Still arriving after deadline

City deluged with flood claims



Even though the deadline had come and gone June 13 for notices of claim against the city emerging from the flash flood on May 29, the city was being inundated with new ones last week.

It's the postmark on the envelope rather than the arrival date that counts, said assistant city clerk Nancy Gagnon.

By June 20, the city had received more than 160 notices of the intention to file a claim, and more were expected, she said. This is believed to be the most received by the city for any one incident since the flood of 1987. At that time, she said, city staff continued on p. 4


Pigeon, groundhog taken to SPCA

Stone cliff helps define new design

Demo hearing called for July 9 on 42 Belvedere Rd.

A demolition hearing is slated to take place July 9 at city hall for 42 Belvedere Rd., a house overlooking the city on the north side of the winding street as its zigzags into a continuation of Sunnyside.

The house is built into the site of the old quarry that once supplied much of the stone used to build Westmount houses.

The tall rock cliff that rises at the northeast corner of the property "contributes to the unique character of the site" and helps define the planned enlarging of the home, according to the public demolition file opened last week at city hall.

While the basics of the existing house are to remain intact in its redesign, more than 50 percent of the façade is to be removed, which requires the issuing of a demolition permit.

Plans call for the current two-storey single-family dwelling to have a third floor contained within a sloped roof with dormers. As well, an L-shaped addition would be built at the northeast corner and the garage repositioned to conceal visibility of the door from the street.

The new design with a peaked roof is seen as harmonizing well with the streetscape and will use the same Ashley stone cladding. The work has an estimated cost of some \$750,000.

While the existing house is considered to be in good condition and judged to have "significant value" as a heritage Category II building, it is not deemed to have historic value or to be an "outstanding" architectural example of the modern era.

These are factors described as playing a role in the decision of the city's Planning Advisory Committee (PAC) May 29 to recommend the preliminary building plan to the demolition committee.


The PAC found the new plan integrates well into the streetscape and acknowledges the presence of the rock cliff.

Designed originally in 1936 by Norton Fellowes, who lived in Westmount, its redesign is being undertaken by Westmount architect Paul Grenier, a member of the PAC, who as a result, has been excusing himself from the design review, according to minutes of PAC meetings.

Sidewalk opened for walk-through to Westmount Park

Church regains access in time for wedding

There's something about a wedding that seems to tug at everyone's heart strings – and a Saturday ceremony June 16 at Westmount Park Church was no exception

City officials and contractors at the arena/pool site report rushing to open up access to the front door and clean up as much as possible.

The morning before, access to the front door of the church had been blocked off, tractors and other construction equipment for the arena/pool project were seen going to and fro only feet away, and all cyclists and pedestrians were blocked from heading east on de Maisonneuve at Lansdowne.

And overnight, someone painted graffiti on the stone wall of the church beside the front door that was discovered just after 7 am on the day of the wedding.

Meanwhile, officials said, the contractor had moved back the security fencing by Friday afternoon to free up the sidewalk and provide access to the front door and newly laid sod the church's landscaper had laid down

"As soon as we heard about the graffiti, we sent the city's cleaners over to remove it and they responded very quickly," said Public Security director David Sedgwick.

Public Security on hand

"We also had two officers posted outside for the wedding," he said. Guests were assisted with parking, and cyclists were prevented from riding along the newly freed-up sidewalk to reach the bike path.

The Pomerleau site manager Marc Pla-

mondon "was most helpful with the relocation of fencing to accommodate the wedding," said Sports and Recreation director Mike Deegan. He said a church official had "confirmed to me that all went well."

"We all tried to make the effort to provide access to the front door," said city director general Duncan Campbell. The church has provided the city with a list of upcoming weddings so the contractor can be prepared, he said. Another wedding was scheduled for last weekend.

He pointed out that the blocked access to the front door earlier in the week was unexpected owing to the unscheduled Bell work to install a new manhole (see June 19, p. 4).

Now that there is partial reopening of the access to Westmount Park – for pedestrians and cyclists pushing bikes – "there will be a gradual retraction of the safety fencing" to just north of the south sidewalk on de Maisonneuve, Campbell said.

At the moment, however, the opening is not wide enough to accommodate both cyclists and pedestrians so cyclists will have to dismount and walk past the church, which many had been doing last week, he said. However, "The behaviour of some cyclists has been less than exemplary."

Roofers needed chute

Roofers throwing down loose debris into a container on Mountain Ave. June 7 were stopped by Public Security just after 9:10 am until they could obtain a chute. This was acquired by 12:30 pm when they were reported to be back at work.

Resident wants compensation for piling damage

People trying to head east along de Maisonneuve from Decarie will need to find an alternate route as de Maisonneuve will be reduced to one westbound lane between Decarie and Northcliffe from July to September. The city of Montreal is planning to renovate the sewers.

This is according to NDG councillor Peter McQueen, who made the announcement during the June 19 meeting of the Good Neighbourly Relations Committee, which discusses construction in and around the incoming McGill University Health Centre (MUHC) hospital.

The sewer project, he explained, is intended to mitigate basement flooding in the area. It means crews will be excavating de Maisonneuve eastward from Decarie to install large sewer conduits, then up

Northcliffe all the way up to Sherbrooke and, eventually, eastward.

Potrykus still waiting

Just as the meeting was closing, Westmounter Wanda Potrykus asked officials when she was going to hear back about damage to her home she claims was caused by more than a year of earth-shaking pile driving at the hospital site.

It has been two months since she filed a complaint with SNC Lavalin about cracked plaster in her home, but, aside from people coming in to take pictures, she had not heard back, she later told the *Independent*.

She was directed to an MUHC representative and finally got in touch with someone from SNC Lavalin who promised to help.


Redfern traffic under adjustment

New two-way traffic regulations for Redfern Ave. (St. Catherine north to midblock) may still need adjustments, said Public Security director David Sedgwick last week. The changes went into effect June 14 to provide direct access to and from the construction site at 215 Redfern so trucks would not have to go north to de Maisonneuve, crossing the bike path.

Some drivers, however – mainly from the apartment building at 4300 de Maisonneuve and parkers from a commercial building – appear to be taking advantage of the change, adding to an already congested stretch.



Are gardening contractors playing garbage games?

The city's new waste management bylaw requiring garden debris be put out in special heavy duty paper bags has resulted in some contractors dumping plastic bagsful on public or other people's property, Public Security and Public Works officials said last week.

"Unfortunately, they're playing the game," said Public Works director Marianne Zalzal. "If they're not putting it in

paper bags, they're dumping their plastic bags on public property and sneaking away. They're polluting the city."

The non-compliant contractors typically re-use their left-over plastic bags from peat moss and other gardening material.

Because the city contractor for organic waste will no longer collect garden residue put out in plastic, it means Public Works employees are going around picking them up. This takes them away from other duties, Zalzal said.

Campaign waged

It has also resulted in Public Security waging a concerted campaign to find offenders, said assistant Public Security director Greg McBain. "We know their dumping spots, but catching them isn't easy." Public Works has put up warning signs at the locations.

One of the spots, the median on Surrey Gardens, has long been known as a place where contractors leave garden debris. A pool liner was recently thrown there, Za-Izal said.

"We've been helping Public Works by keeping an eye out for offenders," McBain said. Officers have also been giving out notices asking residents to advise their contractors to use the paper bags when the plastic bags are seen on private property. These have been left at more than 25 resi-

One Public Security report May 9 documented the complaint of a resident on Upper Bellevue stating someone had dumped seven plastic bags on her property (see May 22, p. 8).

Another incident on June 10 involved several garbage bags that were found uncollected from the sidewalk outside a house on Elm, but it could not be confirmed that the bags came from that property. When the resident was finally reached the next day, he stated he knew nothing about them since he had just returned from a trip.

And in yet another case, an Independent reader claimed recently to have seen a garbage bag sitting on the sidewalk for about four weeks on Côte St. Antoine and Forden. This left officials puzzled that it hadn't been noticed by passing patrols on the lookout for such rogue bags.

The offences have left officials hoping to catch at least one or two offenders so the word will get around. "We don't have garbage police," McBain pointed out.

Enforcement was one of the challenges raised at a public consultation meeting on the waste management by-law before its adoption December 1 (see December 6, p.


Office gets a special delivery - thieves

Thieves used the courrier slot to access an office on St. Catherine near Gladstone and despite the security alarm were able to get away with several computers before police arrived.

On June 9, the office's alarms were set off at 10:39 pm when the suspects used a piece of wood to pry open the delivery slot, reach in and unlock the door, explained constable Adalbert Pimentel from Station 12. The office owner responded to the alarm, but found he had already been robbed of three desktop computers and three laptops.

He called police, who arrived by 10:55 pm. The police examined the scene but were unable to find fingerprints. They did, however, recommend a better locking system on the door as, even with alarms, thieves can work quickly. -I.O.

recalled "boxes and boxes" of claims.

An estimated 95 percent of the current claims are from insurance companies, Gagnon said. No dollar amount is yet known since at this stage all that is required is notification of the intent to file a

All would be turned over to the city's claims adjuster for investigation. When amounts of individual claims are known, those exceeding the city's \$10,000 insurance deductible are turned over to the insurer. Smaller ones, if deemed eligible, are paid directly from the city clerk's budget, Gagnon said.

"We take our responsibilities seriously," she explained.

Meanwhile, anyone who has filed a notice of claim can expect to receive a letter of acknowledgement, she said. Public Works has also been asked for a technical report to be used by the claims adjustor in investigating individual claims, she said.

Church opens it doors to help arena/pool construction workers

Residents' worksite concerns 'passed on' to contractor

Residents of 52 Academy Rd., whose apartments on the west side overlook Arena Drive, are discovering first hand what it's like to live virtually in a construc-

In strings of emails received by the *In*dependent over the last two weeks, some of the concerns allege insufficient watering down of dust, idling work vehicles, use of the building's outside water tap by workers and trespassing on the building prop-

Complaints passed on to contractor

"All complaints have been passed on to the contractor, who is aware of our regulations," Councillor Patrick Martin, project chair, said last week.

But given the hot weather last week, Westmount Park Church moved to help the construction workers.

"We have opened the church up for the female construction workers to use our washroom facilities and for everyone to refill their water bottles," church adminis-Shelagh McNally told the

Independent. "It has been very hot work for them, and we wanted to extend some kindness towards the people doing the ground work."

Some were known to have taken advantage of the invitation.

Among complaints from one resident was this question: Why do the contractor's "powershovels run their engines without stop right through the lunch break even though the machines are still and the operators absent?" wrote George Ritter, in an email.

"Sometimes it's hard to start up some of the machines again," Martin told the Independent. "It can take awhile."

Financial benefit from recycling?

Another concern expressed by Ritter is whether or not the city is deriving revenue from the sale of recyclable material that has been separated into mounds of rubble such as concrete, brick, steel and wood.

To this, Martin explains that the city won't receive any financial benefit. It has a set price agreement with the contractor who assumes all risk - gains and losses from the recycling, one of the conditions for obtaining certification in Leadership in Energy and Environmental Design (LEED).

After the cost of transportation to recyclers is factored in plus the cost of separating the material, "hopefully he's breaking even on the sale from disposal of the material," Martin said.

He also said that regarding to the concerns of another tenant about dust arising from the work, "A lot of water is being poured on the site using a high pressure hose. I think the contractor is doing all he can in that regard." He also said the city is reminding the contractor daily of residents' concerns.

Unlucky BMW owner victimized twice

The unlucky owner of a BMW 3 Series was victimized twice in as many days.

The first time, thieves broke in and stole a pair of glasses. The second time, occurring only two days later on June 17, somebody stole the car itself, which was parked on Grosvenor near Sherbrooke. The theft happened sometime between 9:30 pm and early the next morning.

"This doesn't mean it was the same suspect twice," said Constable Adalbert Pimentel with Station 12, who offered

some tips on avoiding car break-ins and thefts.

"Having an alarm system on the car does help as it makes noise and draws attention. Having a bar on the steering wheel also helps as it means thieves must take the time to cut through the steering wheel to remove the bar. Of course, putting the car in a garage helps if you have one, and always make sure the windows are up and the doors are locked."

Some cyclists are getting bolder with violating stop lights at the St. Catherine/Claremont/de Maisonneuve intersection, a busy area, especially for many pedestrians going to and from the Vendôme Metro station.

Imagine: you are crossing a light at the southeast corner of de Maisonneuve (to the southwest corner), only to be confronted by a cyclist northbound on St. Catherine, who should be stopped at a red light. 

cyclist to crash, leaves the scene

While bad driving can lead to somebody getting the finger, an incident on June 15 left a 65-year-old Montreal resident with a broken one instead.

Now police are searching for the driver involved in the "hit and run" even though the sought suspect never actually hit any-

Just after 2:30 pm, a cyclist was heading south on Victoria near the Boulevard, when a motorist made a sudden move, according to Station 12's constable Adalbert Pimentel. The driver's sudden manoeuvre caused the cyclist to hit the brakes hard. The cyclist lost control of the bike and fell. The driver left the scene, making it a "hit and run" crime, explained Pimentel.

"When you cause an accident, you have to stay on the scene, call the police and wait for officers to respond," he said. "Otherwise, it's a violation of the highway safety code."

The cyclist, he said, was transported to the Montreal General, where he was treated for shock and a broken finger.

Cell phone user plows into cab

A cyclist talking on a cell phone rode into the back of a taxi stopped at a red light on Sherbrooke at Lansdowne June 8, Public Security officials said. No injuries were reported but one of the taxi's tail lights was broken. The cyclist was identified as a 23year-old Ottawa resident.

The Supreme Court of Canada ruled June 22 that a Westmount tree that fell on a car in August 2006, killing its driver Gabriel Rossy, did qualify as a road accident under Quebec's no-fault insurance.

The city of Westmount's insurer Lloyd's of London maintained the family of the victim was entitled only to indemnity provided by the Société de l'assurance automobile du Québec (SAAQ) because he was driving along Côte des Neiges Rd., when a large tree on Westmount property fell onto the vehicle.

The family, represented by Westmounter Julius Grey, claimed it was not a car accident and that Rossy, 27 at the time, could have been hit by the tree had he been a pedestrian.

The leave to appeal to the Supreme Court had been announced January 24, 2011 by Lloyd's of London in a bid to overturn a ruling of the Quebec Court of Appeal two months earlier (see "Supreme Court asked to hear Rossy tree death case," February 1, 2011, p. 16).


Roslyn teacher prevails at Supreme Court

The leave to appeal application of parents Hagop Artinian and Kathryn Rosenstein against a judgement for defamation awarded to former Roslyn teacher Mary Kanavaros was dismissed with costs by the Supreme Court on June 21.

According to the court's website, the parents initially sued for educational malpractice. On the morning of the trial, the parties agreed to a settlement that contained a confidentiality clause. While leaving the courthouse, the parents were questioned by the media and said that they had "made their point." Kanavaros sued for defamation and was awarded \$234,011 in damages at trial. The parents appealed the award, but the Quebec Court of Appeal dismissed the appeal, which dismissal has now been upheld by the Supreme Court.

The FCM and the city of Toronto were interveners in the court case in which Halifax had disputed a nominal valuation of \$10 the federal government had assigned to a large acreage of federal land around the Citadel area.

The ruling stated that the government cannot base its valuation on a "fictitious tax sys- continued on p. 13

The Montreal Protestathon Protestival is not a simple phenomenon, and it's becoming more complex. It should have a

It won't have a song, because a song has to be about one thing, and the daily protests in Montreal are about two things and include two different factions: the "Pro" and the "Anti". The Pro faction is for free, or at least cheap, university education. The Anti faction is anti-globalization and anti-capitalist. These movements have very different goals. Therefore the protestors are divided against themselves, cannot be successful and cannot have a song.

My view of the protests is ambivalent. I find it difficult to disagree with a movement that supports subsidized access to higher education because I believe that a better educated population brings about a better democracy and a fairer society. On the other hand, I find it easy to disagree with the anti-capitalist, anti-globalization movement because I believe that globalization is both impossible and inevitable, and because I choose not to saw off the branch I am sitting on.

Some of the protestors appear to be in favour of chopping down the entire tree, even at the risk of being crushed in the fall. They are a motley bunch, including anarchists, separatists, socialists, communists, trade unionists and most of the folks listed by John Lennon in "Give Peace a Chance" with the exception of Tommy Cooper. Now that was a song. It was about one thing, a worthy thing, and anyone can enjoy it. It will last forever.

mostly shouted slogans of the "down with pants" variety. The lyrics are atrocious. For example, "2-4-6, F-k the Police" is very boring, does not rhyme when sung in English and does not convey the movement's message in a meaningful way. Furthermore, the melodies are monotonous and repetitive, and the improvised percussion accompaniment is dire. The Plastic Ono Band, Spike Jones and the Hare Krishnas were much better.

It would be wonderful if a great song sprung from the Montreal "student" protest of 2012. Beautiful songs have sprung from protest movements in the past - songs like "We Shall Overcome," and "Where Have All The Flowers Gone?" Locally, there was "Québécois." These were songs that, in their day, united people emotionally in a cause such as equality, peace, liberty. It's fair to include "Québécois" because the song made a difference. It could be a lesser song – a song that targets or satirizes the enemy of a movement rather than a song that embodies the message. Sadly, the enemy of the "student" protest seems to be the baby boomers. It seems we created a horrible mess, and we refuse to move over and allow younger, more creative, fresher minds to fix it.

Perhaps somebody should write "Hurry Up and Die, Baby Boomer." It sounds a little negative, but it could be funny. Hmm ... boomer. Humour? Rumour? Good. Tumour? Not funny. Well, it looks like I'll have all summer to work on it.

tem" and that valuation assessed by authorities was an "important reference point" for determining fair value for government properties across the country.

While Westmount's director general Duncan Campbell said he was waiting to see how the ruling "would translate into government policy," the city has no issues with the current basis on which federal government payments are made to the city in lieu of taxes.

All properties are evaluated by Montreal assessors, according to Finance officials. Based on the property valuation, the federal government pays the municipality at the non-residential property tax rate established by Westmount. In 2011, this generated \$172,000 from the RCMP and armouries.

On the other hand, Quebec pays the city at a lower rate – slightly more than the residential one. Last year, the Quebec payments brought in \$3.4 million to Westmount, financial officials said, including from the educational sector, led by Dawson and Marianopolis colleges and followed by the other schools, including private ones, all of whose taxes are paid by the province.





Not one to sit on her laurels, Jones was already training for her next race in Lac Megantic, Quebec.



Stip it up!

I'm frequently surprised by how many of my students have never grilled fruit. Fruit is perfect for the grill because it is so easy to prepare.

All you need is sliced fruit and cooking oil or butter.

Hard fruit like apples, pears and pineapples are the easiest to grill since they hold their shape and texture while cooking. Softer fruits like peaches, nectarines, plums and mangoes will become soft and mushy if overcooked. Either way, pick a fresh, firm fruit that is just short of being perfectly ripe.

With many fruits, you can simply cut them in half. Split bananas lengthwise (leave the peels on to hold them together) and cut apples, pears and similar fruits down the middle and remove the seeds and core. Typically, with most fruits you can leave the peels on. Large fruit and citrus should be cut into slices to expose the flesh to the flame.

It is best to grill fruit over medium heat on a very clean cooking grate. Nothing will ruin the flavor of fruit like leftover drippings from the last batch of hamburgers!

To keep the fruit from sticking to the grill, lightly spray it with cooking oil or brush with melted butter. Many oils, like olive oil, have too strong of a flavour for fruit, so pick something that will complement but not overpower it.

Since fruit is naturally high in sugar, you won't typically need to add any. If you do want it sweeter, you can dust the fruit with brown sugar, but be careful because sugars burn quickly and easily.

To really add something to grilled fruit, try marinating it in a combination of your favourite spices, fruit juices and alcohols. Use alcohol in moderation to prevent flare-ups on the grill.

Here's one of my favourites:

Grilled bananas with honey-rum glaze

Serves 4

2 tbsp dark rum 2 tbsp honey

- 4 firm ripe bananas, peel on, sliced, lengthwise
- 1 tsp ground cinnamon
- 1 pint chocolate or vanilla ice cream, frozen yogourt or 1 cup chocolate sauce

In a bowl, blend rum, honey and cinnamon, Reserve.

Over direct medium heat, grill bananas, cut side down for 3 minutes or until they develop visible grill marks.

Turn them and brush with the honeyrum mixture.

Continue grilling, with lid down, for about 5 minutes.

Remove peel and serve with ice cream.


