Good news appears to be unfolding for users of Westmount's pool. The Independent has learned the facility may be kept open this summer during the start of the \$37-million arena/pool project.

Councillor Patrick Martin, who chairs the project committee, said before press time Monday that given the current construction timeframe, there appeared to be no advantage to demolishing the pool this summer as planned, even though other



preparatory work could start in June or

"Therefore, out of respect for pool users and nearby residents, I am recommending to my colleagues that the pool remain open," he explained. The pool would otherwise be closed for two summers.

"In any case, the target date for opening the new pools would be summer 2013," he said.

# City: Pension plan now unsustainable, under review

Westmount's employee pension plan is considered to be unsustainable and is now under review to align it with today's economic reality, the Independent learned last

The cost of the plan is expected to cost taxpayers \$1.7 million this year in regular contributions, bringing the average employee cost to more than \$70,000 in salary and fringe benefits, according to figures provided by the city on request.

These will account for almost \$21 million, half the city's budgetted spending on local services. And this is before the \$1.2-million special allocation to help make up the pension fund's actuarial deficit.

"Westmount has one of the most generous and expensive pension plans of the demerged municipalities," said HR director Alan Kulaga, who chairs the city's Pension committee. "This is no longer sustainable or equitable ..... for taxpayers." continued on p. 6

# Traffic lights re-configured at Victoria, standardized

The cycle of traffic lights at Sherbrooke and Victoria has been reconfigured to standardize the sequence with other intersections, improve pedestrian safety and correct the east-west progression of traffic.

The adjustment was made January 28 based on concerns raised by Lansdowne Ave. resident Richard Lock (see December

# Storm causes slippery hills, Clarke closed

Last Wednesday's snowstorm, February 2, and the first major one of 2011, caused slippery hills in Westmount, including the closure of Clarke Ave. twice due to acci-

While the city had five salt trucks on the road (one more than usual), they too were caught up in morning rush-hour traffic and the intensity of the driving snow, said director general Duncan Campbell.

The first accident caused a minor injury when two cars collided on Clarke near the south intersection of Anwoth Rd., according to Public Security. Officers were called to the scene at 7:49 am along with the fire department and Urgences Santé. The hill was blocked off while salting took place.

It was closed again just after 11 am when a southbound taxi hit a parked car near the same location and ended up facing north and becoming stuck in a snow bank.

"The biggest issue was how quickly the snow was coming down," explained Greg McBain of Public Security, who was in attendance at the second accident scene.

trians to cross in all directions immediately after east-west traffic is stopped at the red light, confirmed Public Works director Marianne Zalzal, who chairs the city's Administrative Traffic committee.

Previously the pedestrian lights followed green signals for southbound traffic on Victoria to turn left (east). This often resulted in a backlog of cars continuing to turn after the onset of the pedestrian sig-

It standardizes the sequence with other lights on Sherbrooke at Claremont and Prince Albert, and creates a more orderly flow of traffic, she explained.

She said Hydro Westmount discovered that only a simple correction to the controller mechanism was required to make the change. Tweaking of the light at Grosvenor was expected to follow shortly.



# Pension changes won't affect current pensioners

continued from p. 1

Employees pay 9 percent of salary into the defined-benefit (guaranteed) pension plan while the city contributes 11.6 percent of salary.

The current formula enables an employee with 30 years service to retire at age 50 with 75 percent of salary averaged over the last three years.

Costs aside, the plan runs counter to the long-term retention of employees who are retiring when their experience and talent are most valuable to the city, Kulaga said. Many then go on to work elsewhere.

#### **Exploring changes**

As a result, the city has been exploring ways to modify the pension formula following an actuarial evaluation of the pension fund last year, Kulaga said, that revealed a deficit of \$15.6 million.

A preliminary report from the administration is expected to be filed with the city council for review by the end of the first quarter.

"I want to make it very clear that any changes would not affect current pensioners, whose pensions are safe and secure,"

Kulaga said. "Neither would they apply to years of service already accumulated by active employees. We're only talking about future service from the date any changes might be adopted.

"Our aim is to make the plan more equitable for taxpayers who have to support this program, and as part of that to address the issue of reducing the future liability related to it."

The city granted successive improvements to the plan in the 1980s and 1990s because of the pension fund surplus. The city even took a contributions holiday. At the time, the economy was strong and returns on investment were high, Kulaga explained.

Among the plan's features is the "80 factor" that enables employees to retire once their combined total of age and years of service reaches 80.

Another is using the three last years of salary (usually the highest) as an average on which to base the pension.


The Westmount plan also has a bridging benefit that adds 0.5 percent to the basic pension formula of 2-percent per years of service. "The intention here was to provide a bridge between the age at employees' retirement and their 65th birthday when other government programs kick in," Kulaga said.

#### Merger added costs

Contributing to the cost of the program was a 30-to-40 percent increase in salaries during the merger years with Montreal, "which has a big impact in determining retirement benefits."

"With the economic meltdown in 2008 and the number of baby boomers reaching retirement, the city is no longer in a financial position to be able to offer such a

generous formula," Kulaga said. "At the same time, it has to bring pensions back in line with what's reasonable and equitable in today's financial reality."

Defined-benefit pension plans are coming to an end because they are no longer sustainable, he explained. These are plans in which the employer is responsible for making up any shortfall, including ones due to underperformance of invested funds.

"The trend in the private sector has been to move toward defined-contribution plans in which the employee has more responsibility and assumes more of the risk," he explained. "But the public sector has been slow to follow."

The negative impact on municipalities was brought to the fore recently by ballooning employee costs and pension fund shortfalls affecting Montreal and agglomeration budgets. The cost of a Montreal/agglo worker's salary and fringe benefits has been reported at \$100,000.

This resulted in Westmount mayor Peter Trent urging Montreal mayor Gérald Tremblay to solicit action from the Quebec government to help municipalities revise their pension programs (see story January 11, p. 3).

"A concerted effort between municipal and provincial authorities would certainly speed up the implementation of necessary corrective measures," Kulaga said.



A: I loved my experience there...looked forward to going every day, and if it had been possible, I would have attended every week of the summer.


Q: What were your favourite activities, and do you still enjoy those activities as an adult today?

A: I always hope our Westmount Y day camp experience will be a little bit about what kids learn (in our case, swimming lessons are the focus of their "learning"), but a lot more about how they feel while they are learning. I want camp to be a place where kids feel accepted, encouraged, and valued by their counsellors and

# Two local SAQs due to close this spring

The Société des alcools du Québec's (SAQ) headquarters in Montreal has confirmed that its Classique store in Westmount Square and its Sélection store at the Pepsi Forum on St. Catherine St. will be closing in the spring.

Though the representative could not confirm a specific date of closure, she said that both outlets would be closed by April. The reasons given for the closure are the expansion of the SAQ branch on the corner of Victoria and Sherbrooke. "The newly renovated outlet will replace the two smaller outlets and will offer a more comprehensive service, for example tastings, as well as a wider range of goods," said another customer service representative.

SAQ employees at the Westmount Square outlet were asked not comment by management about the closure of the store. Shop manager, Julie Côté, did however emphasize that all staff were being relocated to an SAQ outlet of their choice and that no one would be losing their jobs.

"Current staff can choose which SAQ they want to go to once it closes here," she said.

Alexandre Joly, treasurer of the SAQ employees' union, the Syndicat des employé(e)s de magasins et de bureaux de la SAQ, (SEMB SAQ), spoke against the closure of the two outlets saying that the SAQ's attitude is "unacceptable" and that their reasons for closing the Westmount branches are "poorly justified." He expressed concern about part-time employees who may not be so easily accommodated in the relocation of staff, and added that in recent meetings SAQ senior management has talked about "optimizing rental costs" and foresees the closure of other small SAQ outlets.

Joly said he felt it is important to keep the smaller local outlets open as they benefit surrounding businesses.
