Boeckh foundation creates Samarthji Lal award

Symposium to highlight mental health breakthroughs

BY LAUREEN SWEENEY

What is being billed as a cutting-edge symposium on mental health is bringing together key global researchers May 26 to seek new directions in the field spearheaded by Westmount investment forecaster Tony Boeckh.

"To our knowledge, this is the first time in Canada an event of this level will feature such a star-studded line-up of world class mental health researchers," said Boeckh.

The occasion will also recognize the work of the late Dr. Samarthji Lal, another Westmounter, through the inauguration of a newly created research award in his name by Graham Boeckh Foundation.

The "Frontiers in Mental Health Symposium" is co-sponsored by the Graham Boeckh Foundation, of which Tony Boeckh is president, and the Toronto-based Gairdner Foundation.

It takes place at the Centre Mont-Royal with the aim of highlighting effective research outcomes.

Pitiful payoff

"Until now, billions of dollars have been put into research with pitiful pay-

off," Boeckh told the *Independent*. This is largely because government funding tends to be conservative and focuses on incremental results.

"We need to aggressively seek out new and better treatments, and channel our resources into areas where the probability of breakthroughs is the highest," he said. "To get breakthroughs, we need to tap into the smartest researchers in the world."

Many of these will be presenting at the symposium, which is open to all health-care professionals and others interested in mental health issues by advance registration without charge.

Doidge to speak

Expected to attract an even wider public is a concluding lecture at 5:15 pm by Norman Doidge, author of *The Brain that Changes Itself*, who will address the brain's ability to compensate for damaged portions.

"This is the biggest breakthrough in understanding the brain," Boeckh said. Doidge's lecture, he said, "will blow people's minds – no pun intended. It will capture their imagination, especially regarding stroke and Alzheimer's."

The Graham Boeckh Foundation was founded by Tony Boeckh in memory of his eldest son, a Westmount graduate of LCC, whose death in 1986, at age 22, due to schizophrenia was a catalyst in the foundation's *continued on p. 25*

Parade gone, inflatable games added

Upcoming Family Day geared to changing times

This year's Westmount Family Day is expected to start with a bang on May 28. But not to the traditional sound of drums.

After 35 years, the dwindling parade has been abandoned in favour of a rousing start of activities at the same time throughout Westmount Park at 10 am, said Claude Danis, the city's program and community services coordinator.

The parade, which traditionally started off at 9:30 am, had begun to wane in recent years, she explained. It attracted fewer participants and was becoming logistically challenging to organize.

"So, we're changing with the times and starting off with a real bang," she said. "This means the park will be the place to be at 10 o'clock."

That's when races take off, face painting starts, the petting zoo and pony rides

begin and five inflatable games will start up – an increase over the three of last year. And that's also by popular demand.

The Scouts' climbing wall, the army's aerial runway over the lagoon and many exhibits of community groups will also be featured. Police will provide baby-seat installation and checks (see p. 10).

At lunchtime, people will be able to buy refreshments, including the traditional hot dogs and drinks from Girl Guides and Scouts.

Novelty races kick off the afternoon program highlighted by the carnival booths in which "everyone's a winner," Danis pointed out. While most of the main attractions will continue through to 4 pm, the petting zoo and pony rides will wind down by 2 pm.

A schedule of events is expected to be delivered to all households.

Tour de l'Île to bring hundreds of cyclists into Westmount

PRESSURING WESTMOUNT

The water pressure in our area has been drastically increased in recent weeks.

Upon investigation, I discovered that within the 200 Lansdowne building alone, several residents have incurred expensive plumbing repairs due to extreme water pressure. Upon contacting the Westmount Public Works department to obtain answers, I was passed around from one fonctionnaire to another.

The only useful information and ultimately the solution was supplied by Westmount Plumbing, and consequently our building is in the process of installing a system that will control and reduce the pressure.

I was told the normal water pressure should be approximately 80 pounds per square inch. Pipes, fixtures and valves are calibrated to that level.

We are currently receiving anywhere from 130 to 150 pounds of pressure. The consequences can be expensive and far reaching, such as breakage of various plumbing fixtures, valves, pipes, etc. Safety valves on hot water tanks are calibrated to 125 pounds pressure.

The city of Montreal, which manipulates the water system, "according to their needs on various construction projects," has never advised us of their actions.

Worse, Westmount Public Works was aware of both the cause and consequence,

yet never published any public notice or advised people how they can prevent expensive disasters from happening. Whether this was through negligence, ignorance or non-caring is almost irrelevant.

It is a frightening thought that the same people are in charge of constructing a \$40-million arena complex! And if the same level of incompetence exists, this does not bode well for the future of this or any other project.

Councillor Cynthia Lulham, commissioner of Parks and Urban Planning, replies: "The need for such a card is to make it easier to check dogs carrying Westmount dog tags. It was felt that the Public Security officer would not have to physically examine the collar on the dog if the owner were carrying this card. Not all dogs are open to being approached by our personnel, and this would reduce the chances of being bitten while the officers are carrying out their responsibilities. This applies particularly in the dog runs where the animals are not on a leash and checking the tags is difficult."

BIXI NEEDS HELMETS

Last week's announcement that Bixi bikes will be available in Westmount raises the question of bicycle helmets.

I understand they're not mandatory in Quebec, but I think there's a general consensus that they do provide major protection for the cyclist.

While most regular cyclists probably do wear helmets, I think it would be reasonable to assume that the casual renter wouldn't carry (or even own) one. Given the furor that erupted earlier this week over the dooring accident on Van Horne (in which the cyclist, reportedly, wasn't wearing a helmet), has anyone stopped to

consider the implications of so many more people, some with only limited cycling experience, riding around without one?



Arena skeptics distribute flyer

Compost to be moved to plant exchange

Any city compost leftover from the distribution Saturday, May 13, is expected to be moved to the site of the arena for the Perennial Plant Exchange this Wednesday, May 18, according to Public Works officials. Shovels will also be provided but anyone wanting compost should bring their own bags.

Arena plan opposition has gone old school – the door-to-door delivery of flyers

Residents of Westmount received a single sheet of paper in their mailboxes starting May 12 opposing the arena/pool plan. The unsigned, English-language flyer asks residents whether they are "concerned about the financial, social, environmental, traffic and security problems of this minimum \$37 million" project. It then encourages them to sign a petition on the web by searching for "Change Westmount Arena Plan." The first site that comes up using those search words on Google is the www.ipetitions.com signup sponsored by Save the Park! (See story, April 26, p. 5).

Save the Park! spokesman Patrick Barnard told the *Independent* that both the organization and other supporters had provided the funds for the flyer. He also said that, for reasons of economy, only the "H3Z" postal prefix (Westmount below Sherbrooke) had been targeted and that the mailing was expected to be completely distributed by May 16, the same day he was contacted. He had seen a bump in the petition results after each of the first two distribution days. The petition had 294 signatories at 10 am that day.

Is Barnard optimistic about changing council's plans? He is upbeat, while refusing to make predictions. The matter is "now in the hands of a large number of people" as opposed to smaller group of interested people, he said. "It's a dynamic

And what kind of result is he looking for: a reversal by council, a waiting period or something else? "Transparency."

The new arena/pool plan now has a project manager, Genivar Inc., and a

fundraising advisor, Colleen MacKinnon (see stories April 26 and May 10, p. 1). The city is preparing a package for bidders and could choose a contractor by September. Groundbreaking could also be that month, after the pool closes for the summer, with the possibility of some preparatory work being done beforehand.

Garneau steps up in the interim

Westmount-Ville Marie MP Marc Garneau wants to help rebuild the Liberal Party of Canada and says he can do it as its interim leader.

Garneau, who won by a 658-vote margin over NDP candidate Joanne Corbeil in the May 2 election, last week announced his intentions after Michael Ignatieff lost his seat in Etobicoke-Lakeshore and stepped down as party leader.

"Obviously we just suffered a humbling defeat, and we need to rebuild and we need an interim leader," Garneau said.

"I do not aspire to be a permanent leader but I do have a set of skills to help with the rebuilding process, which starts with choosing an interim leader."

Those skills come from his tenure as president of the Canadian Space Agency, where he was responsible for a number of projects, a \$300 million-a-year budget and a staff of 700.

Garneau certainly has his work cut out for him. Canadians sent a strong message that virtually decimated the Liberals, giving them only 34 seats in the house of commons, the fewest number in the party's history. "We need a number of things to do to gain the credibility that has eroded over the last few years," he says.

"We are at the crossroads in the life of our party. We're up against the wall, and I felt a strong personal motivation to do as much as I could to help. I think the interim job will be particularly crucial."

As for his responsibilities in his own riding, Garneau could not say for sure how the added role as interim leader would affect his availability to constituents.

"I might be called upon to travel more and most certainly I would be [travelling more], but I think I would still be a good MP for Westmount-Ville Marie."

Since the election, he has been asked if he will run for party leader, but Garneau says he's not interested.

"I wanted to help improve the image of politics and it was never my intention to run for party leadership. It was my intention to be a good and competent MP."

To date, no one else has come forward to vie for the interim leader position, although there is still time. The party has until May 30 to make its selection, which will be done as soon as the caucus meets, "probably in the next 10 days."


Duncan, who succeeded McDougall as president of the WMA and regards him as a mentor, "he regenerated the WMA as a viable organization to represent citizens outside of council."

McDougall, who had grown up in Westmount, moved with his wife after the demerger to a pied-a-terre in the trendy St. Ambroise district. They spent much of their time at homes in the Eastern Townships and the Laurentians.



date for the main piling, with the exception of a smaller month-long project slated for August near the Vendôme train station.

Chebl couldn't speak for the planned installation of the Shriners Hospital for Children which, he said, will be built in Block A, located in the southwestern section of the site. The MUHC's Children's Hospital has been modified to accommodate the addition, though more piling will likely be needed given the quality of the soil. There were no estimates for when the Shriners project will start, though media reports have indicated construction will begin this coming fall.

"It just seems to be getting longer and longer and longer," Westmounter Wanda Potrykus told Chebl during the meeting. "First we were given one date, then another date and then it was May. Now we're in May and we don't have an exact date. If it's going to be Christmas, tell us Christmas."

Potrykus, a York St. resident, said she struggles to rent out her apartments. While knocking on the table methodically, she added, "it drives you nuts. I don't know how the people on the site do it."


Chebl said piling is a very special activity that "you cannot have control over like you do, for example, concrete work."

stallation, needed to accommodate the hospital and mitigate area flooding, was delayed by rain and, like the piling, some unforeseen technical difficulties. Also, the contractor working on Decarie Blvd. nearly went bankrupt, he explained, meaning a new crew will be brought in with only 20 percent of the work complete.

Citing environmental concerns and frustrating congestion, Westmounter Maureen Kiely suggested somebody be hired to direct traffic at problematic intersections. Montreal city officials said they would consider her suggestion, though they quickly changed subjects without elaborating.

In other news, Pierre Major, the MUHC's associate director of facilities development and construction, said the MUHC has been working with Quebec's minister of Municipal Affairs in an effort to force Westmount to allow construction workers to access the site via Glen Rd. Westmount's zoning specifically allows the gated route to be used only in emergency situations.

MUHC site, underground playing, Lemay's selection

Councillor Patrick Martin, the chair of the recreation centre committee, has invited Westmounters to write him with questions and comments about the project and plan.

For reasons of space, Councillor Martin has paraphrased the questions.

Why not on MUHC's eastern portion?

The MUHC hospital has again recently reaffirmed that it does not intend to build on the Westmount side of the site (south of the CPR tracks) and that it wishes to keep it as a green space. Why could Westmount not have bought land there to develop the arena pool project? We would have saved the underground construction expenses. Also, the city has access rights from the Glen Rd. and, furthermore, an underground passage already exists near Westmount railway station.

Although the MUHC does not intend to build immediately on the Westmount portion of its land, it is holding it in reserve for future expansion. It is not for sale. We have checked with them, twice.

In any case, as we all can hear every morning starting at about 7:30 am, construction in the MUHC area requires the driving of deep piles due to the poor quality of the soil. It would be expensive. And, of course, it would cost about \$5 million to buy the land if it were for sale, further adding to the project cost.

The recreation centre project site under the southwest corner of Westmount Park is indeed the best location for our new building, as it sits on soil of good bearing capacity, and it allows the economies of scale of proximity to other community facilities.

As for the underground passage near the railway station, this is somewhat of an urban myth. In fact, the old Victoria Ave. railway station once had a narrow passageway under the tracks to the south side for eastbound commuters, but it is now in poor condition and is subject to water infiltrations. It is owned by the railway, which would be highly reluctant to allowing its use for non-railway purposes, under their precious tracks above. — PM

Yes, of course they will. The fact that the roof of the new ice rinks will be grass and trees and tennis courts will make it a very special place. The ice surface will not be much lower than that of the Lachine arena, and not as deep as some others in Montreal. There are many newly built underground gymnasiums, including ones in Westmount, that are very popular. Going underground is becoming a standard for new sports facilities in densely populated urban areas. — PM

How was Lemay selected?

I would like to obtain the following information concerning the project: with regard to the selection of the architectural firm, was open competition considered for selection?

The selection of the project architects was undertaken a few years ago, under the previous council. At that time, the standard procedure of the city of Westmount for the selection of professional services firms was followed. It involved the preparation of detailed terms of reference including the expected scope of the project (the "programme"), and a widely published invitation to bidders, open to all firms having a licence to practise in Quebec. Twelve groups of consultants responded. The interested architects were expected to team up with engineering firms to complement their bid with expertise in structural, electrical and mechanical engineering. A proposal evaluation committee composed of senior relevant city staff declared Lemay & Assoc the winners, together with their team's engineering firms CIMA+ and BPR.

At the time, some consideration had

been given to an open competition, whereby as a first step, there is an open invitation to all architectural firms to submit their qualifications for a project of this type, and the city's evaluating committee then selects between three and five firms as having the best presentations. These latter firms are then each given a budget to develop a concept, in competition with each other. A jury panel then must be set

up to evaluate and compare various proposed concepts, and a winner selected. It can be a time-consuming and expensive process, and often controversial. Westmount rather adopted the traditional route for selection of architects. — PM


Little change was reported in the incidence of crime in Westmount during March with the trend continuing into April, according to local police Station 12 commander Stéphane Plourde.

Many Westmounters who had come to know the station's lieutenant, Pierre Liboiron – the second-in-command – may be interested to know he has received a promotion and has left the station after seven years, Plourde said.

Liboiron is now the acting commander of Groupe Éclipse, an anti-gang squad formed in 2008 but recently reoriented to target criminals in general "since street gangs are no longer a problem."

"Pierre was well known in the community, all the time adjusting to different leadership styles under four different station commanders," Plourde explained. "He had the mindset of a commander and never counted his hours." He served under Patrick Lalonde, Shuster, Michel Wilson and Plourde.

Liboiron was thanked in absentia for his service to Westmount during the May 3 city council meeting by Public Security commissioner Gary Ikeman.

Until a successor is chosen, Sgt. Marie-Claude Dandenault will be assuming his responsibilities.

Family Day to feature baby seat check

Representatives of the police department's mounted squad will mingle on horseback with those attending Westmount Family Day on Saturday, May 28, Plourde said.

Officers from Station 12 will also park a cruiser on site for visitors to "inspect" up close. As well, Community Relations officer Adalbert Pimentel will be available to

discuss crime prevention issues.

Police will also help install baby seats or check out those already in place. "It's important for people to take a new seat out of its box first so it is ready to be attached," he said. "We don't want to be given a baby seat that's all packaged."

Proper use of car seats can be complicated depending of the size and age of the child and the type of car involved.

Working with Inuit visitors

Following the move April 10 of Nunavik House into the YMCA refugee residence (the former Reddy Memorial Hospital) on Tupper St., police have been working with those in charge to help familiarize the visitors – patients who come to Montreal from the far north for medical treatment and their caregivers.

"We're working on a brochure and a video to show them what to expect of big city life before they arrive here," Plourde said. "They can be targetted as easy victims of theft or other crimes because they tend to trust people and often come to Montreal with larger amounts of money for shop-

"We want them to be safe and return home with good memories of Montreal."







Westmount Profile: Maureen Kiely

Uniting career with community service

What is it that drives a busy healthcare professional like Maureen Kiely to become so persistently and doggedly involved in community causes over three decades?

"It comes through from my family," she says. "My father was involved in everything."

And her penchant for detail comes from "rigorous scientific thinking" that developed through her training and career as a researcher in psychiatry – which requires precision and accuracy, she explains.

"I try never to ask a question unless I have a reason to – even if you may not agree with my reasons. And the same questions keep on presenting themselves over the years," adds the regular city council meeting attender.

With the title of McGill assistant professor in psychiatry and MUHC medical scientist, Kiely has spent most of her career after 1978 working at the Montreal General in collaboration with her husband, the late Dr. Samarthji Lal, a prominent biological psychiatrist in Montreal,

who has himself been honored recently (see story p. 1).

Neverthless, Kiely made time to serve on the board of the Westmount Municipal Association (WMA), the city's now defunct Citizens' Traffic Advisory Committee and the board of the Municipal Housing Bureau in Westmount. She was a demerger "foot soldier" and is currently a member of the Healthy City Project's Community Life Committee.

It's the new MUHC superhospital, however, that is uppermost in her mind these days. She's a driving force behind two community organizations dedicated to integrating the Glen campus into the surrounding neighbourhoods of Westmount, NDG and St. Henri.

Kiely serves as the WMA representative on both: the CIQ (Concertation interquartiers) and CURA (Community-University Research Alliance). The latter is a committee for which she helped secure a \$1-million grant and into which she successfully brought psychosocial researchers from the Douglas Hospital.

As a result, it's primarily for these con-

tributions that Kiely is being honoured by the WMA this Wednesday (May 18) as its Volunteer of the Year and recipient of the Derek Walker Award.

She considers her input to both MUHC groups to be her number one volunteer accomplishment, partly because of the impact they are having on the WMA's outreach to other community groups. "CIQ and CURA have allowed the WMA to move in new directions. The current di-

alogues with St. Henri and NDG concern serious issues that will affect our communities for decades to come.

"The impact of the Turcot reconstruction and the superhospital on our three communities will be enormous."







financial means. Students at Westmount Park Elementary can also make a written request for a computer should they need one themselves.

The computer refurbishment program was the idea of Allan Kabelansky of Redfern. Kabelansky is an engineer by profession. "I wanted to get the public interested in open-source software instead of needlessly spending money," he said. Kabelansky has already successfully started the after-school refurbishment program at Roslyn School, which has now been running for two years.

'Making it useful again'

The computers refurbished by the Techno Titanz are donated by McGill and Concordia University. "You can take something that would have been thrown in the garbage and just by fixing it make it useful again," said Kabelansky.







creation of a McGill chair in schizophrenia studies in 1997 at the Douglas Hospi-

The decision to create the annual Samarthji Lal prize is a step toward encouraging research breakthroughs, Boeckh said. It's a \$25,000 award to be accorded yearly to a mid-level researcher in mental health.

Lal was co-founder of the Douglas Hospital Mental Health University Institute and founder of the Brain Bank at the Douglas, the only one still in existence in Canada. He was director of the McGill Centre for Studies in Schizophrenia at the time of his death in 2009.

'Sam Lal was instrumental in helping us set up the chair in schizophrenia – and after he died, because he was so well known, we created the prize in his name."

Coincidentally, Lal's widow, medical scientist Maureen Kiely who collaborated with him, is being honoured this week by the Westmount Municipal Association as its Volunteer of the Year for her community service (see profile, p. 16).

Foundation expands

Since its start 25 years ago, the foundation has developed progressively to the point where it now has a full-time executive director, Inez Jabalpurwala, who has played a key role in creating the symposium and increasing the foundation's stature, Boeckh explained.

"We are also leading the Science of Science for Mental Health Research Network with RAND Europe, world experts in health policy on pay-back from cardiovascular and arthritis funding. The think-tank will now take on the mental health challenge."

The foundation is also forging partnerships, such as the one with the Gairdner Foundation, which awards prestigious

prizes in health sciences that are international in scope. Many of the recipients have gone on to win Nobel prizes.

Boeckh is also vice-chair of Brain

Canada, an organization that has just obtained \$100 million to match donations related to neurological and mental health disor-

On a more personal note, he said it took time after his son's death to be able to speak out publicly on schizophrenia. "Mental health has been the orphan of the health care system because the stigma was people trying to get

housing and jobs."

Hopefully, this will change, he said, with high profile events such as the Frontiers in Mental Health Symposium, as well

as effective research funding and the development of new treatments and understanding.

Police Beat

Burglar breaks in, finds empty cash register

A burglar who broke into the Restaurant Kashima was greeted with frustration – an empty cash register.

Police say the break-in occurred at 6:45 am on May 5. The restaurant's owner received the news from his alarm company and headed to 1232 Greene Ave.

"When he got there he saw the lock from the front door was missing, so he called the police," said Constable Adalbert Pimentel. "The officers entered and found the cash register, which had been ripped from the counter and was lying on the floor."

The register was open and empty. The burglar caused approximately \$150 in damage.

"But it could have been worse, and this owner did a good thing by making sure his register was empty," said Pimentel. "Business owners should not only make sure there is no money in the register, but they should leave the register open. That way, anyone looking into their business can see

there is no cash on the premises, and it will dissuade potential burglars from breaking in."

The suspect was caught on a security camera. He could be seen leaving the restaurant and walking south along Greene before getting into a Chrysler Sebring. The car drove off, also heading south on Greene.

The suspect is described as a white male, 45, 6'1" and 165 lbs. He had brown hair, brown eyes and a small beard. He wore a red and black baseball cap, a black leather jacket and blue jeans.

Apartment cleaned out

An Olivier Ave. apartment tenant returned to his home to discover a burglar had cleaned out the place.

The tenant left his home at 8:30 am and returned at 2:30 pm on May 10. When he tried to open his door, he realized the lock was broken, and the door swung open.

"There were marks on the door, which were traces of a forced entry," said Pimentel. "When he got inside, he saw the apartment had been thoroughly searched."

Missing were a set of golf clubs, an HP laptop computer, a Sony digital camera, sunglasses and two bomber jackets.

"Our officers canvassed the area, but there were no witnesses." said Pimentel.

Laptops stolen from office

The police aren't sure how a suspect stole some laptop computers from a business at 4124 St. Catherine St.

The building's alarm went off at 5:15 pm on May 7, and the police responded to the scene.

"The officers saw that everything was properly closed; there was no sign of a break-in and no one responded to the intercom," said Pimentel. "The business' owner showed up and opened the front door. The only two items taken were a pair of Apple laptop computers."

The owner told police the suspects appeared to know exactly where they were going and that nothing else was stolen.



an interest in west-end heritage in general.


