Cause of St. Catherine/Atwater blaze #2 unknown

Fire department extinguishes second alley fire in two days

Two days after the origin of a laneway fire was determined to be a homeless encampment behind 4024 St. Catherine (see September 30, p. 1), there was a second fire in a homeless encampment in the same alley, this time behind 4000 St. Catherine, which is rented by Resilience Montreal, a community-led project estab-

lished to support the homeless population in the Cabot Square area.

The Montreal fire department received a call at 9:41 am on September 22 from 911 central that a tent was ablaze in the lane behind 4000 St. Catherine, just west of Atwater and just east of the September 20 fire. The east-west alley starts at Atwater and runs between St.



How many paper newspaper copies do we need?

Firstly, I want to thank everyone who has written in to support my editorial requesting that the city reinstate its former, larger, advertising budget with us (see September 16, p. 18).

I have received some wonderful letters for publication and will publish them soon.

It is not too late to add your voice. Please write to me at editor@westmountinde pendent.com.

One other piece of feedback that I have received was a question. "Why," this reader in effect asked, "do I receive a paper copy when I am perfectly happy to read the online or email version of the paper? Wouldn't it save the company money to not print and not distribute my copy?"

Short answer: Yes, it would save money,

but not much, and it is both unfeasible and against the goals of a free newspaper to limit distribution house by house.

Long answer: Let's back up.

Oddly, at a free newspaper, the reader/ user of the product is not the client. This situation does not mean that the reader is not important to us! Advertisers would eventually realize if there were no readers and the reader is our ally for this reason. Here at the Independent, we have always received excellent support from our readers when we have asked for it. But the business - the motor that makes it all possible - isset up around the client, who is the adver-

So what does the advertiser want? The advertiser does not want his or her ad to sit only on a website. The advertiser wants some "push" to get the newspaper (and his or her ad) into the hands of as many people as possible.

For this reason, we try to print as many papers as possible and to distribute them as widely as possible – within reason (e.g. basically only in Westmount).

Will there be some costs that could theoretically not be incurred? Yes, but that goes with being a free paper.

Others have an ecological bent. Will there be some waste? Some unused, unwanted papers? Yes, but that also goes with being a free newspaper.

On the financial side, the cost of one copy of the paper is negligible. Even 100 or 1,000 newspapers added to the end of a printing run cost almost nothing. Most of the costs in a newspaper edition are in the content, the layout and the set-up of the printing press. Once a press is running, to repeat, an extra newspaper or 1,000 cost almost nothing.

Think of it another way. The Independent does not own a printing press, nor does it own a distribution company. Those items are hard-money costs to us. If we could get away with just having a website, without those expenses, wouldn't we do it? We print the papers in order to exist.

No paper papers, no free newspaper.

There are many specific pro-physicalpaper constituencies to consider too, from both a reader and advertiser point of view.

Some people may not have computer access and/or are used to a physical paper from decades of habit. Others simply prefer to leisurely read a physical newspaper and so better absorb its content – articles and ads. A newspaper also has the benefit of being delivered to an address and a family – to be left around, for example, on the kitchen table for all to read and discuss.

We want to get the paper into the hands of all these groups.

On the practical side, the service that we use (when Canada Post is not on strike) cannot "un-target" one address. The idea at Canada Post and at/for its newspaper clients is to distribute the paper as widely as possible (always, again, within reason – e.g. we don't print 100,000 papers and distribute them in Calgary).

One final point: a free, "pushed" paper fits neatly with a municipally focused newspaper because most people don't think they care about municipal news. If we do a good job with p. 1 and everything else, less-than-keen residents find themselves reading our newspaper without even realizing it.

Are there keeners who would log into our website every week to get updated? Yes, and I know many of them by name. They are questioners at city council, or letter writers to this paper, or past/present/ future council members. But they do not exist in sufficient number, in my view, to have a business. We need the less municipally attuned residents of Westmount (who themselves are distributed across a spectrum from somewhat interested to totally indifferent) to read at least some of the paper, some of the time - and a wide, free distribution is a way to do it.

A free newspaper is a delicate dance between ads and content, readers and advertisers, news and opinion, light and heavy news, graphics and text, revenue and costs, high distribution and prudence.

Thank you again to anyone who has made, or will make, it easier for us. - DP

IT'S TIME FOR CLEAR ANSWERS ON KEY ISSUES

As another election approaches, the citizens of Westmount deserve more than just platitudes and promises. We require specific, actionable answers to the pressing problems that affect our daily lives and the future of our city. I call upon every candidate for mayor and council to publicly state their positions on the following critical issues. Silence on any of these matters will rightly be interpreted as a sign that they do not consider the question a priority.

- 1. The state of our roads: Our roads are in terrible condition. Potholes and deteriorating surfaces are a nuisance and a safety hazard. When can residents expect a comprehensive repair plan? At what speed will this plan be executed, and what priority will road repair hold in the next city budget? We need a clear timeline and a commitment of resources.
- 2. The Summit Woods leash-free area: The current situation at Summit Woods is untenable. The lack of a requirement for dog-bite insurance leaves the city and its residents exposed to risk. Many elderly residents and young children now fear to use a public park meant for all. Furthermore, the failure of some owners to clean up after their pets and the significant use of this expensive facility by non-residents are significant concerns. How will you control the park for the benefit of all Westmounters, rather than a vocal minority? Should Westmount's leash-free parks not be reserved for Westmount taxpayers? If these parks are so desirable, let other municipalities bear the cost and responsibility for their own.
- 3. Public safety and enforcement near Westmount Square: Westmount Square and the surrounding area have repeatedly been held hostage by demonstrators, many from outside our community, who show no respect for our laws or our residents' right to peace and security. This occurs with seeming impunity. What specific, actionable measures will you implement to curtail this disruption and ensure that our laws are enforced, with clear consequences for those who break them? Laws are only useful if they are enforced.
- 4. Parking, bike paths, and cyclist accountability: The city must not abandon hardworking, tax-paying homeowners who have lost their street parking to bike paths. The volume of potential use for these paths must be a primary criterion for their implementation. Furthermore, with new infrastructure comes new responsibility. To ensure safety for pedestrians, drivers and cyclists themselves, we must consider visible identification for bicycles to hold riders

accountable for traffic violations. The police must also consistently enforce existing helmet laws. Once again, laws are only useful if they are enforced.

These are not minor grievances; they are fundamental questions about safety, fiscal responsibility, and the quality of life in Westmount. The voters are listening. We expect and deserve your answers.

PROTESTS PERCEIVED AS HATEFUL DUE TO CHOICE OF LANGUAGE, SYMBOLS

In response to "Protesting peacefully a cornerstone of democracy" by Sasha Klein Charland! (September 23, p. 8).

I won't just call you wrong – slogans like this mean different things to different people – but I will say this clearly and firmly:

To many Jewish people around the world, the slogan "Free Palestine," and especially the chant "from the river to the sea," reads as a call to dismantle the state of Israel. That is unacceptable to us: Israel is our homeland with historical ties that go back thousands of years, and we will not agree to its erasure. For many, the phrase implies the removal of Jewish self-determination and even the elimination of Jewish presence from the land.

We have tried to help Palestinians in practical ways – providing work and security to people in Gaza at various times – but that does not change what happened on October 7.

Hamas carried out a brutal, premeditated attack on civilians, including sexual violence, mass murder and the taking of hostages. Those atrocities, and Hamas's deliberate use of civilian areas for its military infrastructure, make defending our citizens necessary and make it harder to protect innocent Palestinians caught in the crossfire. Hamas is supported and armed by Iran, and until its rule is ended, the cycle of violence will continue.

Israel today includes a significant Arab minority who live and vote within the state. We want the same freedoms and rights for Arabs throughout the region. Some diplomatic progress was being made through agreements like the Abraham Accords, but peace requires partners willing to renounce violence.

As Golda Meir asked, "How do you make peace with those that only want to kill you?" Israel has repeatedly sought peace and has been refused. The facts and the suffering on both sides are real, and misinformation only poisons the possibility of a lasting solution.

Many of these protests are perceived as hateful rather than peaceful because they go beyond advocating for Palestinian rights, and instead use language and sym-

bols that call for the destruction or removal of Jews and the state of Israel.

Chants like "From the river to the sea" or "Intifada revolution" may be framed by some as liberation slogans, but to Jews worldwide they signal a demand for the elimination of their homeland and, by extension, their existence in that land.

When protesters glorify or excuse terrorist attacks, refuse to condemn atrocities like October 7, or celebrate the suffering of Israeli civilians, it shifts from a call for justice to open endorsement of violence. A true peace movement centres on coexistence – but protests that deny one side's right to exist are not promoting peace. They are promoting hatred.



Jessica Winton enters council election race for District 2

At 24, she aims to provide a 'fresh perspective' for the future

Jessica Winton, a familiar questioner at city council meetings, recently declared her candidacy for city council in District 2. This is where she continues to live in her family home while pursuing graduate studies in urban planning at the University of Ottawa three days a week. She is also a citizen member of the city's Environment and Sustainability Committee.

"The main reasons I'm running are fairly simple in that after my experience on [this] committee, I saw firsthand the many shortcomings of city operations," she told the *Independent*. Being 24, "I think Westmount needs a perspective for the future rather than burying our head in the sand to the ongoing problems we face as a city. Despite Westmount being my home for over 15 years, I want to engage with the place I've fallen in love with more than before."

She said she hopes to "move [this] conversation forward" in being proactive as a councillor, "modernizing city services by bringing forward more community-focus-sed projects, improving city communication and following through on the city's re-

development plan for the southeast."

In this regard, "I would also mandate development of family-sized units to make up at least 35 percent of built units. The current 'shoebox' problem of downtown developments is they are overprized and often only able to fit a single person or couple."

She advocates for "unprecedented levels of transparency" with goals including "city operated non-market housing" (such as for seniors), creating a mandatory rental registry as an important and simple step for making housing more accessible to everyone as well as to create many community engagement efforts such as adding free services such as expanding community gardens.

Prepared to adjust schedule

Winton usually spends three days a week living in Gatineau to attend courses at the Graduate School of Public and International Affairs at the University of Ottawa. If elected, however, she says she "would probably" still have more time to devote to Westmount than many councillors who have "regular work and families." If the council work turns out to be more demanding, she said she would "adjust her courses."

When appointed last year by city council to the city's newly created environmental advisory committee, she referred to herself as "a younger voice" on the committee. She


was the only one of the five appointees who attended the council meeting (see story July 9, 2024, p. 13).

Winton was then a student in urban planning at Concordia and a research assistant as well as "an engagement lead" for Openwaste.ai. "This is a research project to develop an app that helps people identify and sort their waste in the best manner possible," she explains.


She won a lieutenant-governor's youth medal based on the sustainability-related projects she had led at Concordia. These include the first round of sustainability ambassadors leading a project called "Waste Invaders," a game about waste sorting. She is also president of Queer Concordia, an on-campus resource centre for trans and queer students.

At the University of Ottawa for an MSc in environmental sustainability, she said her research will focus on Canada's "waste management crisis" and its shortfalls compared to other countries. "Are our problems because of poor regulation or are there deeper social factors? I'll be happy to put it to paper very soon."

St. 4000 St. Catherine was formerly the Miso restaurant and, before that, a McDonald's. The *Independent* does not know precisely on whose land the fire started or occurred. Attempts to reach Resilience for comment October 6 were not successful.

Guy Lapointe Jr., division head of communications at the Montreal fire department, told the *Independent* by telephone on September 30, "In both cases [the fire has] the same 'origin'...

"What we saw on the scene was [consistent] with the description that we received on the 911 call...

has taken firm shape between the Independent's September 22 visit and its October 1 one. It makes use of material that was on site on the first occa-

"We don't go into how it started and we're not going to go as far as to determine if it was voluntary or not. Was it cooking? Was it a cigarette? We don't go into that."

Lapointe explained that "cause of a fire" and "origin of a fire" are distinctions in their lexicon.

"The *cause* – what specifically caused the fire – I'm not saying the cause is a homeless person. I'm saying the *origin* of

the fire was in a homeless person's tent...
"The cause would be what lit the fire and

"The cause would be what lit the fire and that I can't tell you because we don't know."

Lapointe told the *Independent*, "I know the Montreal police were going to do some checks. I don't know how far they went with that, so maybe they can give you more information."

SPVM spokesperson Julien Levesque told the *Independent* on September 29 that they had no report of a fire at 4000 St. Catherine on September 22 in their police files.

Lock your doors and windows, burglary victim says

A word of advice comes from a Westmount homeowner concerned about burglaries and break-ins.

"I just want people to be aware and not end up in the situation I was in," says Emily, whose home was recently accessed via an unlocked door.

The recent arrest of a serial-burglar who committed a string of break-ins in Westmount only drew her attention after her experience and she never thought it was something that could happen in her household.

"I had gone to bed early," she said, sharing her account.

Although most of the house's contents were untouched, her purse, which had been on the kitchen counter, was no longer there.

After wondering whether she'd merely forgotten it somewhere, including at her place of work, she came to the conclusion it had been stolen, along with a wallet containing a debit card.

By the time she was able to contact the bank and cancel the card, a \$300 debit had been run up on the card, in addition to a loss of \$300 in cash. However, because she promptly notified the bank, the debit loss

was replaced.

"I think everyone should definitely remember to lock their doors and check windows too," she said.

She suggested that a household alarm

system can be useful to stop or deter burglars, while noting it's also important not to leave anything valuable in the back yard as it can only serve as a temptation to would-be thieves passing by.

Distraction wallet thieves still active in Victoria village

Police at Station 12 are warning senior citizens and other potentially vulnerable people to hold tightly onto their wallets while shopping, following yet another distraction theft at a busy Victoria Ave. supermarket last week.

Since last year, the Victoria village Metro store has been among several local retail establishments that have found themselves assailed by teams of thieves and pick-pockets who steal wallets while distracting their victims.

Last April, the wallet of an 85-year-old woman was stolen in a Metro store aisle after she was approached by scammers. They then stole \$10,000 from one of her bank accounts after calling her on the

phone and fooling her into revealing her transaction card PIN.

Several more distraction thefts at other Vic village establishments were also reported in June.

In the latest incident, around one in the afternoon on September 27, an 80-year-old woman who was shopping in the Metro store left her purse sitting in her grocery cart while stepping away for a few moments.

According to Station 12 community relations officer Cst. Mike Yigit, a suspect is believed to have passed by at that moment and snatched the woman's wallet.



Note: The following article relates to the registration of deeds of sale for Westmount property in May 2025, gleaned from city sources. A list of sales can be found on p. 15.

Last month we bemoaned the low volume of real estate closings in Westmount, as only five deeds were signed for singlefamily houses, while six were signed for condominiums. But then suddenly notaries' offices were filled with buyers signing up to move into Westmount properties.

Twenty-seven house sales in Westmount is the highest monthly volume since June of 2021 when 28 homes changed hands, and that was the most since June

and July 2012, when 28 and 30 sales, respectively, were registered.

The 27 May sales tallied a price of \$68,183,000 for houses with municipal valuation (the 2023 assessment) of \$61,447,200, thus creating a mark-up of 11 percent, the strongest monthly mark-up since July last year.

Individual prices ranged from a low of \$1,320,000 for 181 Metcalfe Ave., the only remaining house on the east side of Metcalfe below St. Catherine St., to \$5,375,000 for 16 Braeside Place, near the top of that narrow street above The Boulevard. And while 181 Metcalfe sold for almost 50 percent more than its target value, that figure was topped by a 52-percent mark-up for one of the 1982 townhouses at 4893 de Maisonneuve Blvd., just east of Prince Albert Ave.

The biggest mark-down of 19.4 percent went for one of the declining number of bungalows on top of the mountain, this one at 69 Summit Crescent, which brought



Five condominium sales were registered in May, and with one more added to the list for April, we have recorded an even

dozen sales for the second quarter of 2025, with the June sales list still to come. The dozen condos hold an average price of \$1,081,900, down slightly from the average for the nine first-quarter sales, but the price:valuation ratio is +4.9 percent, while in the first quarter it was -0.5 percent.

Interesting 'others'

Some interesting "other" sales popped up in the deeds registered in May. The large "Heather Manor" apartment building at 239 Kensington Ave., just north of St. Catherine St., sold for \$24,350,000, some 33.8 percent above its municipal valuation.

A house that sold at 3777 Grey Ave. in NDG has a small piece of land at the back of its yard that happens to be in Westmount, part of what was once the driveway leading from Côte St. Antoine Rd. to the "Monklands" mansion that is now Villa Maria School.

Also sold were a triplex on Victoria Ave. north of Sherbrooke St., a fourplex on St. Antoine St. near Brooke Ave., and a commercial building at 4909-11 Sherbrooke St., west of Prince Albert Ave.

Fight not over, vows Cllr. Kez

Council votes to drop legal action against MTQ over sound barrier

The long legal fight by Westmount for a sound barrier along the Ville Marie Expressway (Route 136/720) came to an

abrupt and disappointing conclusion for many on October 1 when the outgoing city council at the last meeting of its mandate voted to accept legal advice and drop its challenge against KPH Turcot and the

delivering city services.

She said that when she first arrived in the mayor's office in 2017, "city hall's roof leaked, the windows had holes, the masonry was being held together by the vines, the greenhouse had collapsed, and the roads, sewers and parks all needed attention.

"We rolled up our sleeves, put our heads down and went to work."

She likened maintaining the city to doing the laundry: "Just when you've finished, there's always more waiting."

In light of the current municipal election campaign in progress, she also had a message for residents when council candidates are at their doors with various promises: "Ask how they plan to bring them to life."

Responding to questioner Diana Bruno of Springfield, Mayor Smith stated there were probably a record number of candidates in this election as well as electors in

the age demographic of 18 to 25 "facing incredible challenges." She urged residents to "get out and vote."

The eight councillors in turn thanked her for her leadership, led by Councillor Antonio D'Amico, who has occasionally voted against a council motion. He spoke first, thanking her for her "co-operation," followed by Jeff Shamie saying "you showed us it was important to dissent."

Conrad Peart said the mayor had led by example, while Anitra Bostock thanked the administration and Mary Gallery stated that the mayor had stayed "respectful, even when we disagree."

The question period included a thanks from city employees, followed by a resident's request for protective barriers around the under-construction Roslyn staircase leading from The Boulevard to the Roslyn lookout.

Richard Dufour of Anwoth, a frequent questioner, thanked the mayor for "always responding with respect."

Quebec Transport ministry (MTQ).

The reasons were listed in the council resolution as based on a joint analysis of noise levels conducted by SNC Lavalin (now Atkins Realis) and those for the MTQ, stating in a report from late this summer that "it appears from this analysis that the noise levels after the project are generally lower than before the project" some five vears ago.

"It was disappointing to learn that the sound measures taken after the newly constructed highway after year one and year five did not produce the results we were seeking," said District 8 councillor Kathleen Kez.

"Regardless, it is disheartening that in this day and age the MTQ is not obliged to

install a sound wall on our southern border even though they have one installed [for residents living on the south side of the

Now that there are no more legal proceedings, Kez added she is hoping "our MNA, Jennifer Maccarone, will push for a sound wall on our behalf at the provincial level." Kez said she "will continue to advocate for Maccarone "to push as hard as possible for this much needed sound wall. The current situation is unacceptable."

Going back to before legal action was instituted against the MTQ (see August 30, 2022, p. 4), affected residents had been asking to have a sound wall or barrier (see May 31, 2016, p. 1).

Gas leak at Wood/St. Catherine forces evacuation of Alexis Nihon shopping centre

A gas leak on St. Catherine near Wood Ave. forced the Alexis Nihon shopping centre to be evacuated the morning of September 30, and 2,000+ clients of Hydro Westmount were affected by the resulting preventative power outage.

The shopping mall is located at 1500 Atwater Ave. It is located between Atwater Ave., de Maisonneuve, St. Catherine and Wood Ave. The mall and its towers are mostly in Westmount, with a small part in Montreal's downtown/Ville Marie borough.

Streets surrounding Alexis Nihon were closed, and according to the city of Westmount's website, approximately 2,160 Hydro Westmount clients were affected by a resulting power outage (see story below).

Traffic! Police! Firefighters!

A large traffic jam resulted on many nearby streets, aggravated by existing watermain/road work on Greene below St. Catherine.

Montreal police spokesperson Jeanne Drouin said on September 30, "The fire department is in charge of this event. We are only doing the traffic. There is a large perimeter established around this gas leak."

The Independent spoke with Martin

Guilbault, division chief of the Montreal fire department, on September 30, asking him what prompted the shopping mall to be evacuated at 11 am that morning. He replied, "It was a gas leak due to people working on the street who cut a gas line...

"The exact location of where the gas line was cut was on the corner of Wood Ave., at St. Catherine."

"[The fire department] has to make sure that everyone is safe. That's why we evacuated Alexis Nihon Place and we're [allowing] Énergir to do their work to close that leak...

"Énergir is the organization who's responsible for the all the gas in [Montreal] right now. That's their job when these things happen."

On September 30, the *Independent* reached out to Mugisha Rutishisha, director of Communications at the city of Westmount, asking who had cut the gas line.

On the same day, he replied: "The work on-site was carried out by les Entreprises Ventec... At this time, the incident is still under investigation."

The *Independent* reached out to Les entreprises Ventec on October 2 asking for their account of how the gas line was cut. There was no response by the deadline that the *Independent* provided for them to respond.

Canada Post Strike: Contingency Plan for the Delivery of Voter Registration Cards

Gas leak at Wood/St. Catherine results in blackouts up to seven hours

A gas leak occurred on September 30 at Wood Ave., corner of St. Catherine, when an Énergir gas line was damaged during work on the sidewalk near the intersection. It left 2,160 customers affected by a power outage, some up to seven hours. (See above.)

Mugisha Rutishisha, director of the Communication department at the city of Westmount, provided a statement on October 1, explaining the reason for the power shutdown, when it was deployed and when power was restored.

"At around 11:30 am, Hydro Westmount received a request from the Service d'incendie de Montréal (SIM) to shut down and re-route certain power lines, supplying the area, to allow for evacuation and repair operations. Approximately 2,160 customers were affected during all or part of the resulting outage...

"At approximately 6 pm, Hydro Westmount received the green light from the SIM to restore power to the affected lines. By 6:45 pm, all affected customers had their power restored...

"Énergir completed the repair work on the gas line later in the evening."

Public Security reacts to gas leaks, Dawson College evacuated

Westmount Public Security was part of the detail of law enforcement officers blocking off streets during the gas leak on St. Catherine St. west of Atwater September 30 around 10:47 am.

The leak also caused the evacuation of Dawson College.

As crowds of students collected onto

Atwater, one was heard saying excitedly: "I can smell it!"

Another, smaller, gas leak October 2, at 8:50 am, was discovered by a Public Security patroller at Clarke and Sherbrooke. It was reported to have occurred when a subcontractor was working in front of 351-381 Clarke. Streets were blocked but re-opened around 10 am, Public Security officials said.

Pierre-Paul aspires to set Guinness record for kite-flying height

A Westmount resident has plans to apply to Guinness World Records after flying a kite one afternoon this summer over Westmount Park to what he estimates may be some kind of a new record for kite-flying height.

In mid-August, according to Deguerlain Pierre-Paul's account, he was flying from a position around the centre of a playing field in Westmount Park.

While Canadian drone-flying regulations oblige drone owners (regarded as pilots) to obtain a permit from Transport Canada, there are no such rules for kites, he said.

"The kite went higher than a helicopter passing by," he maintained, while estimating the altitude at around two kilometres. Although he believes he may have set a record, he acknowledged he hasn't any proof, but hopes to make another attempt that can be submitted to officials from Guinness World Records.

According to the Guinness World Records website, the record for the undisputed highest altitude by a single kite was set in September 2014 in Australia by Robert Moore, who reached an altitude of 4,879.54 metres or 4.9 km. There is no mention of records set on a regional or country-bycountry basis.

Originally from Haiti, where kite-flying is pursued passionately as a hobby, Pierre-Paul, 53, custom-builds many of his own kites, although he also flies ones that can be purchased in specialty stores.

"Through the years, I've developed my own technique," he said, noting that improvisation is an important part of building successful kites. As there are few toy stores

in the Caribbean nation, Haitian children learn how to make their own fun through kites, he added.

At one time, Pierre-Paul also took part

in kite fighting, a more advanced form of the hobby with a strong following in Asia and South America. It uses sharp-edged kite-control lines, sometimes with razor blades attached, allowing flyers to compete aggressively while trying to cut the lines of rival kites.

Although he often assembles handmade kites from materials, including wooden pieces and thin plastic wrap purchased for less than a dollar in discount stores, one Montreal kite expert charges \$100 just to repair store-bought, professional quality kites and sells them for many times more, according to Pierre-Paul.

In a high-tech age like ours when so many tasks are being accomplished with the help of miniature devices linked wirelessly to a smartphone app, Pierre-Paul flies his kites with a relatively simple gadget: a handheld spool equipped with nylon fishing line, which he said is "perfect for kite flying."

Cash stolen from store at night

In spite of numerous attempts by police at Station 12 to make sure store operators in Westmount don't leave cash behind after closing hours, some merchants are still finding out on their own the reason why.

With that said, a Victoria Ave. store lost several hundred dollars of the previous day's sales proceeds after thieves managed to break in through a rear door and take what was in the cash register.

"To get in, they forced the door in the back, they walked in and they stole about \$300 from the cash [register]," Cst. Yigit said regarding the 8:30 pm September 27 incident. Nothing else was taken besides the money.

He suggested that if merchants don't want to immediately take the day's cash proceeds to a bank's night deposit drop, they should at least remove the money from the cash register where it is most conspicuous and conceal it somewhere inside the store.

It's worth noting that many store owners routinely leave the cash register open and empty, while placing the cash drawer in a place where it can be seen from outside, such as in a front window, so that would-be thieves get the message there's nothing of value in the store.




