### **City, Prospect-ors swing into** action against railway plans

### CP denied access from street, mediation sought

### By LAUREEN SWEENEY

It took less than a day for the city and a group of Prospect residents to take action against the proposed overnight work on the railway tracks this summer and the positioning of large new signalling structures in front of houses.

In strategies and options worked out at a private meeting June 13 between Mayor Peter Trent and residents, city officials turned down a formal request the next day from Canadian Pacific (CP) to use

Prospect St. as a worksite access, Councillor Theodora Samiotis said.

It was the first step -quickly followed by others the same day – in a joint effort to effect changes in the work and scheduling of the construction project set to start in mid-July.

A draft letter to the Canadian Transportation Agency (CTA) from Mayor Peter Trent was fine-tuned to request official mediation by the railway regulatory body.

Prospect residents sought legal advice and prepared their own letter of protest, according to resident Frank Candido. They asked that Westmount-Ville Marie MP Marc Garneau intervene.



## Strike shuts down arena worksite

Most worksites in Westmount - including the Westmount recreation centre (WRC) – were shut down Monday (June 17) by what had been announced as a general and unlimited strike of construction workers province-wide.

All was quiet so far outside the major construction projects, said assistant Public Security director Greg McBain at press time Monday morning. The Independent saw no activity at 9 am.

The de Maisonneuve bike path, which goes past both the arena/pool site and the condo site at 1250 Greene, was not affected, he said.

It was not known how long the labour situation would last especially considering that the contractors had provided their association with a lock-out mandate (see June 11, p. 2).

"It just shows how difficult it is to predict the delivery date of any work project," stated Councillor Patrick Martin, who steers the WRC steering committee.

The entire project is due October 31. But the pool, contractually due for completion May 31, means that "As of today, Monday, the pool is 17 days late, and counting. For sure, a strike doesn't help."

In anticipation of the strike, the city had granted a request from contractors at 1250 Greene to pour concrete June 15, McBain said. Another pour had taken place the previous day for the second ice rink of new arena.

City coffers and taxpayers in Westmount reaped the benefits of an active real estate market last year that contributed strongly to a confirmed surplus of \$3.6 million announced at the city council meeting June 3.

The operating surplus was fuelled by \$2 million more than budgeted in welcome tax. \$1 million more in construction

"Municipal costs have been well controlled and down over budget," stated Councillor Tim Price in presenting the city's audited statement for the year 2012.

The final results showed total revenues of \$96.7 million and expenditures of \$93.1 million of which \$49.8 million went to the agglomeration for Westmount's share of island- continued on p. 26

### Aims to enable Miss Vicky's to conform Zoning change for St. Matthias' is a 3-threshold process

#### By LAUREEN SWEENEY

A public consultation meeting scheduled for Tuesday, June 18 regarding St. Matthias' Church kicks off public participation in a complex process required for all changes to the city's zoning by-law.

In this case, the concerned zone itself is not being changed. It is designated as R-2 residential. Rather, it is the usages permitted at 10 and 12 Church Hill being amended. These are contained in a table in the zoning by-law showing St. Matthias'

as one of many "houses of worship" that do not have a "preschool" usage.

Because this usage at St. Matthias' has been tolerated for more than 20 years through the operation of Miss Vicky's preschool, the intent of the current legal exercise is to regularize it, according to city officials.

The proposed change to the table to add "and a school for pre-school education" for St. Matthias' is to enable Miss Vicky's preschool to conform to zoning regulations.

In short, the steps evolve from public



consultation through adoption of a second draft by-law, possible opening of a referendum register and a potential for a referendum.

All steps in the process laid down by Quebec are fraught with legalities and technicalities based on dates, eligibility of voters and numbers of signatures obtained in opposition.

The process can be stopped along the way at any point if the city council decides to withdraw the proposed change. Or, the change becomes law if certain results are not obtained from the public.

To stop the proposed change, residents must successfully go through three steps.

#### Step 1: Petitions

Following the public consultation meeting, adoption of a second draft by-law at a subsequent council meeting and publication of official notices, residents opposing the change in the concerned zone (R2-15-03) plus five others that touch it (called "contiguous zones") will have an opportunity to sign petitions applying for a referendum register to be opened at city hall.

The contiguous zones in this case in-

clude a vast area of central Westmount (see map).

To succeed in opening a register per zone, at least 12 "interested persons" (eligible voters) must sign a petition in that particular zone.

Under the law, a period of eight days is required by law for this step in the process, according to city clerk Viviana Iturriaga Espinoza.

Eligibility criteria is to be explained in the published notices, she said.

### Step 2: Register

If the requirements from a zone are met, eligible voters who oppose the change in that zone will be able to sign a referendum register at city hall. Each zone that qualifies preliminarily has its own separate register.

### Step 3: Referendum

If a sufficient number of signatures is obtained requesting a referendum, city council then may proceed to a referendum open to eligible voters in any zone that has qualified.

### **GREENING OF** SHUFFLEBOARD AREA

Instead of installing a dog run in Westmount Park, the city should do the complete opposite; that is, expand and enhance the designated location (the former shuffleboard area) with some additional natural landscaping, to preserve and underscore this area of the park as a relatively peaceful oasis, which provides large, mature shade trees and the nearby lagoon and waterfall - features that will not be part of the new park area at the arena site (shade trees require years of growth to achieve that quality).

Regardless of the additional park acreage, Westmount Park is not sufficiently large to benignly include a dog run, as the inevitable accompanying barking is not limited to the dog-run area, but carries much further afield. Barking, unlike other sounds (e.g., people playing soccer, children in the playground), is particularly annoying - akin to the sudden, puncturing, invasive noise of a car horn, even when intermittent.

The last thing our park needs is even more barking noise. If you do not wish to have a dog run in Westmount Park, it is important that your councillor and Mayor Peter Trent hear from you.

### **KEEP WESTMOUNT PARK** FROM GOING TO THE DOGS

Dog runs are not tranquil places. At times, dog runs are noisy, smelly and dirty. Relocating the dog run to the centre of Westmount Park risks destroying one of the oldest and most beautiful areas of this jewel in our city that, up until now, many Montrealers have been able to enjoy.

The proposed relocation site for the dog run, a shaded, old-treed area alongside the pond, is not a comparable exchange for the new green space of the Westmount recreation centre.

Moreover, it is unacceptable to compare the proposed Westmount Park dog-run location to the one in Murray Park, which is steps from Forden for people who drive to the dog run, and in a minimally treed section of the park. In comparison, all access points to the proposed Westmount Park dog run require people to walk their dogs to the centre of the park, creating heavy dog traffic and eliminations.

It is not too late to rethink the relocation given that there are at least three other dog runs in the city.

### **CITY SHOULD PROVIDE** YEARLY COST RUN-DOWN

For at least the next five years, Westmount taxpayers should be informed at tax time the exact actual amount of their municipal tax that has been needed to cover the actual total the costs for the previous year of providing, maintaining and operating the new arena/pool complex.

These total costs should include any and all outlay for work, materials and interest paid in respect to the project and its subsequent operation and maintenance, typically including the following items:

- All items undertaken for site evaluation, designing, costing and promoting the previously rejected above-ground arena/pool concepts;
- All items of site evaluation, tendering, construction and provisioning needed to provide a completed landscaped, furnished and operating arena/pool complex;
- All related items of work such as those for relocating the Lansdowne dog run;
- · All annual costs of operation and maintenance, reduced by any compensation paid to the city for use of the arena/pool facilities.

### ARGUMENTS VERSUS A GLASS HOUSE

I have very rarely come across such a strong NIMBY ("not in my back yard") stance such as expressed by Gerald Glass in his comments about the planned condominium project to replace Vanguard School at Metcalfe and Hillside ("Open letter, re: possible condos at Vanguard," June 4, p. 10).

Most of Mr.Glass' comments are totally risible, selfish, even pathetic ("scare birds

for miles around"?). I will not even bother to address them individually. However, I am curious about Mr. Glass' credentials as a condo market expert since he seems to be quite clear on the subject. And, at the end of the day, is that his problem?

Much more important, though, is that his appreciation of architectural merit is quite primitive. Anyone who uses the argument of preserving this non-descript building in order to make a case against the proposed project is clutching at straws.

I have practised architecture for almost 40 years, and I can state unequivocally that this existing building has absolutely no architectural merit whatsoever. On the contrary, this indescribably banal structure is in fact completely foreign to the character of its immediate environment. What will replace it is another matter altogether, but I can guarantee that its demolition will leave no architectural historian unhappy.

What bothers me more is Mr. Glass' obvious attitude that "if it bothers me in any way, I will be against it." This type of negative attitude is what makes it so often difficult to improve on existing situations, to work for the betterment of the community and to ultimately rise to challenges, that, yes, may be beyond the scope of some-one's immediate petty concerns.

### Ready for questions at condo demo hearing

The promoter and general contractor of the condo project at 175 Metcalfe will answer questions at the public hearing of the demolition committee to be held on June 19.

For strategic reasons in the context of a highly competitive market, we had to develop our condo project with a highly discreet approach.

Now that we are finally able to release the information, we welcome the opportunity the *Westmount Independent* offers us to clear the air and put everything into proper perspective, while getting rid of the growing urban legends.

The transformation of the former Vanguard school has evolved tremendously over the past year. Our involvement with the school started as we had been selected to handle, as a general contractor, the relocation of Vanguard's three campuses in a merged facility in the former orphanage building on Côte de Liesse.


Unexpectedly, the initial sale of the 175 Metcalfe to a third party having hit a snag, we had to take over and purchase Vanguard's building.

Upon acceptance of the deal, we initiated the development of a condo project, which initially was taking advantage of the existing structure. At the request of the city authorities and its advisory committee on planning, we had to change our project and accept to incur an increase of our construction costs to demolish the existing building in order to install our indoor parking facilities in two levels of underground parking.

Now that the design of our project has been duly accepted, we are finalizing the preparation of our presentation for the public hearing of the Demolition committee, which will enable us to demonstrate to the surrounding neighbours who have expressed some concerns, how every effort will be invested to minimize the impact of the construction work of our condo project.

We are confident that the municipal authorities as well as the local population will realize the importance of working harmoniously with us, expediting the approval of the demolition of the building, as it will enable us to hold our launching event in the context of the imminent completion of the MUHC and the Westmount recreation centre, both in close proximity to the 175 Metcalfe.

### Model water garden planned

The city, she said, is planning to create a model water garden in front of the conservatory as a way of controlling heavy rain that seeps under the greenhouse doors, as occurred June 1 (see June 11, p. 9). Proceeds of \$1,300 from the perennial plant exchange May 16 will go toward this project.

"Now that people are building fewer decks because of the maintenance they require, the water garden will serve as a model to show residents how the ground can be graded away from a house or ground-level patios and sloped into a water garden."

### Infrastructure funding

At the FCM's annual conference and trade show in Vancouver three weeks ago, one of three major initiatives announced concerned infrastructure grants (such as the one Westmount obtained for the arena/pool project) and guaranteed longterm indexed funding through the gas tax subsidy.

"We can't budget if we don't know if we're getting the subsidy," Lulham said.

She also found a quality of life report on the challenges and opportunities of an ageing population, another initiative, to be very important for Westmount in future planning and has passed on the information to the Healthy City Project.

The third initiative was *Guidelines for New Development in Proximity to Railway Operations* presented by Lulham in her professional capacity as project manager for the FCM-RAC Proximity Initiative. The RAC is the Railway Association of Canada. These are updated guidelines to address issues concerning noise, vibration and safety outlined in an FCM communiqué following the meeting.

Westmount has maintained close ties with the FCM since its co-founding as the Union of Canadian Municipalities in 1910 by William Lighthall, the city's mayor from 1901 to 1903.

### Jogger hit by car in mixed communication

A young NDG woman was reported taken to hospital June 6 after being hit by a small Canada Post truck at Côte St. Antoine and Lansdowne around 11:53 am. In relaying the incident, Public Security officials said both she and the driver had signalled the other to proceed but ended up crossing the intersection at the same time. The victim, a jogger, suffered injury to the face, leg and arm but was conscious and able to speak with officers. Fire department first responders took over her care until Urgences Santé arrived to take her to the Montreal General Hospital, accompanied by her parents, who had been contacted.



### **Remembering Mary Sancton, matriarch of publishing family**

Mary Sancton, retired social worker, avid gardener and matriarch of the Sancton family that owned and published the Westmount Examiner for two decades, died June 10. She would have turned 96 June 23.

She had been living at Manoir Westmount for many years and had only recently moved to Château Westmount, where she was reported by the family to have died peacefully after a long and full life.

A private service at her request took place last weekend.

Widow of John Sancton, she is survived by her three sons and their wives - Andrew and Pam of London, Ontario; Ted and Zsuzsi Kapas of Montreal; and Don and Jeanie of Beaconsfield - as well as grandchildren Rebecca, Derek, Robin, Lara, Kimberley and Matthew.

Mary Sancton not only took a keen interest in the newspaper business but forged her own career working first as a factory inspector in her native London during World War II. She obtained a graduate degree from McGill in her 50s and worked

until mandatory retirement at age 65.

"Looking back now," said son Don, "I think it's interesting to see how the role of

as a social worker based in Westmount women has changed in her lifetime. And how she was a player, working in the war, forced to stop her first job in social work due to pregnancy and then forced to retire.

"She was committed to her family and her work and was very perseverant. She seemed quite willing and able to roll with events. Maybe it was that British trait of being able to carry on. We (as sons) were demonstrated, and provided with, principles to live by and achieve, without being preached at and without being told to do a particular thing."

Sancton was born Mary Alice Bain in Blackheath. She met and married John in England while he was serving with the RCAF. She came to Canada as a war bride in 1946.

They lived in Stanstead and Fredericton before finally settling in Ormstown while maintaining a small apartment in Westmount. They moved to Westmount after raising the family and subsequently to the Manoir whose controversial founding John had spearheaded as president of the Rotary Club of Westmount.

Taking an interest in community concerns, Mary served as president of the now-defunct Seniors of Westmount Action Group (SWAG).

"I'm forever grateful for having come to Canada," she told the Independent in a profile at age 91 (see October 1, 2008).

### Station 12 Reports Witness watched car break-in on Tupper St.

A pair of sunglasses and a memory stick were stolen.

A witness came forward and said he saw a suspect fleeing from the vehicle with objects in his hands. The suspect, Pimentel said, fled in a white, four-door Chevrolet driven by another individual.

The suspect who did the burglarizing is described as a white male, 5'8" and wearing black sweat pants with green stripes on the side.

"If you notice something, don't wait to notify authorities," said Pimentel. "Call 911 immediately while it's happening, so we can have a better chance of catching the suspects. Ideally, you'd get the licence plate of a vehicle used in a crime."

### **Summit Woods project** to study user interaction

A research study of how various users of Summit Woods interrelate is being undertaken by an NDG resident studying at the University of Waterloo.

Taryn Graham, an MA candidate in the department of Recreation and Leisure Studies, has launched an online survey as part of her master's program to collect feedback from user groups on demographics and experiences in Summit Woods - all with the support of city council.

### Lulham presented ideas to council

"I presented her ideas to council members, and we decided to support her by allowing her to put up posters in Summit Woods about the survey," said Councillor Cynthia Lulham, commissioner of Parks and Urban Planning.

"The Summit Woods Research Project" is described by Graham as aiming to find ways "to help promote community-based dialogue and provide guidance for trail etiquette that is considerate of people, animals and the environment."

Being a dog owner familiar with issues involving dogs in the nature reserve, Graham "thinks the groups for and against can be bridged," Lulham explained. Her findings could be ready as early as the fall, Lulham said.

John Fretz, president of the Summit Woods Advisory Committee, told the In*dependent* that while this group represents various users, it had not yet been contacted by Graham for input.

### Find balance

A solution to finding the balance between dogs and other users of natural areas is not confined to Westmount, he said. "We have yet to find ours. To do so is very complex, involves a lot of historical research and if you want something you have to pay for it."

### Remembering Colin Irving (1934-2013)

Noted litigator Colin Irving died June 11.

Irving went to school in Westmount, lived here and worked in the city since in 1997, when he founded the firm now called Irving Mitchell Kalichman, currently located at Alexis Nihon.

He was best known as a constitutional expert, and appeared before the Supreme

Court over 20 times. His work included landmark cases involving the legalization of gay marriage, the repatriation of the British North America Act and Bill 101. He also obtained the 1988 release of Janise Gamble, who was wrongfully convicted of murder in 1976. Irving worked on that case *pro bono* and later added to his volunteer work by working at the Mile End legal clinic and founding the Tyndale St. Georges legal clinic.

In 2010, Irving was awarded the inaugural Médaille St. Yves by Pro Bono Québec. He was to go to Toronto in May as one of the Canadian Civil Liberties Association's "Celebrating Canada" honourees for 2013, but was unable to attend due to illness.

Irving was a keen squash and badminton player, and won many titles, including the Canadian doubles open in 1960 and the Canadian Masters singles championship in 1995.

He is survived by his three children, Andrew, Caroline and Gillian.

He was profiled in the November 16, 2010 *Independent* (p. 14).

# Westmount Y closes weight room for renovations

The Westmount YMCA's weight-room aficionados are being forced to look elsewhere for their summer work-out sessions this June after the Y closed its third-floor conditioning room for renovations.

The room has been closed since June 3 as part of a three-week plan to repair and upgrade the floor's equipment and decor, including the replacement of the floor and track.

"The floor of any weight room in any fitness centre will typically undergo a great deal of wear and tear," said Westmount YMCA director Gary White. "As the floor wears down and acquires scuffs and tears, it can pose a risk to members. It was simply time for us to replace our floor."



## May sales: Very slow

The following article relates to offers to purchase Westmount residential dwellings, which were reported by local real estate agents as having been accepted in May 2013. Because they are not final registered sales, the ad*dresses and prices cannot be made public but* give a good idea of current trends in local real estate activity. The graph offers a picture of these trends over time.

Westmount's real estate market slowed to a crawl in May this year, recording only 10 sales in the month – which is usually one of the busiest in the year - with an average of almost 19 transactions.

Prices were very low as well, with four less than \$1 million and only two above \$1.5 million, the highest just over \$2 million. Still, the lowest price was \$861,000 the highest minimum price since January - and the average mark-up was 24 percent, about the same level it was in April. The adjusted average price is down only one or two percent from levels seen in the last several months.

At the same time, we are seeing new houses coming on the market very late in the spring. MLS records show that at least 65 single-family dwellings have been listed since April 1, not including those which sold right away. Of the 10 that sold in May, the average time on the market was 196 days, or 6.5 months; two were on the market for more than a year; and only one sold in less than 45 days.


The latest check of the MLS tables is 157 listings in Westmount, 62 of them (almost 40 percent) asking over \$2 million, only 21 under \$1 million. Whether some of the listings are only "fishing expeditions" is difficult to say, and certainly there are houses in Westmount that are worth well over \$2 million, but the prospects of finding buyers at that level appear to be extremely thin. So far this year, agents have reported seven sales between \$2 and \$3 million, three more over \$3 million and none over \$4 million.

### Busy condo market

The condominium market was busy in May, as was the adjacent-Westmount market. Five condos ranging from \$360,000 to \$860,000 were sold, along with two co-op apartments and a flat in a triplex.

There were almost as many sales in adjacent-Westmount districts, with two

north of the city, two west of Westmount, one just east and three in the Square Mile, including two on Redpath Crescent. The various districts experienced five sales in each of February and March, nine in April and now eight in May.

The market can be expected to slow down even more as spring turns into summer, meaning sellers will have to become more realistic about their prices.



## Montreal Children's Library closed while Atwater Library undergoes renovations, programming continues

The main branch of the Montreal Children's Library, housed within the Atwater Library, closed May 24 for renovations. Scheduled to re-open at the end of November, it continues to provide its regular programming but has had to suspend its lending library.


In September, the "Moms and Tots" and "Pre-School Story Times" programs will be taking place temporarily at the Montreal Oral School for the Deaf in Westmount



### Local students honoured for anti-bullying awareness

High school students from Westmount High were honoured May 29 for their commitment to end bullying, each earning a certificate indicating their completion of the Canadian Red Cross' "Beyond The Hurt" program.

"When the program was presented to us, right away we thought it would be a success, and it was. The feedback that we got was unbelievable, but it's still just the start of something that can get even bigger," said Royal Vale principal Nathalie Lacroix-Maillette, at whose school the ceremony took place.

The two local schools are among a half dozen English Montreal School Board institutions to introduce Beyond The Hurt this spring, signalling the program's opening foray into Quebec.

Created by RespectED, the violence prevention wing of the Canadian Red Cross, the program attempts to help resolve bullying issues by training students as youth peer facilitators to help transform the culture of harassment in their respective schools.

In March and April, RespectED's

provincial lead, Nicolas Nadeau, travelled to each school to meet with between 10 to 15 students, using a series of educational activities over two days to teach them nonconfrontational methods to resolve and prevent future bullying issues.

"Everybody in this room has power. It might not be the same amount of power, but we all have power," said Nadeau.

In the second part of the program, the newly trained facilitators will deliver a bullying prevention presentation to their classmates.

"It's great when you have the information yourself, but you need to be able to share it with the rest of your school," said Nadeau.

The program's implementation coincides with the provincial government's institution of Bill 56 last summer, which forces every Quebec school to create and adopt a comprehensive anti-bullying and anti-violence plan.

During the ceremony, Nadeau handed out individual certificates to each student who completed the program, as well as a group one for each school to hang in its hallway.

The ceremony was supplemented by a

medley sung by Royal Vale's glee club, including a performance of Aretha Franklin's version of "Respect" and a slideshow chronicling Royal Vale students' meeting with Nadeau.

Youth facilitators from Marymount,

Royal Vale, LaurenHill Academy and Vincent Massey Collegiate were also honoured. Students from the final EMSB school to complete the program, James Lyng, were unable to attend.

### Westmount Art Scene Saskatchewan's Perehudoff and Montreal Jewish artists

This month, two Westmount galleries feature work of artistic merit and historic value. William Perehudoff's abstract colour combinations dominate Han Art Gallery, while "The Jewish Painters of Montreal" at West End Gallery offers a mix of landscape and figurative studies.

### Perehudoff at Han Art Gallery

Perehudoff (1918-2013) is one of Canada's best known abstract artists. Introduced in 1963 to the Color Field movement by New York artist Kenneth Noland, for the duration of his career, Perehudoff explored the emotional effect of colour on colour. Yet these spacious compositions are also a bold interpretation of Saskatchewan's distinct landscape.

"A Winter Tale" (1965) is a horizontal composition of indigo, blue, ochre and burgundy lines. As the lines vary in width from left to right, the colour undulates like ribbon. Painted in acrylic on raw canvas, the design suggests wheat fields, snow drifts and sky.


The 1965 circular composition (AC-89-004) features yellow, ochre and grey rings set against a burgundy background. Combining soft-edged shapes with glossy acrylic lines, Perehudoff creates "a pulse" or active interplay between colours and shapes.

Å more recent painting (AC-97-04), contains hard-edge pink and yellow blocks painted in acrylics. Set at various angles, the subtle shifts from the vertical create an enlivening imbalance that is representative of his later work.

### "The Jewish Painters of Montreal" at West End Gallery

This exhibit features work by artists from Montreal's Jewish community, created from 1930 to 1975. Noted for both social realism and landscape, these artists include: Alexander Bercovitch, Ghitta Caiserman Roth, Harry Mayerovitch, Louis Muhlstock, Ernst Neumann, Moe Reinblatt as well as Jack Beder, Rita Briansky and Sam Borenstein.

Beder is known for his streetscapes. Painted in oils, "Along St. Louis Square" (1940) features Montreal architecture, while "Gastown Vancouver" (1940) depicts a commercial street. The exhibit also includes five sketches from his series "Cafe Scene." Drawn from 1930 to 1935, the café's clientele come alive in quick, repetitive strokes.

Briansky's sketches "Country Interiors"

(1945), and "Family Portrait" (1946) of postwar immigrants capture the social reality of the day. Her painting "Picking Milkwood" (1975) depicts a young woman outlined in black. Black twigs painted with loose brushstrokes adds a design element to the work.

Several of Borenstein's oil paintings of Quebec towns are included: "Ste. Lucie, Quebec" (1963) and "St. Césaire, Quebec" (1965), featuring his mentor A. Y. Jackson in the foreground. A rare watercolour, "Brittany Boats" (1939), is painted in Borenstein's signature orange and red.

Interesting in both content and style, "Jewish Painters of Montreal" continues until Saturday, June 22 at West End Gallery, 1358 Greene Ave.

### The test of time

These exhibits provide a unique opportunity to view work of artistic and historic significance. Han Art Gallery's Perehudoff exhibit is the first in Quebec since 1993, while West End Gallery's retrospective, "The Jewish Painters of Montreal" reflects our Canadian heritage.

### Trent protests to AMT, CP Prospect-ors decry train signals in front of homes

#### By LAUREEN SWEENEY

A group of residents on Prospect are up in arms over a large signalling structure to be installed in front of their street, whose houses face the train tracks.

"Why smack in the middle of the only street facing the track?" asked resident Frank Candido.

The residents are also upset that Prospect, along with Clandeboye, had not received fliers announcing an information meeting June 6 on railway construction work this summer distributed by the Agence métropolitaine de transport (AMT).

The problem came to light when local councillor Theodora Samiotis sent out reminder emails June 4 to several of the residents, encouraging them to attend the meeting to receive up-to-date information on the work and "the impact it will potentially have for our area."

"I think it is important," she wrote, "for residents to be at this meeting – particularly those living on Prospect, Greene and Clandeboye area, as some of the major signalling work that is being planned will be taking place in that section of the tracks."

She told the *Independent* that the city had not been consulted about the work

ropolitaine de transport (AMT) to hold a special meeting this week with residents of Prospect over the new signal structure. "We want to bring both sides together," Samiotis said.

A tentative meeting date of Thursday, June 20 at 7 pm at Centre Greene was unconfirmed, Samiotis said Monday at press time.

"I'm pleased the mayor understands the situation and is playing ball with us," said Candido, who pressed for the private meeting along with five other Prospect residents concerned they had not been adequately informed about the plan to erect a 26-foot signalling structure (gantry) in front of their houses (see story above).

Two of the three described at a public information meeting June 6 are to be placed in front of homes facing the tracks. These are at Prospect and the "POM condos" at 4700 St. Catherine (see June 11, p. 5).

In his letter to the CTA, Trent stated that "We are not satisfied with the manner that the notice of the proposed work was

and only learned about it at a meeting with the AMT and Canadian Pacific (CP) May 21. That was when she had requested an information meeting be held and offered city hall as a venue (see June 11, p. 5).

"The AMT ran out of fliers," she explained. "It's very sad because the whole intent of the meeting was to give people an avenue to discuss plans with the AMT, but it was the execution that faltered."

Despite an email sent from Samiotis to six Prospect residents June 4 and an email from the Westmount Train Action Committee (WTAG) sent to 13 people living on Prospect June 3, no one attended from Prospect or Clandeboye. David Schacter of WTAG said he sent out 200 email notices in total.

Resident Candido said he did not feel the need to attend since he believed the construction work impacted residents further west where a third track is being built and that people on Prospect would not be affected by the signalling station.

"This is not just about construction noise for a few weeks, the impact is for the rest of our lives," stated Anita Chandan, whose house at 41 Prospect, directly overlooks the location of the proposed new structure.

### Signals must meet criteria

Councillor Cynthia Lulham, who works professionally in the railway industry, told the *Independent* that the positioning of signals is prescribed by Transport Canada according to various criteria such as distances from each other and the switches. The lights don't flash, she said, and are installed in cones so they cannot be seen from the side.

The old signalling structures have to remain in use, and therefore in place, until the new ones were operational, which would suggest that they had to be installed at different locations,Lulham said.

The new Prospect signals would replace existing ones at Hallowell and at Atwater.

The new structures, called gantries, are needed to span three tracks rather than

Prospect residents may not be the only ones looking out their front windows onto one of the three proposed new railway signalling structures (see "Residents tell AMT, CP to limit track work to daytime only," June 11, p. 5). So may some residents of the "POM" condo building at 4700 St. Catherine.

Councillor Gary Ikeman, who is president of the condo association, said he was told that one of the three new ones would be directly behind the building, which is actually the front façade for condos facing the tracks.

The current signal structure (gantry) is just to the east of the building, aligned almost at the Bethune tunnel into the Public Works yard.

He said he asked a Canadian Pacific official at the end of the train meeting June 6 at city hall to position the new gantry to the west of the building rather than in the middle of it. "He said he would look into it."



## Flore discovers watery vestige in its new location

You never know what you're going to uncover when you're moving into a new space.

The owners of Flore, a flower and décor store currently located at 5008 Sherbrooke St., were in the midst of refurbishing their new outlet just down the street when they made an interesting discovery.

"Years ago this was a private house," said Gilles Lord, who has run Flore with Denis d'Etcheverry since 1995.

In the process of gutting the basement and first floor of the former townhouse built in 1911 to create a combined space, they uncovered what they believe are the remains of an interior swimming pool.

"It must have been about 10 feet deep," Lord said, pointing out details in an area at the back of the first storey, where a basin-like structure was filled with gravel after the building was rededicated for commercial use.

According to Lord, the building has a colourful past. "It was supposed to have been a bordello," he said, adding that the pool is said to have been installed by "an old gentleman" many decades ago.

Lord and d'Etcheverry plan to move into the new location at 4932-4932A Sherbrooke in September when the renovations are completed.

wide costs. Almost \$1 million also went to the Montreal Metropolitan Community for the city's regional share.

Council immediately appropriated \$2.6 million of the surplus to specific items. The lion's share of this – \$2 million in equal amounts – was allocated to the extension of the new arena's second rink (to be repaid through fundraising) and to soil decontamination of the former Glen bus terminal property on-going since 1991.

This amount brings the city's total accumulated surplus to \$21.4 million earmarked for specific causes such as unexpected snowfalls. There is no specific plan yet for the unappropriated surplus of \$804,000, according to city director general Duncan Campbell.

The year's results also reflected delays in the timetable for the building of the Westmount recreation centre, which generated more revenue than expected from interest on short-term cash deposits offset only slightly by increased costs of extending the recreation programs.

Less snowfall than expected in 2012 reduced those costs and shaved some \$800,000 off the budget of \$3.3 million while personnel vacancies and less graffiti translated into lower than budgetted Public Security costs.

# How tall will new pool fence be?

Along with landscaping details for the new Westmount recreation centre (WRC), one item that also appears to be undecided is the height of the pool fence, which now is to be extended to include some portion of the now closed Lansdowne dog run.

The fence around the perimeter of a pool property must be at least six feet high under the city by-law, according to Urban Planning director Joanne Poirier, though she said she did not know if a higher one was contemplated. "I would be more comfortable with eight feet," said Sports and Recreation director Mike Deegan, the city's WRC project coordinator.

The old pool fence was 10- or 12-feet high, but people still managed to climb it.

### Poodle needs 12 stitches after 'hit-andrun' attack

A Westmount woman went to Public Security offices June 6 to report an attack on her dog by another May 31, officials said. The attack caused "considerable injury" to her white poodle by a tan pit bull that took place at 2:45 pm on The Boulevard west of Mount Pleasant near her residence. The owner of the other dog, described as an unknown woman in her 20s, was reported to have just kept on walking with it. That fence, however, was installed some 50 years ago before motion detectors and other surveillance tools became commonplace. The area will now be closely monitored, said Councillor Patrick Martin.

Plans consulted at city hall prepared before the dog run was closed show the pool area enclosed by a black chain-link fence of unspecified height surrounded by hedging. Pools in the backyard of homes are now also required by provincial law to be fenced off at a height of four feet to prevent direct access from the house.

In Westmount, where the six-foot high fence enclosure is also required, most people choose to erect the four-foot fence across the end of the property where the pool is located, Poirier explained.
