

Has Westmount become a party town? **Out-of-control teen party** takes over an hour to break up

more than one hour October 4 clearing a party of intoxicated teens that got out of hand at a house on Rosemount Ave., Public Security officials said. The party host, a 16-year-old, stated she had invited 10 school friends for a sleepover, but could no longer maintain control when the party grew to a total of 50 to 60.

The host was issued a ticket for \$119 for noise and disturbing the peace and her parents, who were not home, were to be informed. An older sister was in the house.

When officers arrived at 10:47 pm in response to noise complaints, they reported finding so many people on the front ter-



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Public safety officers and police spent race, in the yard, on the sidewalk and on the street that police were called to assist. Some of the youths were described as intoxicated, mouthing off at officers and dispersing onto nearby streets. The area was finally cleared by 11:55 pm.

The incident was reminiscent of another large disruptive party in the neighbourhood last March but not known to be related, according to Public Security.

This is the third large teen party that the Independent has reported on this fall (see "Party ends, 40 teens fan out into Westmount," October 8, p. 2; and "Drinking young people run in all directions," September 17, p. 1).

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
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Films, soirée among Westmount events French e-books to launch during Public Library Week



Electoral list revisions extended to October 22

Westmount is one of more than 40 municipalities affected by a delay in the mailing of notices by a contractor regarding revisions to the electoral list for the November 3 municipal election, city officials said October 11.

As a result, Westmount has added an additional sitting of the board of revisors at city hall on October 22 from 10 am to 7:30 pm.

This is to meet a legal requirement that citizens receive at least five days' notice for seeking revisions after receipt of the mailing, according to city clerk and returning officer Viviana Iturriaga Espinoza.

The original revision dates also remain in effect. They are Wednesday, October 16 from 10 am to 10 pm and Thursday, October 17 from 10 am to 7:30 pm, again at city hall. In order to cast a vote, one's name must appear on the electoral list.

While citizens can expect to receive the required notices and reminder cards by Canada Post on October 15 or 16, she said, these will list only the original two revision dates since they had already been printed before the delay. "People have to have enough prior notice to put their documents together and arrange to attend a revision sitting if they have changes to make," Iturriaga Espinoza explained.

The delay resulted when the contractor who issues the notices for Westmount and the other affected municipalities was unexpectedly unable to do so on schedule. While this is a contractor used previously by Westmount and is experienced with the electoral requirements, she said, preliminary information suggested there had been a printing problem.

Once the city became aware on October 10 that the notices had not been delivered on time, "We were unable to receive any reply from the contractor because the company was overwhelmed by the volume of similar enquiries."

Anyone planning to make changes, corrections, additions or deletions to the electoral list is required to take at least two pieces of identification with them showing names and addresses and date of birth pertaining to the applicable person or persons. This could include a driver's permit, Medicare card and/or a passport.

Runs in District 8 to make it a race Andrei Jones seeks more communication, accountability

The filing of nomination papers by Andrei Jones just hours before the deadline October 4 has forced an election

race in District 8 for Councillor Theodora Samiotis. And that's exactly what his motives were.

"I felt I had to step up to the plate," he said on hearing she was still unopposed the day before. "It's good for someone, regardless of the job they've done, to compete for political election. It provides an opportunity for feedback and accountability."

And for Jones, who at age 23 expects to graduate in mechanical engi- beef consommé. neering at Concordia next spring, the challenge of running for city council is yet another one that drives him "to do anything possible to meet and defeat any challenge."

He's presenting himself "with a clean slate," he says. And with an aim to work for "improved communication and accountability" between the city and citizenry, and to try "to make sense" out of some things that just don't sit well with him.

A graduate of Selwyn House and Phillips Exeter Academy in New Hampshire, Jones has already worked in his chosen field for Bombardier Aerospace, CAE and the Université Libre de Bruxelles in design and data analysis - all as part of Concordia's co-op program.

He's also been a part-time swimming instructor and lifeguard at the Westmount Y and a Westmount lifeguard during the summers 2008-2010.

Niggling questions

The new pool at the Westmount recreation centre is, in fact, one of several niggling questions he believes citizens should have had clearer answers to. "If a large construction company is going to be six months late, the least it could do is inform people and apologize."

And, he continues, "Why did it take a whole summer to fix the sprinkler in Stayner Park in front of my house? Apparently a valve broke - but the whole summer?"

Then, there's the sound barrier "that's gone on so long it's ridiculous. I know there are various arguments, but at least it could have been built in areas not affected by the Turcot project," he suggests. "They could start somewhere."

Jones was born in St. Petersburg, Russia, left at age four and has lived in Westmount for 10 years with his parents and

three siblings. He describes his interests as cooking, cycling, alpine skiing and mechanics.

"I'm really looking forward to Thanksgiving," he said. "I plan to cook at least one turkey and maybe two: one for my family on the Monday and one for my friends the day before." His secret to a good turkey? "It's a mix of my grandmother's recipe and Martha Stewart." In short, and in part, he says, baste it with

And if Jones were elected to city council, how would that affect the possibility of a job opportunity outside the Montreal area? "I would have to find something here," he replies. "My first commitment comes first."

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Takes on Lulham, Young in District 7 Goddard runs on health, safety near tracks & work sites

Nigel Goddard's bid for council in District 7 has changed the game, turning it into a three-way race in what had been shaping up as a fight between Councillor Cynthia Lulham and Mavis Young, her close challenger the last time around.

Recent citizen action on upgrades to the tracks and in curtailing overnight work on the commuter line, "really made me realize that citizen action can make a difference," he says.

"What I've really been passionate about is the whole issue of pollution and its effects on the health and safety of residents living close to the railway and highway. More needs to be done and this is the perfect time to raise the issue."

It's also Goddard's chance, with what he calls his brainstorming and consensusbuilding skills, "to do something for the betterment of my neighbours and city, and be part of the democratic process."

His concern for reducing pollution of all kinds includes noise from construction sites, the creation of "a friendlier city for biking" with added bike paths, more synchronized traffic lights and a ban on

"I also would like to encourage and promote consensus building through bring-

ing people together." He was thinking how regular meetings between a condo developer and nearby residents might lead to greater understanding. "When you get to know someone, it's easier to be nice to them."

Goddard, who graduated in economic geography from Concordia, has worked as an art consultant for some 20 years. He also plays alto sax in a band called The Kingpins. He says

his ability to perform in public and to analyze clients' needs puts him at ease in dealing with people and assessing their concerns, all of which would be useful on council.

More to be done – soon

Goddard also wants to put it on the record that he "applauded the way the incumbent (Councillor Lulham) has looked at the issue of trains and the highway, but that more has to be done and it should be done before the start of the Turcot project.

"In a democratic system, people have a choice. I bring passion to this issue and now there are more trains than ever and I'm greatly affected by it – especially the diesel emissions from a wind from the east." A member of the Westmount Train Action Group (WTAG), he repeats what he has said at city council meetings: that using seismographic equipment, he has

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measured train vibrations equal to more than a 4.0 earthquake.

He said he doesn't want to experience

a Megantic-type derailment even though the commuter trains do not carry flammable material.

Interested in "all kinds of history," Goddard was born in Rugby, England, and lived in a house that actually had the same layout as the one he chose to purchase on Irvine, he said. He also likes trains, but recalls that there weren't any on the Sunday he visited and decided to buy his house.

"Yes, I knew there were tracks nearby. But tracks don't make any noise. It's what you put on them." And although there has been some effort to upgrade the trains, he says, "it doesn't mean we shouldn't make it better."

There is "a lot of ingenuity here in Westmount and if we brainstorm and really focus on it as a community we should be able to come up with four or five solutions." He notes that a 10-decibel reduction in noise was achieved by the installation of the prototype sound barrier at the foot of Abbott and said, "I would love that amount on Irvine."

Westmount is a family, he adds, "and we may not always agree, but we rise together from an outside attack like the forced mergers. That's what got me politically involved. Malaise should not go unchecked or it can affect the whole organism."



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Trent, Drury and Forbes sworn in Mayor predicts fewer brickbats

While candidates in six electoral districts campaigned for council seats, incumbent mayor Peter Trent was sworn into office October 9 along with two councillors who were also unopposed. They were Victor Drury in District 3 and Nicole Forbes in District 6.

In the ceremony at city hall, all declared under the new oath required by Quebec that they would fulfill their duties of office

They also chose to add as a codicil the oath traditionally used in Westmount to furthermore swear to discharge their duties "without partiality, fear, favour, or affection and in the best interest of the city





After each had signed the declaration, Trent presented brief comments on the four years ahead which he looked forward to as being "less stressful and without as many brickbats" as the previous ones. "I can be a little more frank now," he said, "the last term was quite a battle" to build



But, he added, "We didn't do it for us, but for our children and children's children."

The six remaining councillors to be elected November 3 are to be sworn into office November 11 before the first meeting of the new council.

Both in wrong as women argue over dogs

Responding to a call from a witness at 4:17 pm for a man lying on the ground and not moving, officers found him conscious and able to breathe. One hand was bleeding from absorbing the impact of the fall. Because of his age, however, he was immobilized until the arrival of Urgences Santé at 4:59 pm. The resident of Olivier was taken to the Royal Victoria Hospital.



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Station 12 Reports Suspects refuse to steal old cell phone, get arrested

The following news stories are based on information from police reports provided by a Station 12 constable in an interview with the reporter.

A teenager discovered the virtues of carrying around an older model cellphone and an empty wallet when four suspects attempting to rob him rejected the device. Station 12 constable Caroline Gauthier said the boy, age 15, was walking on Sherbrooke St. near Lansdowne Ave. on October 3 when he was suddenly surrounded by four similarly aged teenagers. Two walked in front, slackening the pace while two others walked close behind until the walk slowed to a stop. Gauthier said one of the suspects asked for the time and the victim told them, 6:25 pm.

The four teens told the victim to empty his pockets and, when he did, he pulled







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out an older model cellphone. After taking a look, the suspects returned the phone to him saying they didn't want such an old device, said Gauthier.

The suspects then demanded the 15year-old empty his wallet, said Gauthier, but the boy had no money. Gauthier said the victim felt very scared and intimidated by the four boys surrounding him. This, she added, makes it the equivalent of an armed robbery.

The four suspects left the boy, said Gauthier, and he made a run for home. He

Man refuses to leash dog while playing flute on Greene

A 43-year-old man was issued a ticket September 30 for refusing to leash his German shepherd while playing the flute for passers-by at the southwest corner of Greene and de Maisonneuve, Public Security officials report. The dog lay on the sidewalk about 15 feet away from an open guitar case into which people had been tossing coins.

After refusing to comply with the leashing order, the man began walking north with the unleashed dog until police intercepted him and identified him as a resident of Edouard Montpetit. When he refused again to leash the dog, he was given the ticket and left in the hands of police.

High wind topple trees

Several vehicles were reported damaged by fallen branches and trees during high winds October 7, according to Public Security reports. Parts of city trees were recalled police immediately, said Gauthier, and he was able to give a very detailed description of the suspects. Station 12 police apprehended the four boys a short time later in Westmount Park.

While one of the suspects lived near Westmount, none were local, she said, noting one was 14, two were 15 and the oldest was 16.

The suspects were, after being processed as minors, were brought home to their parents as is legally required when handling minors.

Cyclist injures face in midnight Glen fall

A young woman who fell off her bicycle at 12:05 am October 5 on Glen Rd. across from Hydro Westmount was assisted by passers-by until a Public Security patroller took over after noticing several cars stopped on the road. Officials said no one seemed to know how she had fallen, but she was described as intoxicated.

The woman suffered bruises and cuts to the face as well as a bleeding nose. Urgences Santé was called despite her refusal to receive medical assistance. Due to the extent of her head injuries and her inability to recall what had happened, she was required to sign a waiver after a lengthy process at which time she was believed to understand what had happened.

A male companion living in LaSalle had cycled ahead not knowing she had fallen, but returned to the scene and the two left walking their bikes.






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
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
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








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




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
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The following article relates to offers to purchase Westmount residential dwellings which were reported by local real estate agents as having been accepted in September 2013. Because they are not final registered sales, the addresses and prices cannot be made public, but give a good idea of current trends in local real estate activity. The graph below offers a picture of these trends over time.

Volume rebounded in September for the lower half of the Westmount real estate market, that is, for houses selling at or less than \$1,500,000, but it is still suffering badly for houses over that mark. Only one of 12 properties sold in September exceeded \$1.5 million, and none went for more than \$2 million.

Two of the year's lowest house prices were posted in September, doubling the number of sales this year between \$500,000 and \$600,000. The next two prices were \$900,000 and \$915,000.

So far this year 11 home sales have been reported above \$2 million, and an-


other 66 are asking more than that amount, out of 165 on the market now in Westmount. This compares to 60 over \$2 million and 151 overall a month earlier, so the trends are obvious.

Average price dropped

In fact, prices were so low that the average price of the September sales dropped to \$1,163,000, the lowest raw average price for a month since July last year. However, mark-ups over city valuation stayed strong, an indication buyers are willing to pay for the product, but not in the higher price brackets. The last sale over \$2 million posted by agents was negotiated in July, and only three have been settled since April. Depending on how desperate the owners of those big houses are, those high asking prices may have to come down substantially to get that part of the market moving again.

The condominium market inched along with only two sales, bringing the total for the third quarter this year to seven, but in fact one of those two was just over \$1,600,000, the highest price paid for a resale condo this year. The average markup for the seven condominium sales reached only 12 percent over the 2011 valuation compared to an average 20 percent for the *continued on p. 15*

Westmount real estate brokers preach patience, realism in slower market

With houses no longer flying off the market, Westmount's real estate brokers are preaching patience to clients watching their homes sit unsold on the marketplace.

"Sellers have to not only be patient, but realistic in this market. While the volume of sales is certainly down, there are sales

entire year. The figures are not substantial enough to say that buyers are losing interest in condominiums, and in fact if the aging owners of the large houses could sell, they might be ready to pay substantially for some of Westmount's more expensive condos.

Adjacent-Westmount, which picked up the slack from Westmount's lack of sales in August, saw only two sales in September: a house on Redpath Crescent and an apartment in the Trafalgar Apartments on Côte des Neiges.

While in Westmount prices (in terms of mark-ups) have stayed fairly even compared with last year, in every part of adjacent-Westmount we have seen modest reductions of prices.

with high prices. Properly priced and presented, houses can sell quickly," said Jill Prévost of Groupe Sutton Centre Ouest.

The 107 houses sold through August represents Westmount's second-lowest tally of the 21st century, ahead of only the 102 sold in 2009 (see: Oct. 1, 2013), according to real estate consultant and Westmount Independent columnist Andy Dodge.

The slowdown's impact has been most prominent on Westmount's more upscale properties. In August and September, only two of the 30 houses sold in the city went for more than \$2 million, according to Dodge.

Christina Miller of Profusion Immobilier believes the competition for people listing their homes above that threshold has never been greater.

"When I last checked there were 68 homes asking for \$2 million or more. That's a crazy record. I remember looking a couple of years ago and there were 23. I thought that was cause for alarm, let alone 68." she said.

'Sellers overestimating value'

According to Joan McGuigan of Mc-Guigan Pepin, sellers are overestimating the value of their homes, leading to longer listing times that crowd the market.

"There are too many overpriced houses that make the market look really bad when they are on the market for more than a year and often more than two," she said.

Some critics have blamed the 2012 election win by the Parti Québécois for the downturn in the real estate market, particularly in notoriously pro-Liberal Westmount.

'Many factors'

"There are many factors affecting the market, like company layoffs, few jobs, weak economy, fear. Most people I talk to, though, say this market needs a change in government," said McGuigan.

RE/MAX Québec Inc.'s Brian Dutch sees a Westmount demographic composed of business people seeking stability in their professional and private lives.

"I still have clients who are waiting for the Liberals to come back before deciding to sell. If the PQ was voted out, it couldn't hurt because the people who live here aren't necessarily PQ diehards," he said.

However, Miller feels the current climate is an inevitable part of a real estate cycle that will eventually rectify itself.

"If you look through history, there have always been ups and downs, ups and

downs. I think we're at a place where we are just stabilizing," she said. "I think the economy is slowing in that same cycle so there's a natural tightening of the family budgets."

In that slowed market, Dutch believes the salesmanship and experience of the broker plays an even more crucial role in securing sales.

"In a good market you can sell anything because it sells by itself. In a more saturated, lower market, you just have to be that much better than your competition. The buyers will still come, but you can't just sit back waiting for it to happen," he said.

Welcome boost

The Montreal market received a welcome boost October 9 with the release of a new Greater Montréal Real Estate Board report announcing that island-wide sales jumped by 12 percent in September from the same time in 2012.

The report also announced that sales for the entire greater Montreal area grew by eight percent for the same time span.

"The beauty of real estate is it only takes one buyer, and there are lots of them out there," said Prévost.

partment to use the TAG space as more than a drop-in centre, Deegan explained.

This includes providing other opportunities for teens in terms of activities and educational events, he explained. These are also areas in which the Y's resources could prove particularly useful, he noted.

Separate quarters

While the Teen Centre has separate quarters that include its own entrance off Lansdowne, an activity room, study room,

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full kitchen, washroom and outdoor terrace, it opens onto a central hallway that provides a view directly down to one of the two rinks.

This also provides the potential for some of the teens to develop an interest in playing hockey, Deegan pointed out.

Meanwhile the city has rehired Rachael Ampofo as the teen centre's coordinator, a role she filled before the teen centre had to close for demolition of the old arena.

While neither the TAG quarters nor the exercise/multipurpose rooms were ready in time for viewing by the general public during the open house tours, the area was sufficiently completed to be viewed by the Independent last week.

The tour of the entire west side of the complex along Lansdowne revealed how this part of the building is at or just below ground level. The sun provides natural light onto the underground ice rinks.

The Sports and Recreation offices are immediately inside the rec centre's main pedestrian-only Lansdowne entrance. Further north along the west hallway are the multipurpose and exercise rooms that can be opened into each other as required. At the northwest corner of the building is the Teen Centre.

"The teens will also have the possibility to use the exercise room for their own activities," Deegan said.

But their apartment-type quarters of about 1,100 square feet will provide them with their own space in which computers and other study-related work can take

place separately from the main activity room, which will contain a TV, pool table, computer for games, seating and other furnishing.

The TV – a 60-inch flat screen – has been donated by retired city director general Bruce St. Louis, he said.

"We've left the high ceilings without enclosing them to create a greater feeling of space," he noted.

By comparison, the old Teen Centre was a single room at the pool entrance which, it was found through a focus group, made the teens feel "marginalized and second-class." Now, "It's their home away from home," where they can come and do their homework after school and have a meal. They could never do that before."

And if it turns out the quarters can be shared by seniors playing cards or other activities in the morning when not use by teens, the flexibility for which the Teen Centre was conceived could deliver additional options for use.

Dreaming in Autism comes to Selwyn House

Christine Rodriguez wrote Dreaming in Autism to show people just how hard it is to parent a child with autism. On October 22, Rodriguez with her company, La Tigressa Productions, will perform the onewoman award-winning play at Selwyn House School as a fundraiser for the nonprofit group Autism Speaks Canada.

The event marks the third showing of Dreaming in Autism at Selwyn House. Rodriguez presented it to the school's faculty and staff in August 2012 and it was so well received that Selwyn parents were invited to see it last February, explained Krista Leitham, a community fundraising manager for Autism Speaks Canada.

The organization holds walks to fund scientific research, raise money for family service grants and heighten awareness about autism in the wider community. It held its Montreal walk in May. "It's the first time we ourselves are involved with (Dreaming in Autism)," said Leitham. "This is a great chance for all the supporters to come and join us and see what this is all about."

The play gives people a better understanding of autism, Leitham said. "It will

help them to recognize the signs of someone with autism, especially in the school or in a social setting," she said. "Ultimately the goal is to have the child accepted and understood."

"I want people to experience what the day-to-day is of having a child with autism," said Rodriguez, whose son, now in grade 5, was five and six years old during the time she wrote Dreaming in Autism. "Children with autism have certain issues that make the daily routine a little bit more challenging. I wanted people to be sensitized to how they view children with autism and how it affects the family."

Rodriguez, who has a degree in screenwriting and works as a professional actor and model, first performed Dreaming in Autism at the 2012 Montreal Fringe Festival. It's played in Ottawa, won awards and last month was part of FemFest 2013 in Winnipeg.

Joy, ostracism, strain on marriage

In 50 minutes, Rodriguez chronicles her experiences with her young autistic son. The joy of her new baby's arrival becomes eclipsed as her son becomes older. He behaves differently from other children and asks the same question over and over. He's ostracized by peers and their parents. She feels isolated and her parenting is criticized. It's difficult to get a diagnosis, find government services and pay for private care. The stress puts a strain on her marriage.

But while her play captures the individual struggle many families face, Rodriguez said her play is about understanding, acceptance and love. "My point of view is listen to every child, listen to what their issues are."

"There are people with autism who don't even know they have it," Leitham said. Autism spectrum disorder is so prevalent, it affects 1 in 54 boys, and these are the children you meet at the hockey rink, at school, socially or in the medical system, she said.

As children with autism increasingly attend mainstream schools, more awareness is needed so that autistic children are accepted, Leitham said. "It starts by having education first. You can't have awareness without education."

To change attitudes, Autism Speaks Canada is doing outreach with the Lester B. Pearson School Board, the English Montreal School Board and the Quebec Association of Independent Schools, Leitham said. "If we can change our ways,


then ultimately we can live side by side," she said.

Dreaming in Autism will play at Coristine Hall, Selwyn House School on October 22, 2013 at 7:30 pm.

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Westmount walks for Mental Health




Westmounters are among the organizers and participants of the fifth Montreal Walks for Mental Health, the only event of its kind in Canada.

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




