November 5 municipal election D'Amico to run in #1, Felcarek #5

The two final candidates to present themselves by the close of nominations October 6 are running for seats at opposite extremities of the city and providing differing points of view.

Antonio D'Amico of Edgehill Rd. is running in District 1 to bring some 25 years of experience as a tax accountant to council to help continue Westmount's "current sound fiscal management." Also, as a former licensed contractor, he hopes to implement ways to increase efficiency in the building permit system.

Gabriel Felcarek of Roslyn Ave. in District 5 is a first-year McGill student in honours political science, whose main goal is to debate council issues in public before decisions. He is a member of the board of the federal Liberal riding association for NDG-Westmount. (See details p. 6.)





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Traditional announcement never came

Two unopposed council candidates to be sworn in this week

Westmount's incoming city council now has two known councillors expected to be sworn in at a time yet to be confirmed at press time Monday. They are Philip Cutler in District 2, and Jeff Shamie in District 3. Both were unopposed at the close of candidate nominations October 6.

After a handful of people gathered at city hall at the 4:30 pm deadline that day to await the results that seemed slow in coming, Councillor Victor Drury went into the office of the returning officer and emerged to make the announcement.

"We have two acclamations," he said.

It was a departure from the city's traditional announcement in the council chamber by the returning officer immediately after the deadline.

The future of the 16 other council candidates is as yet unknown, as is that of three mayoral hopefuls.

Team Martire completes cycling race around Ireland, raises \$250K US

A long-distance bicycling enthusiast from Westmount was part of a two-man team that placed second in that category in an ultracycling event held in Ireland this past summer.

Nicholas Martire of Westmount and Jean-Pierre Généreux of NDG took part in the Race Around Ireland, a gruelling 2,214kilometre trek lasting 108 hours from August 27 to September 1, a Sunday to a Friday. Their Team Aldo (Martire is senior vice president of Aldo Group International shoes) joined one other team in that category.

The race is regarded as "one of the toughest cycling challenges in the world, "

according to the website. The course is known for its hilly terrain.

Assisted by a six-person crew, Martire and Généreux slept just six hours for the duration of the event.

It was their best finish ever, said Martire, who took part with Généreux in another ultracycling event, the Race Across America, last year. Among the team's sponsors this year was Martin Swiss Cycles on Victoria Ave.

Along the way, according to Martire, they raised more than \$250,000 US for the Two Ten Footwear Foundation cancer care fund. Last year they launched the fund with \$200,000. By the end of this summer's event, the fund contained nearly \$500,000, he said. See photo, p. 1.

LOOK TO DOG BEHAVIOUR EXPERTS FOR SOLUTIONS

Contrary to an opinion expressed in a recent letter to the editor intimating that with respect to dangerous dogs, "Genetics is the culprit, not training, (September 5, p. 6), I would like to draw attention to the recent statements and recommendations of the Quebec coroner's office. In this report, related to the tragic incident where Christiane Vadnais was killed by a neighbour's dog, the coroner reviews the facts surrounding the case, the scientific evidence and makes recommendations to prevent future dog-related fatalities.

Although this incident was the impetus to passing breed specific legislation (BSL) in Montreal (and elsewhere in the province), the coroner clearly recommended *against* BSL. He also explained that: (1) experts could not formally identify the dog's breed, notwithstanding DNA testing; (2) the dog's aggressiveness was as a result of mistreatment, physical abuse, neglect and under-socialization by his owner; (3) had the city of Montreal not neglected to apply the existing laws relating to dangerous dogs when this dog previously bit two individuals, this death would have likely been prevented.

In recent years, experts in canine genetics and veterinary behaviour have debunked the myth that dogs of a certain breed or with certain physical characteristics are more aggressive.

As explained by Dr. Irizarry, PhD, an expert in canine genetics: "the anatomical features associated with dog breeds…are *not* involved in encoding the behaviour of a dog – dogs of all breeds share over 99.99 percent of their DNA."

In Quebec, since 1988, there have been six human fatalities caused by dogs, five attributed to dogs identified as northern breeds (i.e. huskies/malamutes). Should we be banning huskies and malamutes? Of course not. Rather, we need to focus on putting time and energy into solutions recommended by experts, as they have done in Calgary and Beaconsfield, in order to make our community safer for all.


POINTS FOR A CANDIDATE

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D'Amico cites career in finance, building; Felcarek calls for open meetings

Antonio D'Amico – District 1

Joining the race for councillor in District 1, Antonio D'Amico hopes his professional expertise in two major areas can help address issues facing those constituents as

well as all residents.

The first is more than 25 years as an accountant and tax consultant working in many capacities including in an advisory one to the Quebec government, he says. "I have the background that will allow me to understand the financial and taxation issues required to represent my constituents."

The second is his experience in building and permit processes.

He has renovated two of his own homes in the district and, having been a licensed contractor, has been engaged in others, he adds. He has also been a board member of a hotel-condo complex and a property manager.

"I understand building codes and permit processes, which is of major interest to my constituents, who happen to live in the only district in Westmount where 100 percent of the built form is made up of houses."

He says his campaign platform is simple.

"Keep District 1 managed by those who live there and have the necessary skills to

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be effective and efficient. As an accountant, I appreciate Westmount's current sound fiscal management, and wish to keep it that way.

"I would work very hard to maintain a tax freeze in 2018. I would also like to implement in the permits department some of the practices and technologies that I use every day in my tax practice."

The current situation "is a major irritant faced by my neighbours and myself who have gone through the permits process."

He also lists safety and traffic issues, saying "I want Westmount to continue to flourish to ensure our families continue to thrive and maintain their roots here."

D'Amico and his wife, Claudia, have children attending LCC: Domenico, 14, and Miriam, 10.

D'Amico grew up in St. Laurent, attended Vanier College and McGill University, and lived in the Bois de Saraguay district of Cartierville before moving to Westmount in 2013 on Upper Lansdowne. He has degrees from McGill in commerce (1986) and arts (1987), an MBA (1990) and

a graduate diploma in taxation in 2000.

Gabriel Felcarek – **District 5**

While Gabriel Felcarek at age 20 is no stranger to politics, the upcoming election is his first opportunity to vote and that is what catapulted him into the race with three other candidates in District 5 on the last day of nominations.

"I found after reading the platforms, that I wouldn't be able to vote for any of the candidates running in my district," he said. "So I decided to run myself and hope that other people in the district would vote for me, too."

Primarily among his issues, he explains, is opening up debate at the council table. He says he doesn't believe in council members arriving at a consensus on various issues before the public meeting or holding committee meetings in private.

"I want to debate the issues in public," he said. "And I don't want people who do so to be branded as crusaders but to be accepted for expressing their own views and those of their constituents."

He is also running on increasing spending for infrastructure, saying "it's fiscally responsible to spend money now rather than later." He's for building a "long overdue" indoor pool, fully digitalizing registration for building permits and synchronizing traffic lights on Sherbrooke.

Felcarek is a first year student in the honours political science program at McGill. He has been a board member of the federal Liberal riding association since April 2016 and was a delegate at the Quebec wing's biennial convention in Montreal last May.

His immersion in politics began with family dinner table conversations that revolved continued on p. 7

She said the crushed stone would allow the runoff – especially during the spring thaw – to permeate naturally and sustainably into the ground. It would also prevent the pooling of water that would otherwise result from falling autumn leaves.

The crushed stone has been generating complaints since the walking path was opened July 20, including some voiced at the city council meeting October 2.

"Have you walked on the stones?" asked architect Bruce Anderson, who led off the questions about it. "I can't walk on them, and my dog can't walk on them." He said the work seemed "quite shoddy," was disappointing and not up to Westmount quality.

"I do share your concern," replied Mayor Christina Smith, adding "we agree it needs to be fixed."

City director general Benoit Hurtubise said any changes would require approval from Quebec.

Denis Biro of Burton, who followed Anderson to the mic, pointed out that the current surface does not factor in accessibility for wheelchairs or strollers. He said a solution had to be found even if the city had to pay for it.

Referring to an original design of the area, John Fretz of Lansdowne said it had shown what appeared to be a separate narrow footpath labelled "secondary pathway" alongside the wider gravelled portion now in dispute (see illustration March 8, 2016, p. 15).

Councillor Cynthia Lulham explained that what he referred to in a drawing was in fact "a cut" to show a footpath that would lead from the top of the new Ridgewood steps across the main (east-west) walking path and into Summit Woods.

Interestingly at that time when details of the project had been announced, the new walking path had been described as a gravelled "permeable pathway" (see also March 8, 2016, p. 1).

While the asphalt surface of Summit Circle had been replaced by the crushed stone, the roadway remains useable by fire trucks and utility vehicles required for emergencies and servicing infrastructure conduits below the former road.

This stretch of paved road has been closed off since 2009, at first experimentally, to extend the wooded area and also prevent drivers from using it as a "race track," especially at night.

around the topic, he recalls. That led to him to work as a volunteer for the re-election of local MP Marc Garneau during the federal election in 2015.

He went on to become president of the Dawson College Young Liberal Association, working with the party's national youth organizer to revitalize it.

Announcing his candidacy October 6, Felcarek told the *Independent* he doesn't support any incumbents running for any position or in any of the districts. Felcarek grew up in Westmount on Grosvenor before moving three years ago to Roslyn. Describing himself as "a dedicated classical pianist," he is also vice-president and treasurer of the Orcherstre Philharmonique et Choeur des Mélomanes (OPCM). This is a non-profit organization of more than 100 participating artists.

He plays tennis at the Westmount courts, usually at King George Park, and has become a member of the McGill Debating Union.

Being mayor today is practically a fulltime job. One need only look beyond our borders to know that we are fortunate to have someone of Smith's calibre seeking the mayoral office. It's a tough role, requiring a complex set of skills that not everyone possesses or is willing to put at the disposal of their fellow citizens. That is why Christina Smith has won my support. 




