Neighbours request more info, challenge the process

Demo hearing approves request for 45 Summit Crescent

By LAUREEN SWEENEY

A request to demolish more than 50 percent of the bungalow at 45 Summit Crescent to add a second storey was approved at a special hearing by council December 9.

The decision by the city council after 45 minutes of deliberation during the virtual hearing came despite a recommendation from the city's Planning Advisory Committee (PAC) and a lengthy plea from neighbours wanting to weigh in on plans for the addition.

Bobby Stoller, of Gordon Crescent, was told that the meeting was to consider only the demolition aspect. Details of the replacement project were a separate matter to be determined by the PAC according to zoning requirements as part of the normal permit review process in which neighbours are not customarily consulted.

Stoller asked how neighbours therefore had an opportunity to interact and express "the collective rights of the neighbourhood."

"One neighbour can't comment on the colour of a neighbour's door or types of windows," Mayor Christina Smith explained.

Nathalie Jodoin, assistant director of the Urban Planning department, further ex-

plained that a year ago when the proposal for a second storey was submitted for 45 Summit Crescent, it became apparent that once the roof was removed and some changes made to the windows, more than 50 percent of the house was affected, which would require a demolition permit even though it was "partial" demolition (see photos November 9, p. 14).

The PAC recommendation against the demolition was based in part on the house having a significant Category II rating for architectural heritage and integrity dating to 1954 and being in very good condition and well preserved.

Stoller was told, however, that the council was viewing it more "holistically," Councillor Conrad Peart explained as urban planning commissioner. This was based on 36 percent of the post-war bungalows in the sector having added a second storey or been demolished, and 41 percent of buildings built between 1945 and 1970 being two storeys in height.

Among the conditions imposed in approving a demolition permit was the requirement to recycle material that was removed, and protecting the mature trees and root systems. This followed concerns expressed during the meeting by Councillor Matt Aronson, whose responsibilities include the environment. He also raised the point of emissions involved in demolition.

The final decision by council members to allow the demolition request was unanimous.

The meeting concluded with Mayor Smith encouraging Stoller to talk to the neighbours at 45 Summit Crescent, to encourage them to be more disciplined and less disruptive in doing the work "than usual."

The 4 pm meeting ended at 5:47 pm.



Montreal Transit Corp. contemplating west-end bus route changes

Bus service in Westmount was not on the list of topics discussed during an online public consultation of NDG/Montreal West/Côte St. Luc/Hampstead residents by the Montreal Transit Corp. last week.

Still, some who travel from these areas to Westmount on the MTC's buses got in a word or two during the December 6 webcast as to what they believe the transit agency could be doing to improve service.

The MTC says it is carrying out its "Bus network redesign" in view of some major development projects now under way in Montreal, including the Réseau express métropolitain (REM) light-rail commuter train network.

The transit agency has tabled three proposals it says would make the bus network "more attractive."

The first, they say, would favour fast and more direct routes to the Metro. However, some barriers stand in the way, including railway and highway crossings, which could increase the distances and travel times of bus routes.

While noting that public transit can't

hope to compete with private modes of transport if bus routes aren't linear and can't avoid traffic and congestion, the transit authority is proposing that Côte St. Luc Rd. be made into a core public transit corridor with a fast link to the Metro.

The question that remains undecided (but which was put to the consultation participants in an online vote) was whether the destination Metro station should be Snowdon or Villa Maria.

Some parts of the presentation suggested the MTC is weighing the possibility of rationalizing or changing some of the bus lines that currently serve NDG/Montreal West/Côte St. Luc/Hampstead.

"The current network includes some low-frequency bus lines with similar routes," stated one of the presentation cards, suggesting the transit network may be "simplified" for maximum frequency.

But if the MTC is contemplating mergers on lines like the 104 Cavendish, 124 Victoria or 138 Notre-Dame-de-Grâce, they are also looking at the possibility of creating new public transit links, so that parts of LaSalle, including Carrefour Angrignon and Angrignon Park, would become more directly accessible, without the current and lengthy detours by Metro.

Among the online participants was Côte St. Luc city councillor Dida Berku. As a lawyer with an office on St. Catherine St. in Westmount, she expressed concerns about access to the 104 and 138 lines. "How would you merge those two lines, or the 103 or the 161 or the 162?" she asked.

An MTC official explained they are looking into the possibility of changing certain bus routes that overlap, thus reducing the redundancy of service. He said the ultimate goal would be to get bus passengers as quickly as possible to the Metro.



Former Selby Condos becomes LABO Rental Housing project BY MARTIN C. BARRY

A multi-unit residential project in lower Westmount that has been dormant for nearly 25 years is expected by developers to be offering rental apartments by next summer.

Located on St. Antoine St. in buildings once occupied by the Charles E. Frosst pharmaceuticals company, followed by Dawson College until 1997, the LABO Rental Housing project was re-branded after being known as the Selby Condos.

"The site will finally undergo the rejuvenation it deserves and will come back to life in June 2022," states a press release issued by PUR Immobilia and EMD-Batimo. The two companies acquired the project late last year from its previous owner, Roland Hakim, who remains involved as an associate.*

PUR and EMD say the rejuvenated project will offer two phases of New York-inspired rental units with 12-foot ceilings and large windows, exploiting the building's original industrial look, in conjunction with renovations that add a distinctive touch of modern.

The first phase, taking place in the orig-

will be indoors, there will be charging stations for electric vehicles, and bicycle spaces will be available. As well, there will be storage spaces on each floor.

The developers say that "smart lockers" (made by the Quebec firm Expedibox) in a hall of the original building will facilitate the reception of deliveries, so that packages can be received securely at all times even if no one is home.

A second phase is expected to consist of 188 units over 18 floors. The developers

say that plans for phase two will soon be submitted for approval to the city.

Once this phase is completed, all tenants will have access to an indoor swimming pool, co-working spaces, a large lobby and green spaces on rooftop terraces. In all, \$120 million is expected to be spent redeveloping the older building while adding a new one.



Police Report Three burglary and break-in suspects arrested

Three suspects believed to be responsible for committing a string of break-ins and burglaries since last summer at homes in Westmount, Côte des Neiges and other Montreal neighbourhoods were arrested in LaSalle on December 2, according to a Montreal police department official in Westmount.

The suspects are alleged to have committed one of the break-ins in Westmount on August 26, said Station 12 community relations officer Adalbert Pimentel.


He said they are also accused of participating in six other break-ins in the city of Montreal.

While two of the suspects remained detained as of last Friday, Pimentel said a third was released with court-imposed conditions to follow.

The charges against the three include possession of burglary tools.

Windshield wiper mischief

Investigators at Station 12 have no suspects to face a charge of "mischief" follow-

The owner had parked on the afternoon of November 26 and extended the wipers outward to keep them from freezing to the windshield during freezing rain. When he returned the following morning, he found the wipers had been bent and twisted out of shape.

Checking on capacity

While police incident reports at Station 12 indicate that the number of burglaries, break-ins and car thefts in Westmount dropped in recently weeks, some Montreal police officers have been busy overseeing the enforcement of restaurant occupancy regulations.

According to Pimentel, a police department special unit has been making the rounds of restaurants on Greene Ave. and other commercial streets in Westmount, checking on whether room occupancy rules are being followed in accordance with liquor permit requirements.

And with the COVID-19 pandemic still not over, another unit of the police force remains busy visiting the homes of recently-returned travellers who are expected to remain in quarantine for a two-week period.

On one such recent inspection visit to a Westmount home, officers found that an individual who was supposed to be there was not present.

Pimentel said a report was forwarded to the Montreal department of public health and that "punitive actions" may be taken.

Surrey Gardens' Bloomfield challenges process More polling needed on Sunnyside's new 1-way direction?

Because the stretch of Sunnyside between Bellevue and Upper Bellevue is the route taken by many residents of the summit area on their way home from downtown offices at night, why since its recent reconstruction has this former two-way stretch been made one-way "down" (east) after a poll of its 10 residents?

Pedestrians and Cyclists Ass'n: Construction signs pose safety issue for pedestrians

Temporary signs to inform drivers about construction pose a safety issue to some pedestrians when placed on the sidewalk, Dan Lambert, president of the Association of Pedestrians and Cyclists, told the council meeting December 6.

"Those signs become obstacles for pedestrians, especially for seniors, who must take care to not hit their head or trip," he explained. "Furthermore, these signs complicate COVID social distancing on our narrow sidewalks."

As a result, "we ask that all construction signs for drivers be installed either in parking lanes or the side of driving lanes, rather than on sidewalks."

"Very good question," said Mayor Christina Smith. The city's director general, Hadi Hakim, "will make sure our staff is aware these signs should not be installed on the sidewalk." She thanked Lambert "for being our eyes on the street." who referenced a letter he wrote in the *In- dependent* (see November, 30, p. 14).

At the time of Sunnyside's reconstruction over the summer and fall, "We were looking for a bad street getting fixed," and were surprised when one-way signs were installed, he explained. "It's our favourite way to get home," when traffic on The Boulevard "is a mess."

Had residents living on Surrey Gardens, Oakland, Lexington, Roxborough and Summit Cresc. been consulted the results would have been different, he contended. Mayor Christina Smith said that the street was too narrow to provide two-way traffic along with a sidewalk and parking lane. She pointed out, however, that the street in front of residents' homes does not belong solely to them.

A meeting on Belvedere was to take place last week between the city's director general, Hadi Hakim, and newly elected District 1 councillor Antonio D'Amico, she said. D'Amico said he expected to have something to announce after that meeting.

Metro rooftop units to get acoustic panels

Among permits approved by city council at a special meeting December 9 was one for the installation of acoustic panels around mechanical equipment on the Metro store at Sherbrooke and Victoria. It had been recommended by the Planning Advisory Committee November 16 on a request from nearby residents to reduce sound and vibration (see story October 26, p. 5).

Recently Westmount eight-grader Kelsey Li encouraged several neighbours to compost food waste. A good news story – reported on the city's website – Li's initiative is a timely reminder to support environmental and community sustainability this holiday season.

Green practices

In Westmount, over 585 tons of food waste were collected in 2020. Although citizens continue to sign on daily, Westmount Healthy City Project's 2020 survey of five neighbourhoods found that approximately one-third of households composted. As food waste constitutes 25 percent of garbage deposited in landfills, Li's concerns are warranted. Decomposing food not only contaminates groundwater, but also produces methane – a toxic greenhouse gas that contributes to global warming.

As Westmount staff are now targeting

buildings with 9 to 30 housing units – phase 2 of our composting program – please urge management to sign up. Another suggestion – add a backyard composter for your own gardening needs. Also to reduce food waste during the holidays, watch best-before dates and restrict purchases to quantities needed. And recycle food packaging when possible.

To cut down on waste destined for landfills, choose recyclable gift wrap and avoid metallic paper. Or make your own gift wrap with fabric or tea towels. And avoid packaging by shopping locally. Not only do you also decrease transportation emissions, you support Westmount businesses and contribute to community sustainability.

Outside the box

Shops that line Greene, St-Catherine, Victoria and Sherbrooke provide many gift ideas. Some offer green solutions like Sharyn Scott's new-to-you, recycled fashion boutique on Sherbrooke Street. Others such as Clara Kwan's L'Autre Choix Mini Marché on Victoria Ave. sell local honey – a fabulous treat. And for those shopping for the person who has everything – or are rethinking gift-giving in general – consider purchasing experiences. Think Westmount and *continued on p. 29*

Free Jimmy Lai

"And the light shineth in darkness; and the darkness comprehended it not."

– John 1: 5 (King James version)

According to the BBC and The Guardian, Hong Kong billionaire Jimmy Lai was convicted December 9 for inciting and taking part in an unlawful assembly. He, Gwyneth Ho and Chow Hang Tung were sentenced on December 13, in his case to 13 months. Lai is an entrepreneur with many holdings, but is best known internationally for his now defunct newspaper *Apple Daily*. He is already serving a sentence related to pro-democracy protests in 2019 and this one will be served concurrently.

Here is a man who could have lived his life in relative obscurity and in incredible comfort, but who has chosen to fight – at age 74 – for democracy in his adopted city. (He was born in mainland China.) His "crime" this time? Commemorating the 1989 crackdown at Beijing's Tiananmen Square, a permit for which was not issued due to alleged pandemic concerns.

He is a hero, and the *Independent* adds its small voice in support of his release.

ENFORCE THE LAW – FOR THE PERMIT HOLDERS

Every entrance to the city of Westmount welcomes you with a "maximum 4-hour" parking sign. Residents who require longer stretches of street parking, as they do not have any on their property, must pay for a parking permit – and those of you that have them know the paperwork involved is lengthy and the permits costly. But what's the point if the city does not enforce the by-laws and leaves those who follow them hanging?

I've lived on the corner of Melville Ave. and St. Catherine for a little under seven months now. As a new resident to Westmount, I quickly got all the documents and IDs in order to obtain my 24-hour parking permit at a cost of \$200 for the first vehicle.

Over the summer, parking was never an issue. There was always one or two cars parked overnight without permits but due to the pandemic, the city was being more lenient. That leeway supposedly ended but that does not seem to be the case on Melville Ave.

Since the "rentrée scolaire," parking on this street for residents has been a nightmare. The vast majority of the street parking is taken by what I'm assuming is staff from Westmount Park elementary. Some go out in pairs to rotate their vehicles with one another on their lunch hour and others just leave their cars parked in the same spot from early morning to late afternoon. This street seems to be favoured as it is right next to the school and is one of the only streets within the vicinity that you can park on without a special Zone A permit.

The city of Westmount seems to be catering to those working within its borders



and leaving those living within them – who are paying for permits and city taxes – to hunt for parking and end up blocks away from their homes.

The photo, below left, was taken December 7 at 12:39 pm. Three out of the 15 parked cars had permits.

Why pay for a permit when you clearly do not need one to park?

Gorski opens flagship on Greene: premieres first store in Canada

There's a new mood on Greene Ave. Formerly gloomy empty spaces are now filled with exciting, enticing shops. New and noteworthy is Gorski Montreal.

The flagship store is the first "Gorski" in Canada. The collection is already known in the US with Gorski shop-in-shops at Neiman Marcus throughout the country. Leonard Gorski, CEO of the Gorski Group, bought the former Mink's Haute Couture building last March and carefully renovated it to house his Italianate boutique: Gorski Montreal.

That it has an Italian feel is appropriate. Much of the outerwear – deftly designed by daughter Lauren Gorski – is made in Italy.

And it is great fun! To catch the eye at Gstaad or Tremblant, brightly coloured *après-ski* jackets reverse to classic black: two coats in one. Fur-trimmed hoods are detachable.

30-year history

Lauren uses *rex rabbit*. The plush fur with a wonderful velvety texture is knitted into scarves, used as trimming on patterned cashmere capes and is adorable in earmuffs: the perfect stocking stuffer. All natural materials are ethically sourced. The elegant space is called Gorski Montreal for a reason, explains founder Leonard, who has been involved in fashion for over 30 years.

"I am very active with the Canadian Apparel Federation and we would love to see Montreal positioned internationally as a fashion capital."

In his store window a video screen beams fashion 24/7, both onto the street and into the shop. Open seven days a week

there is also a second-floor showroom (complete with ping pong table!) for private customers and special appointments.

Although just opened, both men and women have quickly discovered the address, and, indeed, one menswear coat – made with cashmere from the renowned Loro Piana mill – has sold out.

Gorski Montreal excels in luxury outwear: vests with detachable sleeves; primary colour capes (again in cozy cashmere – perfect for travel); form-fitting "puffer" jackets – stand-outs for the season – and wonderful accessories.

As fund-raisers are starting up again, the brand is supportive of the community. For the Cedars Cancer Foundation (headquartered just down the street), "we have donated a \$10,000 package, which includes Byran Gorski.

Leonard Gorski speaks enthusiastically about his vision: a dream to revitalize Greene Ave., which he feels could become "like Milan's Via Monte Napoleone and New York's Madison Ave.: *the* place for upscale shopping, art and restaurants."

Gorski Montreal is a family business with Leonard's children Sarah (digital marketing), Lauren (designer) and Bryan (director business development) adding different dimensions.

Bryan shows me around the marblefloored shop as I tried on the fur-topped toques before venturing into the scrim of snowflakes. With constant travels to Italy, Leonard and his team soon plan to showcase Murano glass pieces and other inimitable items.

As I exited, a gaggle of tiny pre-schoolers clad in multi-coloured outerwear stopped to clap at the video. Their happy rainbow colours echoed the mood of the store. to renovate its soccer field, which Westmount could use in return for supporting the application.


"The important strategic partnerships with Dawson and Marianopolis are key to the city offering all the programs that people want," Mayor Smith told the meeting.





Known for selling Christmas trees 'Silver bells' on Greene for passing of Boots MacLeod

Boots MacLeod was known locally for selling balsam and Fraser fir Christmas trees outside the Westmount food emporium Les 5 Saisons – corner of Greene and de Maisonneuve – for decades.

"2012 was the last year at Greene, then we moved to Wood Ave., in front of Grace Montreal Church, for [our] last five years," son and business partner Bob MacLeod told the *Independent*.

Boots started selling Christmas trees on the lots at age 50, and he worked until 85. "When he felt that he was finally allowed to retire."

Born in Montreal, William Kenneth MacLeod Jr., known as Boots, was a longtime resident of Thetford Mines. He attended Stanstead College and Mount Allison University. He was a geologist and later president of Lynn MacLeod companies. He died on October 8.

"He had severe stenosis, which required a stent and a pacemaker, and then on top of that, he had a tumour on his right kidney," explained Bob. "No morphine though: he was one tough guy!"

Bob also revealed that Boots' long-time

GP was always envious of him and how he was able to be outside spending time with his children and grand-children.

Indeed, Boots enjoyed much fresh air, sometimes in minus 20°C temperature from 9 am in the morning until 7 pm or later.

The nickname "Boots" latched on shortly after his birth in 1932. A Harvard-Yale football match was taking place, one his mum was keenly following, being from Boston.

The local newspaper published a photo of a stork flying with a baby and the caption read "Boot's Day." There was a player named Boots who had a clutch play in that match and henceforth the nickname was used for little William by his parents W.K. MacLeod and Marion Lamb Knight.

Local Santa Claus

What also stuck was the enjoyment Boots took in playing Santa Claus to the children who came with their families to his tree lot.

"We could not keep him away. It was something he loved doing: seeing the families," Bob said.

In the 1980s, Boots started a tradition of keeping one dollar from each tree sale to support missing children charities. "Of course, there were so many children coming by with their families to the lot and

schools and other venues (including the Westmount YMCA and Westmount Park).

Written by Tom and illustrated by Dana, the book combines aspects of the puppet show along with elements of Andersen's story.


On the last two pages are cut-out puppet characters that can be used to enhance the story-telling experience, or which can be used by children to put together and perform their own version of the story in a puppet show.

it just seemed so appropriate. We did that for many, many years."

In addition to being charitable, his son describes him as an indulgent business man.

Bob found an envelope with Boots' handwriting on it that had 11 cents in it. After some digging, it turns out that it was given to him by a young girl who only had that small amount to put towards the purchase of a tree back in the 1980s (the going



rate at the time was \$18 to \$25).

"It was about giving and the spirit of it," Bob said about his dad's favourite activity.


Although Bob appreciates that his father had the smile and the gumption to do it into his senior years, he has no present ambitions to carry on Boots' trade.

"It would not be the same! Plus, he had to have four hip surgeries. It is very physical labour putting trees on cars and tying them down!"


