to the corridor if it were to have been used for the much-discussed train shuttle to the Pierre Elliott Trudeau International Airport now using the tun-

But will the Hudson-Vaudreuil line now serving West Island communities along Highway 20 continue at its current capacity or eventually be "canabalized" by the new more northern line along Highway 40, Trent asks?

Already described as "saturated, it seems it will stay," Trent said.

Will requested electrification of the existing lines to reduce noise still take place, wonders Councillor Cynthia Lulham, who represents District 7. It is residents in this district and District 8 who have been calling for improved tracks and quieter equip-

Lulham who works professionally for the Railway Association of Canada's proximity project, said the plan will have "no effects" on reducing the current noise and vibration from the heavy rail lines through Westmount.

It "raises so many questions" affecting Westmount, she said. "Will the status quo remain?" Will the tracks still be "first on a list" to be electrified as city officials have been told? Will the CP tracks used by the train be sold to the newly formed transit authority for the Montreal region?

"We'll have to wait and see," she said.

Retired Westmount director general Bruce St. Louis also told the Independent, "The plan raises more questions than answers." St. Louis, who works as director general of the Association of Suburban Municipalities, said there is much more to the schematic than what is shown. "Part and parcel of the plan is a complete rethink of bus routes to get people to the new stations and transit hubs," he explained. This also raises many questions. "It's very much a work in progress."

"Westmount will still have commuter lines and there will still be 'residual problems," he added on the effects to Westmount.

He also wondered how many Westmount residents use the existing commuter lines that connect with Vendôme station. How many students use them?

'Great news,' says WTAG

Nevertheless, the announced plan to bypass Westmount "is indeed great news" for residents, says Mike Mossop of the Westmount Train Action Group (WTAG).

"We are curious to see what will happen to the frequency of the Vaudreuil-Hudson line," he said, especially if it is phased out by the new West Island train. "Regardless of the situation, WTAG will continue working...to find solutions to improve and protect our quality of life."

These include electrification and the use of quieter locomotives, he said.

The first new trains are scheduled for service in 2020 on what is called the Réseau électrique métropolitain (REM).

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
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Tuques Bleues celebrates 19th edition

Enraged man earns \$221 ticket for 'insulting, interfering'

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




