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Residents hear how Roslyn below Sherbrooke will be rebuilt

A number of concerns ranging from possible time delays to property damage were heard from residents attending a city information meeting May 4 on the upcoming reconstruction of Roslyn south of Sherbrooke, according to District 5 councillor Marina Brzeski.

Starting next month, the work includes replacing the 1897 water main as well as the public water entries, electrical conduits, lighting, sidewalks and roadway.

Some 25 or more residents were counted to have turned out.

Among the concerns, she said, residents asked what might delay the estimated 22-week duration, the undulation of new sidewalks, the narrow width for twoway traffic, the impact on elderly and vulnerable residents and damage to private property including a "fantastic garden" at Roslyn and de Maisonneuve.

Many of the questions related to experiences encountered during work in the same block last year on adjacent Grosvenor, she said. But "the work on Roslyn is simpler."

Brzeski, who lived as a resident through the Grosvenor work, said it had

been particularly challenging given the many row houses, car aprons and water service entries. As well, there was a high-pressure gas conduit, a province-wide construction strike and unexpected repositioning of Bell infrastructure.

In presenting the Roslyn project, city Engineering director Elisa Gaetano explained that a strike was not anticipated but weather could delay the work, which is scheduled to last from mid-May through October.

It is to take place six days a week, including Saturdays from 8 am to 5 pm at the discretion of the contrac-7 pm, if needed.

There will be times when sections will be without street lighting at night. The water work will be divided into three zones, each to be completed before the next is begun. Temporary water supply is to be set up. One sidewalk will remain open at all times as will pedestrian access to homes. Road reconstruction will conclude the work, carried out in two halves (north and south).

"One person at the meeting said he liked the sidewalks the way they were and

wondered why they had to be redone," Brzeski said. Concern over their undulation created by driveway accesses was noted, she said, adding that ways will be looked at to minimize the impact, as had been done in some stretches of Grosvenor.

As well, project manager Shawn Aloysius told the Independent the sidewalks and street won't be narrowed. "We're well aware of how tight the (two-way) street is during snow conditions." The sidewalks are old and need redoing especially considering the new electrical conduit and lighting work will involve work under one of the sides.

Residents were told that the contractor, who had the experience of having worked on Grosvenor, would preserve and replace any of the driveway pavers that may have to be removed, Brzeski said.

The work is not expected to intrude into the well-known garden at the northeast corner of de Maisonneuve created by the late Neill Currie and now tended by Victor Yelverton Haines, whose own garden on de Maisonneuve adjoins it.

Haines, who told the Independent he had asked about the garden during the meeting, was relieved that no water service work would be done on the property, whose water service draws from de Maisonneuve. "I'll remove the cobblestones along

the sidewalk," he said. Residents wanting to take advantage of

the opportunity to replace the private portion of the water entry pipes if made of lead or galvanized steel were recommended to do so. "A few people asked about the cost." Brzeski said.

She said she was delighted to know that the city's on-site point person would be Christian Enriquez of the Engineering team, who was applauded for his work on Grosvenor (see story December 12, p. 9). "He was a phenomenal communicator."



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Argyle work gets head start

Reconstruction work that began last fall to redo Argyle from Thornhill to The Boulevard resumed April 3 with the installation of new public water service entries south of The Boulevard, working down the east side first.

As the first of three phases, the work coincided with an information meeting April 5 to outline the plans for this year to residents. Two attended despite notices sent to all homes, city officials said. continued on p. 5

The work will take place in three phases from April through October divided among three contractors starting with the water services and reconstruction of some portions of the sidewalk. This will be followed by rehabilitation of the water main and then by street lighting and the roadway.

Because Les Entreprises Ventec had already won the \$2.3-million contract last August 7 to replace the water entries and sidewalks at various locations, they had, after installation of new street lights north of Montrose, poured a temporary asphalt sidewalk for the winter, confirmed Engineering project manager Shawn Aloysius.

Work on the water services is to be carried out down one side of the street at a time, he said. "They're now working their way down the east side of the street to Thornhill and will then do the west side." This phase will finish with replacing portions of the sidewalk required on the east side of the street. New sidewalks had been put in not long ago so are in relatively good condition, he noted.

At the same time, Bell Canada is to replace its manhole at Argyle and Montrose. The city's site engineer for this project is Christo Kirkov, Aloysius said.

The second phase from May to August consists of rehabilitation of the water main by Aquaréhab. This involves insert-


ing a lining in the existing water pipe, which reduces the need to dig up the street, explained Sandra Avakian, assistant director general for infrastructure.

The third phase of the project scheduled for August to October consists of completing the installation of a new electrical conduit bank and lighting on the west side, followed by a new concrete sidewalk as well as the reconstruction of the new roadway by Coialac.

Work on Argyle between Sherbrooke and Thornhill took place over July and August in 2015 and 2016 by Ventec, now doing the water services on the three blocks north of Thornhill.

Peewee B & C win in their divisions

Westmount Midget A Wings win EHL division championship

The Midget A Westmount Wings became the Eastern Hockey League's 2017-2018 season champions in their division on April 15 when they defeated the St. Laurent Thunderbirds 5-2 in a hotly contested match played on the Molson rink at the Westmount recreation centre.

Westmount decided to host the Eastern Hockey League finals at the WRC last weekend. In all, 13 divisions played matches on Westmount's ice last Saturday and

in their match, being first to be scored against, the 15- to 17-year-old players evened things up before the first period

Although the Thunderbirds scored again early in the second period, Westmount soon caught up and never looked back after that, scoring two more goals in very quick succession before the end of the second period.

With St. Laurent seemingly losing the momentum they'd shown early in the match, the third period belonged to the Wings, who raised the score to 4-2, while While the Wings suffered a slow start landing their last goal in an empty Thun-

derbirds net for a final 5-2 count.

Thunderbirds coach George Warash took the defeat in stride. "It's just a game of hockey – back and forth – that's the way things go," he told the Independent following the match. "All in all, both teams played really well."

With the Midget A division championship secured at last, Wings coach Ed Harvey was upbeat in his assessment. "We finally figured out how to pass," he said, noting that his players seemed to get the message after struggling to some extent over the past season with the concept.

"That was the big thing. We had trouble with that all year. Although we haven't had any trouble winning, we had trouble with our teamwork. But this team in the end finally pulled together and became a team."

Even at the level of Midget A, the intensity of the on-ice action during playoffs is such that players do sometimes get carried away. As such, the game between the Wings and the Thunderbirds had more than a good share of penalties, as well as player suspensions for mouthing off.

A coach's work isn't always easy under such conditions, Harvey acknowledged. "The hardest thing on the bench is keeping the kids at this age calm so that they won't take a lot of penalties," he said.

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Work at 500 Claremont focuses on interior design

After obtaining a green-light at the end of January to proceed with a non-conforming residential project at 500 Claremont, developer Gideon Pollack said last week that work has been focused on interior design. "We were fortunate to obtain a lot of very valuable feedback from Westmounters on our project during that period, so we have been incorporating much of that into the design of our interior layouts and making improvements where needed. Our hope is to start work sometime in the spring."


Because the plan to convert the century-old institutional building of Category II heritage rating sought to over-ride current zoning, it required special consideration under the city's specific construction, alteration or occupancy proposal for an immovable (SCAOPI) by-law. This could have generated a referendum but failed to generate a sufficient number of signatures at a registry session (see story February 6,

The average size of the apartment units, he said, will be about 1,600 square feet. They are to have two or three bedrooms.

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
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Villa Maria students win first prize at first 'Olympes de la Parole'

Four Secondary 5 students from Villa Maria School were awarded first prize during the first Canadian edition of the Olympes de la Parole, an academic competition focusing on human rights themes.

Sponsored by the University Women's Club of Montreal, the competition saw students from three high schools present projects on how access-to-information technology can help empower indigenous girls and women in Canada.

The winners, Aristi Constantopoulos, Eleanor Fenner, Julia MacDonald Erdström and Dalia Vita, presented the results of their work at an awards ceremony held on April 6 at the Atwater Library. Teams from The Study and Sacred Heart School also gave presentations and received prizes.

Evaluated by UWCM president Saôde Savary along with a panel of judges made up of a majority of indigenous women, the Villa Maria project won a \$2,000 scholarship.

Their project focused on the use of the Raspberry Pi, a low-cost mini-computer that the Villa Maria students proposed as an important key for disseminating mental health information in northern Canada.

The competition, which originated in France, is named after Olympe de Gouge, a French woman who authored the Déclaration des droits de la femme et de la citoyenne in 1791 during the French Revolution. An author and political activist, she was among the thousands of French citizens who were executed on the guillotine during the Reign of Terror.

Lansdowne break-in suspects flee after being spotted

The owner of a home on Lansdowne Ave. near the corner of Westmount Ave. was able to provide police with a description of two suspects who may have been trying to break into his house during the early afternoon of April 7.

According to Station 12 community relations officer Adalbert Pimentel, the owner was in the basement of the house, when he noticed through a window that two individuals were outside at the front door.

However, when the suspects saw they had been spotted, they ran off eastward along Westmount Ave.

The suspects are described as two white males in their 20s. The first was 5' 9" tall and weighed around 180 lbs. with a stocky build. He was wearing a dark green hoodie with an orange design on it.

The second suspect was said to be six feet tall, weighing 190 lbs. and slighter in build. He was wearing a tuque, a long black overcoat and was wearing a black backpack.

Pimentel said the Montreal police department's identification unit was summoned to find fingerprint evidence, which was forwarded to the forensics investigation department. The home owner immediately called 9-1-1, "which was the right thing to do," Pimentel added.

Hit & run at Metro

A hit-and-run vehicle accident that took place around 11 am on March 2 in the parking lot of the Metro supermarket on Victoria Ave. resulted in damage to the front of the vehicle.

"Someone went to do their groceries and when they came out afterwards, the front fender had been damaged," said Pimentel, noting that the driver of the other vehicle didn't stay around. While the incident happened more than a month ago, the community relations department only became aware of it recently.

Hit & runs on Lansdowne, Argyle

In another vehicular hit-and-run incident, this one on March 20 on Lansdowne Ave. near the corner of de Maisonneuve Blvd., the front bumper of a parked car was damaged by a suspect who left the scene.

And in yet another hit-and-run, this time on Argyle Ave. on March 10, the driver-side front fender of a car parked on the street was damaged by another vehicle. Pimentel noted that passing traffic from construction activity in the area may have been a factor.

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
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
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


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Demolition meeting set for May 7

Larger house proposed to replace 51 de Lavigne

The two storeys of a stucco house at 51 de Lavigne Rd. are proposed to be demolished and the basement extended to support a larger, higher three-storey home.

A hearing to examine the request to "deconstruct" what the city rates as a Category II heritage dwelling is scheduled to take place May 7 at 5 pm preceding the regular 7:30 pm council meeting.

"The half basement will be replaced with a full basement, which will require further excavation and side and rear ex-

tensions," states a summary from architect Rhona Goldenberg of Rubin and Goldenberg architects in Westmount.

The new basement will include provision for a four-car garage, office, mudroom, laundry and mechanical room.

On the ground floor, the larger house will gain a family room and large kitchen to add to a living/dining room and bathroom. On the second floor, it will have three bedrooms and two bathrooms while the new third, or attic storey, will have a bedroom, bathroom and family room.

The extended basement and additional storey are indicative of what Urban Planning director Tom Flies recently stated as ways in which homeowners are finding to enlarge their homes given the limitations of their properties (see story March 27, p. 1).

Building to limitations

In this case, the extension of the basement is allowing for an additional 442.45 square feet of the allowable maximum of 446, according to plans at city hall.

A short history of the house provided by the architect and included in the demolition file, states it was built in 1953 by Forest Homes, a Town of Mount Royal developer.

Efforts to obtain additional history on the house from the Westmount Historical Association failed to turn up any historical significance, Goldenberg wrote.

In general, the city attempts to preserve Category II buildings from demolition because of their heritage rating as "important." This point is expected to be addressed at the demolition hearing.

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Activity continues on Westmount portion of Glen campus





City council April 3 approved work to renovate the downstairs financial counter area of city hall inside the door off the parking lot. The contract was awarded to Groupe DRC (9282-0786 Quebec Inc.) for \$86,231. "It's a pretty big project" that includes creation of a private meeting room, said Councillor Philip Cutler.

Tree cutting to start

The city's systematic cutting of trees and removal of stumps was awarded April 3 to Arboriculture de Beauce Inc. for \$191,663. "Based on the specialized nature of the work and the equipment required, only one tender was received," according to city background information. The bid was described as conforming to specifications.

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




