Smith elected, will lead a council of 6 first-time councillors

It was two hours after the polls closed in Sunday's election (November 5) before Westmount's results began coming in. But when they finally did, they showed that voters had given interim mayor Christina Smith a strong mandate to lead what turned out to be a council of six first-time councillors and two incumbents.

Smith won in every one of the eight electoral districts to garner a total of 3,619 votes over former long-time councillor Patrick Martin's 1,878. Beryl Wajsman, who lost in every district and did not appear at city hall, ended up with 528.

"I'm thankful for the support of a large team including three former mayors," Smith said of her win." She said she would get some sleep and then proceed with the job ahead.

paign, explained former mayor Peter Trent while awaiting final results. "Whenever I saw her talking to someone she set up a bond with them. He said she also presented herself as "a candidate to continue the good stewardship of Westmount."

Nail-biting races

Tight races were reported in District 8, where two-term councillor Theodora Samiotis lost by three votes to challenger Kathleen Kez, and in District 1 where Anitra Bostock won by four over Antonio D'Amico.



After summer of change at Mouton Noir

White wine emerges as most popular at WRC's café

Red, white, sparkling or rosé?

What are Westmounters' preferences in wine as experienced by Café Mouton Noir in the four months it has been serving wine and beer at the Westmount recreation centre (WRC)?

"White," is the most popular choice, answers server Kashiah Bailey with little hesitation – "usually a Chardonnay," she adds. "But on hockey nights, we serve a lot of beer!"

This is due in large measure to the city's executive hockey league, according to Philip Chang, who owns and operates the catering service.

Chang said he had received a liquor permit in June, but renovations were required to the small space before the new beverages could be introduced in July.

As a result, he said, some of the summer clients "just became aware" of the change, as well as the addition of wine- or beer-appropriate food such as nachos, burgers, cheese and charcuterie plates and a weekend brunch. Now, a winter menu is also on the way.

Two microbrewery beers are being offered - Bierbrier from Westmounter Charles Bierbrier - and Beau's from Vankleek Hill. The wine selection changes. Chang said, "but we will offer at least two selections of red or white by the glass or bottle, a bubbly and a rosé."

In accordance with Westmount's long established by-laws, no alcoholic beverages are allowed to be served without food.

"Our agreement with the city is to provide only beer, wine and/or wine-based cocktails" and drinks such as the Shandy or Sangria, Chang said.

The city's rezoning of the WRC site to add "commercial" as a secondary use "regularized" the existence of the café and pro shop in the municipal building (see story August 16, 2016, p. 3). It also made it possible for the café to obtain a liquor permit.

As a result of the "commercialization," the café has become the only one - a gathering place for the community – along the St. Catherine strip between Greene and Victoria.



FISHINESS, FAVOURITISM

This letter [was] written before the results of the November 5 election. It seems to me there is something "fishy," i.e. questionable, going on in Westmount. First the former mayor resigns early, and with the backing of his loyal supporters on council an interim mayor is put in place for more than six months, of course giving her an enormous advantage in the election.

Then the *Independent* provides the incumbent councillors the right to refute negative comments in letters to the editor. Since only the incumbents are challenged in the residents' letters, those newly running for office are deprived of a rebuttal and articulating their positions on those same issues. To the best of my knowledge, I am unaware of any responsible newspaper that permits this form of favouritism – for that is what it is. What happened to the sense of fairness in our Westmount insti-

tutions?

Editor's note: There is no favouritism being employed in our editorial process. Firstly, every attacked candidate, incumbent or not, would have had an opportunity to reply if the letter writer had agreed. This year, two of the three letter writers who chose not to share their letters with their "attackee" (these letters were automatically not published) were anti-Martin, the non-incumbent mayor. One was anti-Lulham, an incumbent councillor. We can't guess which side will react how. That's up to them.

Secondly, any process will leave us open to criticism. If the final issue had letters without an opportunity to reply, we could be accused of "drive-by" journalism. "Wait till the end and fire" could become a strategy for letter writers, which is not one that we want to be a part of, whatever the intention of the letter writer.

Our actual practice of offering opportunities to reply near the end of the election period, with the consent of the letter writer, had one anti-Martin-ite in a rage, accusing us of being unfair and demanding a right to reply to Martin's reply. When would that process end?

We are happy with our middle ground, which has just celebrated its third voyage into municipal elections (2009, 2013 and 2017). If

letter writers want to have their letters read by everyone at the same time, they can write earlier. If they don't like our approach, they can say "no thanks" (as three recently did).

It might interest the more casual follower of municipal affairs that this is far from the first time that this newspaper has been accused of bias or impropriety by both sides of a debate.

Four teens leave party, scream through Murray park

Four teens were issued two tickets each after their reported unruly behaviour in King George (Murray) Park Friday into Saturday, October 27-28, led to several noise complaints following a house party, Public Security officials said.

The four boys, born in 2001, were reported to have been running all over the park from one end to another screaming, consuming alcohol and marijuana, acting indecently, swearing and taunting officers.

The four initially came to the attention of public safety officers after the first noise complaint at 11:30 pm. Officers found about 30 young people leaving a house party on Murray Hill, said Public Security director Greg McBain in relating the incident.

The teens split into small groups, ran

into the park and the separate groups were warned by officers about the approaching midnight curfew.

The four who were ultimately ticketted an hour later were reported to have been warned again and again as more complaints were received. They continued their behaviour that included insulting officers and eventually led to the arrival of police to help in the identification process required for the issuing of tickets.

Each received a ticket of \$119 for obstructing the work of a municipal officer and another for \$69 for breaking the park curfew. Their parents were informed.

One was described as living in Verdun while two lived in downtown Montreal and the fourth came from a street on the east border with Westmount in the area of Cedar.

Complete council turnovers in '83, '91

Past elections also made it into record books

The election of November 5, 2017 will likely be remembered for having had the longest campaign on record at that time. Candidates started to announce as early as May.

It is also believed to have been the one with the most candidates for mayor – five at one point, whittled down to three.

And it was also on track, last week, to producing one of the highest voter rates based on 12 percent of eligible voters casting ballots at the advance poll October 29 (see story October 31, p. 12).

The city's first of three known contested mayoralties came with the complete turnover of the council in 1983, according to findings from the *Independent's* research of nine elections dating back to that year. The only other complete council renewal came in 1991.

Also in 1983, neither the former mayor Donald MacCallum nor any of his councillors ran again, resulting in the resignation of the city director general before the election. Councillor Brian Gallery stepped up for mayor, winning against Allen Nutik, who had led an island-wide tax revolt movement.

Four years later, in 1987, came another historic race for the mayor's chair when book publisher May Cutler (grandmother of current councillor Philip Cutler) announced some two weeks before the election she would oppose the incumbent Gallery. She achieved what was probably the most significant upset in Westmount history.

To her own amazement, as results came in on election night, she was thrust into the leadership of a virtually unchanged Gallery-loyal council of six returning councillors and two like-minded councillors who came into vacant seats. It was a very bumpy road ahead for the city's first woman mayor.

Eight rookie councillors

Only four years later, however, the landmark election of 1991 brought in a new mayor through acclamation – Peter Trent – and eight rookie councillors, repeating the renewal experience of 1983.

Again, voters had chosen a new direction, and launched the Trent era during

which subsequent elections brought in two to four new councillors in a gradual renewal.

At the end of 2001, however, the mandate of the 1999 council came to an abrupt end with an election to choose a reduced "borough" council for Westmount in the forced merger with Montreal. Three of the existing councillors from the 1999 council continued on, one – Karin Marks – as borough mayor (her position was originally called "borough president"). Councillors John de Castell and Cynthia Lulham represented Westmount's two new electoral districts.

Reconstituted council

The election of 2005, after the demerger, became another historic one as all three members of the borough council continued on in their positions along with the addition of six new councillors dedicated to transitioning Westmount back to its status as a reconstituted city. One of them was 2017 mayoral candidate Patrick Martin.

In this 2005 election, the name of Marks on the ballot was accompanied by that of bookstore owner Gerald Glass, who de-

clared he was running on the principle of providing a challenge in the name of democracy.

The subsequent elections of 2009 and 2013 both involved the uncontested return of Trent as mayor. On resigning this year in April, Trent called for a renewed council under a new generation. The council acclaimed Christina Smith as interim mayor to complete his term leading up to November's election.

The circumstances of this vote also appeared historic.

Opposing Smith from the start was *The Suburban* editor Beryl Wajsman, followed later by Kirk Polymenakos and George Fourniotis, though both withdrew after longtime councillor Patrick Martin entered the race at the end of September.

After two councillor acclamations, contests involving 16 candidates played out at the ballot box for six council seats.

And so, just as other elections in Westmount have set new records, the election of 2017 is also expected to take its place in the city's electoral history in at least one or more ways once official results are confirmed after November 5.

The composition of the new council also provides mayor-elect Smith with the challenge of overseeing the disparate needs of various districts as reflected by the choice of electors.

Districts 5, 7, 8 and 6 – to some extent – are under siege from the noise, construction, traffic and development on the city's west, south and east borders with Mon-

For 20-year-old McGill student Gabriel Felcarek, who entered the race in District 5 on the last day of nominations but came third of the four candidates, the experience was one he may repeat, win or lose. "I'll do it again either way," he said.

Kirk Polymenakos, who ran in District 1, said he had observed during the election it was the vote for the mayor that had brought out electors – in his ward, at least. He said he will be content now to remain "on the other side" of the council table. He said, Anitra Bostock, who won the seat, had campaigned really hard, in the large area that was not her home (District 4).

Grosvenor reconstruction at concrete-laying stage

The reconstruction of Grosvenor south of Sherbrooke was launched last spring in what was described as a logistically challenging project. Now, the work is on the way to winding up at mid-month, weather permitting. This is before the original end-of-November deadline.

"I don't want to be too optimistic, but we're a little ahead," city Engineering director Elisa Gaetano said last week.

The complexity of the project, including replacement of underground utilities, was characterized by the block's long, narrow configuration without side-street access and dominated by numerous row houses with driveway entries crossing the sidewalk close to each other.

Gaetano's "cautiously optimistic" forecast came as workers began pouring concrete section by section, to be followed by asphalt paving.

When all is done, the 1897 water main will have been replaced along with the hydro massif, street lighting, underground traffic light connections at Sherbrooke, new sidewalks, planting areas just south of Sherbrooke at the gas station and the new roadway and sidewalks.

Mid-block narrowing using a pedestrian crosswalk has not been possible due to further narrowing of the already narrow street by parking and, in the winter, snow banks, Gaetano explained.

Whatever traffic calming devices may ensue will be a decision of the city's Traffic Advisory Committee, she said.

One of the outgoing council's last authorizations at the meeting October 2 had been to provide an additional amount of \$124,173, including taxes, for the original Grosvenor contract awarded to CMS general contractors, bringing the total to \$1,468,709.

The new amount remains below the quote of the second lowest conforming bidder of \$1,666,660 including taxes, according to background tender information.

The additional amount was described as required for road drainage, decontamination of soils, modification of plumbing in certain residences and other unforeseen items.

The start of the work had been hit by an initial delay due a province-wide strike of construction workers (see story May 30, p. 4). The street's concrete base street was last reconstructed in 1982.

Sales analysis

July transfers: Several strong mark-ups in houses

The following article relates to the registration of deeds of sale for Westmount property in July 2017, gleaned from non-city sources. A list of sales can be found on p. 17.

Several strong mark-ups over valuation highlighted the July list of real estate transfers in Westmount, moving the average mark-up to 17 percent and a new high in the market, but the more interesting news is that the condominium market was underwater, with an average 10-percent mark-

The price at 31 Oakland Ave., almost double its municipal assessment, led the way in July, but was backed up by four more sales that went for between 29 and 44 percent more than tax value. On the down side were four mark-downs, only two of

them more than 10 percent. Among 18 single-family real estate transactions in July, the average mark-up of 17 percent is up from 10 percent in June and an average 9 percent for the entire year.

than \$1 million while three went for more than \$2 million. The lowest price was \$770,000 for 42 York St., and 215 Edgehill Rd. topped the list at \$3,600,000. The average price was only \$1,479,685, but the mark-up ratio suggests that the "typical" Westmount house registered in July 2017 would sell for close to \$1,800,000, compared to an average for all of 2016 of just over \$1,500,000.

Seven condominiums sold in July, including four first-time sales of units at 175 Metcalfe Ave. and 215 Redfern Ave. Though one of those units has yet to be evaluated by the city, the other three all sold for less than their tax value, as did the other three apartments; biggest markdowns were at 215 Redfern Ave. In the "Bought & Sold" list (p. 17) we also include two more sales that took place in May, and one of those was (barely) above municipal evaluation, though again, the 215 Redfern sale is significantly lower. A check of other sales in that building this year shows that the only two which sold above valuation were the two resales.





Batshaw Children Needing Homes

Meet Ray, 12

A long-term foster home is being sought for 12-year-old Ray, who is described as a happy, active and engaging boy, who has worked hard to learn skills such as communication, trusting adults and parallel play with his peers.

Ray has had a tough start in life. The effects of an abusive, traumatic history in early life can shape the developmental experience of any child. In the situation of Ray, where he was abused, rejected and abandoned at an early age, compounded by the lack of affection and nurturance, have diminished his capacity to communicate effectively, trust and attach to new people.

Ray is presently in a group home, where his daily needs for consistency, structure and continuity are being met on a regular basis. He is encouraged and given positive feedback when earned. Through his desire for change, he is in therapy and has made marked improvements.

The staff has observed that his communication skills continue to develop and improve. They report that he continues to gain socially and cognitively. He is now forming appropriate social connections with his peers, as well as forming secure attachments to the staff at the group home.

Caring for Ray will be challenging as he struggles with transition and needs to know what to expect in his day-to-day situation. However, there is ongoing improvement in his coping skills. Ray is in need of a two-parent family, ideally a Caucasian one with older children who are able to help him with socialization, as well as give him the care, stability and attention that he needs.

Suárez, Fréchette: Mood, motion

Tactile, jewel-tone topographies by Luis-Fernando Suárez at Han Art and electrifying patterns by Karine Fréchette at the McClure Gallery tantalized the senses. As visual excursions through rugged terrain or the inner workings of the mind, both artists recreated equilibrium and chaos within unique abstract forms.

Textural rhythm

Large works with painted, cracked surfaces dominate Suárez's exhibition *Un-Earthing the Self*. His paintings, characterized by warm earth tones – ochres, olive greens or volcanic reds – recreate hills and dales, moon craters or political upheaval. Painted on a thick plaster base, the artist recreates nature's and mankind's complex topographies. Each composition evokes the balance between physicality and serendipity, or drive combined with luck.

Rough textures, painted sienna and ochre, resemble scorched earth in "58 Degrees Celsius on the Sahara Desert." Built up with plaster, pushed or pulled by hand, Suárez's process resembles nature's cycles of sedimendation and erosion. In the red and sienna "Olympus Mons, Mars," the mix of smooth and rough textures resembles craters. In contrast, graphic splashes of purple, cobalt and yellow dance in unison within the green frame of "Indian Summer"

The merger of black, olive and ochre define the political composition "Printemps arab." The Columbia-born artist speaks with authority in the blood-red composition "Palais of Justice Seige, Bogota, 6 November 1985." His message – a depic-

tion and defence of our common heritage of human rights heritage or the environment – is to reclaim the self. Suarez's works are available at Han Art Gallery.

Photo-optic balance

Karine Fréchette's patterned canvases vibrate, oscillate or twirl. Painted in acrylic on a smooth canvas surface, spatial relationships bend perception. Crafted with mechanical precision, line and unusual colour combine in conversations between foreground and background. Bright and bold, these compositions recall 1960s psychedelic op art and flickering, TV screen test patterns.

In the colourful "Turbine," pastel blue, pink and mint shapes suggest a whirling dervish in mid performance. In contrast, for "Waterfull 2" horizontal cobalt lines against a white background vibrate on an electronic device or like sunshine on flowing water. As sensory explorations, a central focus adds interest while precision brushwork contributes to the sense of opart illusion.

The complex composition "Weather-vane" combines black or blue patterns with rainbow hues. Evoking letter forms, land-scapes and astral planes, twisted shapes oscillate within a multi-dimensional plane. The effect conveys a distortion within time-space or a conflict between reality and illusion. Entitled *Astérismes*, Fréchette's exhibition was at the Visual Arts Centre in October.

Sense supreme

Both Suárez and Fréchette push the boundaries of textural and spatial abstraction in complex compositions. In Suárez's hands, textures are physically created and manipulated while Fréchette's fine brushwork recreates multiple dimensions. Vibrating with energy, these unusual compositions appeal to both the senses and the imagination.

Bygone eras featured at art, heritage centre of MUHC

On October 19, I entered the mammoth MUHC by the wrong door for the inauguration of the RBC Art and Heritage Centre of the MUHC. However, the wrong turn was worth it just to see the P.K. Subban Atrium with its bright, whimsical animal-shaped children's chairs and the enormous

outdoor teddy bear sculpture by Quebec artist Michel Saulnier.

The reception, however, was held at the Research Institute on the second floor. There, wall-mounted photographs showed the amalgamation of art works from the Royal Vic, the Children's and the Chest Hospital, now all part of MUHC.

From years gone by, archivist François Dansereau masterfully garnered memorable images including a horse-drawn ambulance from the 1900s, as well as hospital employees enjoying a picnic (1921) and skating (1923). These blasts from the past were accompanied by photos from RBC records, which showed a 1910 RBC hockey team, as well as Sam the cat "helping a teller" at the St. Catherine and Stanley St. branch (1951). (Apparently the cat was needed for a rat roving around the bank.)




