The joint project to pump out hydrocarbons has been going on since 1992 at a cost to Westmount at between \$4 million and \$5 million based on some \$200,000 a year the city has been allocating to the project, according to director general Duncan Campbell.

Both parties claimed the other was responsible for hydrocarbons found on the water table in the area though the original source is still not known (see separate story, p. 5).

Steps spelled out to re-energize city utility Hydro identifies need for multi-million-dollar investment

As Westmounters keep using more and more electricity, Hydro Westmount is faced with the need to replace aging equipment and an antiquated billing system, and to plan for a multi-million-dollar increase in electrical capacity. The price tag: at least \$6 million to \$8 million.

This is all part of a long-term plan to secure the revenue base and reposition the utility within the city operation to develop an investment strategy, director Benoit

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Hurtubise said last week.

"It's somewhat of a hidden jewel," he said of the small utility, "because it's a vital part of daily life and contributes to society. But it needs a lot of polishing."

Since Hurtubise joined Hydro Westmount almost a year ago from a career in the electrical industry, he says he has been trying to introduce best practices from the private sector into the government environment to increase efficiency and profitability.

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Police Report Westmounter helps subdue Metro robbery suspect on Prince Albert

The following news story is based on information from police reports provided by a Station 12 constable in an interview with the reporter.

A 32-year-old Westmounter helped subdue a man who had allegedly stolen beer and attacked a security guard at the Sherbrooke St. Metro grocery store on February 20, according to Station 12 Constable Adalbert Pimentel.

The 42-year-old suspect reportedly walked into the store at 5:40 pm, picked up two 660 ml beers and then proceeded to walk outside without paying.

When approached by a security guard, the suspect began to throw punches at his upper body and head, breaking free from him and eventually running from the store, said Pimentel.

The security guard caught up to the man as he neared the corner of Prince Albert Ave. and Winchester Ave., leading to a second altercation.

Witnessing a stand-off, the Westmounter decided to lend a hand to the security



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guard, enabling them to subdue the suspect and handcuff him, said Pimentel. With the Westmount resident watching the downed man, the security guard called police to arrest the suspect.

Pimentel applauded the resident for helping to defuse the situation, but believes a better course of action would have been to call 9-1-1 while tailing the suspect instead of creating a second altercation.

"When you see an incident, call as soon as you can because you never know if the suspect is armed. You don't know his mental state. There are a lot of variables you don't know. These things go quickly and a lot of bad things can happen," said Pimentel.

The suspect is a non-Canadian resident, so immigration officers will be brought into the process to help decide the suspect's punishment, if convicted.

"When you're not a Canadian citizen, your case is under study when there's an incident with police and when there's a criminal charge, Immigration has to be informed. At that point, an immigration officer takes over the file," he said.



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Pumping out the hydrocarbons, a 21-year saga recalled

Discovery of hydrocarbons in adjacent land parcels owned by Westmount and the Montreal Urban Community transit commission (now the STM) was initially reported in May 1992 after residents in St. Henri complained to Montreal's department of the Environment about odours of fuel from the sewer.

The transit commission argued it came from Westmount while the city maintained its usage of fuel oil from an old snow melting plant was small compared with some thousands of litres of diesel used at the bus depot and garages.

It was even suggested the contaminants could have come from the Glen rail yards, now the site of the super-hospital, a theory held by some, including city director general Duncan Campbell.

When the Quebec Environment ministry required the contaminants to be cleaned up, an agreement was struck between Westmount and the transit commission to split the costs 50-50.

After extensive boring of holes, pipes were installed through which the water and contaminants are still being sucked up and separated. The sludge is removed and the cleaner water disposed of in the sewers.

of the land that belongs to Westmount," Campbell said last week.

This offer is to enable work to start on the Turcot project and lower the Ville Marie expressway where the pumping is under way, he said.

"The MTQ wants to add additional pumps to aggressively take out all the contaminated material. They are willing to acquire our land for \$1 in exchange for the termination of the decontamination agreement that has been going on for many years."

Having received authority from city council February 17 to negotiate with the MTQ, Campbell said the issue is time sensitive since the MTQ requires approval from the Environment ministry before starting the Turcot work.

Significant impact foreseen

The loss of the land, however, "will have significant impact on Hydro Westmount's operations," he said. The Westmount land is 4,393 square meters beneath the Ville Marie expressway used by the utility for storage and parking. In 1999, the pumping was accelerated to prepare for the sale of the transit property. The installation of more pumps and equipment cost Westmount \$350,000, according to the city's annual report for that year.

The actual site of a *"cabane"* housing the pumps, separators and other equipment is located at the northwest section of the Home Depot parking lot under the highway, said Andrew Duffield who was in charge of the dossier at Public Works before his departure in 2012. Duffield is now Public Works director for Beaconsfield.

In everyone's best interests

"Access to the pumps will become difficult as the highway is lowered and the land is banked up at that location," he explained. The pump lines would have to be extended upward to remove the remaining contaminants, which would be very expensive. So accelerating the work "is in everyone's best interests."

Over the years, hundreds of thousands of litres of oil would have been removed, according to Bruce St. Louis who was city director general during much of the project. "It's been a very slow process in order to prevent the removal of too much water from the ground at one time."

After the remaining contaminants are removed under the MTQ's plan, Campbell said, the proposal calls for building a retaining wall and an underground "dam" to contain whatever residue might accumulate.

Other issues

Regardless of the Westmount issue, decontamination is required for much of the St. Jacques escarpment area along which the lowered expressway is to be built. This is the result of years of dumping asbestos and other contaminants off the embankment, he explained.

Westmount was no stranger to the practice. In 1951, it acquired property as a dump site on St. Jacques, then called Upper Lachine Rd.

In 1980, the city began using it for dumping snow until, after three winters, the Montreal Urban Community prohibited the discharge of any materials, including snow, along the embankment. The city subsequently sold the property. Municipalities are now prohibited from owning land outside their borders.

No one opposes \$5M in loan by-laws to renew infrastructure

Two loan by-laws to refurbish city infrastructure failed to attract any opposition when referendum registers were open February 19 at city hall, according to city clerk Viviana Iturriaga Espinoza. Not even one signature was obtained. As a result, both by-laws were deemed to be approved, she said.

By-law 1458 provides for a loan of \$440,000 for restoration work on the aerial and underground Hydro Westmount networks. By-law 1459 allows the city to borrow \$4.4 million for roadway reconstruction, the refurbishing of water mains and rehabilitation of sewers.

Because each had the potential to lead to a city-wide referendum, a minimum of 500 signatures was required for each register. Details of work involved were not spelled out since all projects will require separate approval by city council.

Co-founder of Double Hook Judy Mappin remembered by family, book community

Judy Mappin, the former owner of The Double Hook Book Shop, a pillar in the world of Canadian literature, member of the Order of Canada, passionate feminist, pacifist, environmentalist and Westmounter, died on February 14. She was 85.

"Her life was a triumph of gentleness in an age in which gentleness and generosity are not always understood," her son-in-law Nicholas Kasirer said at Mappin's funeral, held February 22 at St. Matthias' Church.

Kasirer said Mappin never raised her voice and "she never called attention to herself. She always championed people around her." Mappin was bashful about personal achievement, Kasirer said. "She would not have called them accomplishments." Yet "her public life was full of great moments of achievement," he said. These included The Double Hook Book Shop, where she spent 31 years, "the robust recognition of Judy as a pillar in the world of Canadian letters, awards and appointments to literary juries, an honorary doctorate from her alma mater, McGill University, the Order of Canada on the initiative of dear friends and more," Kasirer said.

"What better sign of a Montrealer who has made it than an Aislin cartoon in *The Gazette*?" Kasirer said. "And even that cartoon seems touched by Judy's gentleness and generosity."

Kasirer said there was "nothing weak" about Mappin's gentleness. "She had causes she cared about passionately and acted on with vigour. Women in science, of which she was one herself, women in literature, after all, among the many great things that The Double Hook was, it was a place to be a feminist. The municipal mergers, pacifism, the environment, the horse business at Windfields, in which she invested countless hours preserving the legacy of her father and of her late brother Charles and 10,000 charities, maybe more which she quietly and loyally supported."

Nuclear-free Westmount

"One of the achievements that mum was most proud of is she was instrumental in having Westmount declared a nuclear free zone," Mappin's son, Jefferson Mappin said at the funeral. "The symbolism was as important as the sentiment." He said he remembered his mother gathering her children together with Double Hook co-founder Hélène Holden. "We were all under about 10 years old at the

Selwyn's maintenance supervisor Remembering Marc Krushelnyski

Marc Krushelnyski, the longtime maintenance supervisor at Selwyn House School, died February 17, announced the school the same day. Krushelnyski began working at the school in 1980 and retired in 2007. In addition to his maintenance duties, he was well known for his work on the school plays, especially the sets. He was 72.

He is survived by his wife, Christine, who runs Selwyn's print shop and book room, and has done so since 1981.

In 2012 (see December 4, p. 9), the *Independent* reported that the couple had been made honorary Old Boys.

"When I started at Selwyn in the early 1980s, Marc was a ubiquitous presence at the school," said *Independent* publisher David Price. "It may have officially been run by the board and a headmaster, but Marc was someone whom we saw every day and who took an interest in everything. Even his office, right on the ground floor's busiest hallway, was the most central one.

After Mappin retired and closed the Double Hook in 2005, Maya Byers, the founder and owner of Babar books, opened a bookstore in the house on Greene Ave. and rented the space from Mappin. Byers told the *Independent* she was a student at Sir George Williams when the Double Hook opened. "Margaret Atwood invited our class to the opening." Byers said she knew Mappin as a bookseller. "The book community is quite a close community."

Mappin's family said Mappin loved and honoured her husband John, who predeceased her, for over 50 years, that she modeled generosity and gentleness to her children, Hugh, who predeceased her and to John, Jefferson, Jane and Charles. Kasirer told Mappin's grandchildren, Benjamin, Antonia and Olivia that in the last chapter of her life "you should know that in this life of great achievement alongside all the books and awards and medals...she thought of you as her greatest prize."

Glen power plant, a Westmount first

On February 20, Benoit Hurtubise, the director of Hydro Westmount, presented some fascinating, little-known historical background on Westmount firsts going back to 1906, the year the power plant opened in the Glen.

Hurtubise explained that Westmount was the first city to set up a destructor plant to destroy garbage and produce electricity.

Before 1904, electric current was provided to Westmount residents by many different private corporations. They merged and a new company was formed that increased the charge.

Westmount citizens proposed that a municipal plant be constructed and operated by the city. The Light and Power Department opened in 1906 and reductions in rates were made over the years. The audience was delighted to learn that today we pay six cents per Kilowatt-hour, the same charge as in 1912.

The steam plant was designed with 4,000 Kilowatt turbo-alternators used for electricity production.

Workers at PO building generate complaint

Investigating a complaint at 7 am about the use of construction equipment February 16 at 4895 Sherbrooke, public safety officers reported finding a woman chiding the workers inside the former post office building.

Public Security officials said the woman, who lived nearby, was told to leave and the workers were warned that construction was not permitted on a Sunday. They were described as cooperative and stated they were picking up their equipment.



Hurtubise explained that today Hydro Westmount operates out of the main station in the Glen and three other substations: Olivier, north of de Maisonneuve Blvd.; Park, beside the chalet in King George (Murray) Park and St. Antoine, under the lawn bowling clubhouse. The city is divided into 215 primary service blocks. The main cables are underground in conduits.

Great interest was shown by the audience when Hurtubise explained the distribution system. Pointing to a huge map, he indicated the underground cables and the above-ground electrical wires on poles behind houses.

Destruction of garbage, snow

Meanwhile, the destruction of garbage had become a huge problem for the small city.

With the plant, the city coped with both problems.

This was also the main disposal point for snow removal in Westmount. Trucks dumped snow directly into tanks where the heat from burning garbage melted the snow. The plant was capable of disposing of 720 tons of snow per hour and the discharge was carried directly into the sewer system.

This lecture was the first of four talks on "firsts" in Westmount. The next speaker will be Duncan Campbell on March 20, who will explain how the position of director general was a first.

that includes repositioning the utility either as an independent business entity or a city department (see November 26, p. 1).

Over the years, profits generated by the utility have typically been added to the city's operating revenue rather than pumped back into the utility, with the result, contend some, that its development has not kept pace with growth.

The network now has a maximum capacity of some 100 megavolt amperes (MVA) provided by 12 "feeds" (circuits) from Hydro Quebec sub-stations.

Its one-percent annual growth is expected to continue, generated in large part by heating conversions. While the utility's peak demand this winter from its 10,000 commercial and residential customer accounts reached 86 MVA in January, last year the network hit a peak of 92 MVA.

If you think this has been a long cold winter, "it's a fact," said Hydro Westmount director Benoit Hurtubise. "Consumption of electricity has been 25 percent greater on average in December and January than the same period last year."

And this has been reflected in increases in recent electricity bills, he explained. "Residents have been calling in to ask about the increase."

February, on the other hand, has been relatively normal.

Regardless of the weather, however, rate increases are on the way, Hurtubise said. Increases have been requested by Hydro Quebec from the Régie de l'énergie, the province's electricity regulator.

Once the Régie approves a change in the fee structure, it will be passed down to Hydro Westmount when it buys in bulk from Hydro Quebec. In turn, the Westmount utility will be required to charge its customers at the approved rate. Hydro Westmount, he pointed out, has no control over the rates which are set by the Régie.

Hurtubise expects the new rates to be known in time for Westmount to present its new electricity by-law at the April 7 council meeting.

Updating system

As a result, preparations are now under way to go out to tender this spring to obtain an up-to-date system on a budget of \$650,000. This would benefit both the utility as well as customers who have questions about their files. It would also have the potential to enable customers to access and pay accounts by internet.

"We're one of the few utilities that doesn't have this capability," Hurtubise said. And this includes other small independent utilities along with Westmount that form AREQ, the Association of Redistributors of Electricity in Quebec.

The other members are Alma, Amos, Baie Comeau, Coaticook, Coopérative St. Jean Baptiste (an electricity coop), Joliette, Magog, Saguenay and Sherbrooke. The rest of the province is served directly by Hydro Quebec.

Such a new billing system, he said, would have red-flagged an error in a bill sent recently to one homeowner for \$22,000 for one month (see story February 18, p. 4).

Restructuring, planning for succession

Over the last year, Hurtubise has organized the 35 Hydro employees into



three departments. The largest is Operations, which manages the underground and aerial network as well as street lights. Its manager is Salah Bouziane, who has become assistant director of the utility.

The other departments are Engineering under William Ta and Customer Service headed by Beatrice Simone.

Succession plans are being developed within each department and group which, according to Hurtubise, is critical given that many employees are nearing retirement.

"There is a lot to do here," he said. "But Hydro Westmount has a very strong and talented team that will do what it takes. And teamwork and collaboration are some of the key values we are promoting."





Westmount Square merchants reflect on medical clinics

As a by-law to limit medical clinics in Victoria village passes (see February 11, p. 1), one might ask what effect medical, dentistry and other health services have on retail businesses on the other side of the city in Westmount Square.

In the Vic village debate, some argued that patients use parking spaces, but do not shop. According to some local, independently-owned businesses, the experience on Greene has been nothing but favourable.

Asked if Westmount Square's medical clinics bring him business, Maurice Ingber of the women's clothing boutique Chic Paris said, "Of course. Thank God that we have the medical clinics."

Ingber said he's been in business 38 years, including 10 years at Westmount Square. "We do get a good response from the medical clinics." But customers also come from condominiums on Greene Ave., from Westmount Square and from Château Westmount Square. Passers-by, people walking on St. Catherine who come

inside Westmount Square, also discover the store, Ingber said,

What if the medical clinics left?

"It would affect us a lot," Ingber said. "This is a destination mall. Once they discover us they become regulars."

Sharon, an employee of the Westmount Gourmet kitchenware store who asked that her last name not be used, said the mall's medical and x-ray clinics "bring people in from all over the place. For us people have their medical appointments and while they're waiting, they wander around," Sharon said.

She said people living in the building also drop by the store, which has been at Westmount Square for 12 years.

Vicky Papazoglou of the Boutique Surprise gift shop said Westmount Square's medical clinics bring people in to the store. "While they're waiting for their appointments, because the wait is quite long, they do tend to walk around the mall and shop around," said Papazoglou, who has worked at the boutique for 15 years. "So I do think it has its benefits."

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

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



Chicken-Couscous meatloaves

Couscous is rolled granules made from crushed and ground semolina. Cooking it with water binds the granules. In this recipe, couscous replaces bread crumbs, which are usually used in meatloaves, as a binding agent, and it keeps the mixture moist and juicy.

INGREDIENTS:

½ cup (125 mL) couscous
1 medium zucchini, grated
1/3 cup (75 mL) finely chopped red onion
¼ cup (60 mL) finely chopped sage

1½ tsp (7mL) kosher salt

Instructions:

Preheat the oven to 425°F (220°C). Line a baking sheet with parchment paper.

In a small saucepan, bring ¾ cup (185 mL) of water to a boil. Stir in the couscous, cover, remove from heat, and let stand for 5 minutes.

Transfer the couscous to a large bowl and fluff with a fork. Stir in the zucchini, onion, sage, salt and pepper. Add the chicken and egg and mix well. Shape into 4 oval ½ tsp (2 mL) pepper
1 lb (500g) ground chicken
1 large egg, lightly beaten
¼ cup (60 mL) light brown sugar
2 tbsp (30 mL) Dijon mustard
2 tsp (10 mL) tomato paste

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Singer co-founded company with Gavizon Workhoppers: A dating site for workers and companies

Linda Singer, a Westmount resident, and Vera Gavizon of Côte St. Luc spent over a year in coffee shops carefully planning Workhoppers, a matching site for flexible and casual work.

Though Workhoppers (workhoppers. com) launched in August 2012, the website has only been online for six months. Workhoppers helps companies find local professionals during busy periods or when they don't have the necessary in-house skills.

The site operates globally in English and French (a Spanish site is planned for the end of 2014), with companies finding local people in neighbourhoods, for the most part, across Canada but also in the United States and in other parts of the world. Over 3,000 freelance members have joined so far. Of these, 61 percent are female and 54 percent have a university degree.

For small and medium-sized businesses offering work on a part-time, temporary, contract or freelance basis, "it's an extra hand," Gavizon explained. Instead of using a temp agency, "you can go direct and find somebody you need." Gavizon said many companies can't afford to pay full-time workers and hiring temp agencies two-to-three times a year is expensive.

"We have about 200 companies right now," Singer said. "Most of the companies understand easily the concept of hiring a part-time person. The challenge is for them to understand that they can easily hire a local person even for just a few hours to help them."

Gavizon said she and Singer met when their children were in daycare. The inspiration for Workhoppers came from their experiences as working moms. Both Gavizon and Singer hold MBAs, but struggled to balance their "dream jobs" with raising children, they said.

Once a full-time management consultant, Gavizon said she found it "impossible" to give her two children the attention she felt they deserved while also working hard at a glamorous career. So she started

working on a project-by-project basis. "I liked the flexibility," she said.

It was a similar experience for Singer, who has a Master's degree in information science and business administration.

Gavizon said when they dreamed up Workhoppers they thought about the talented and well-educated mothers they knew who wanted to work, but whom fulltime hours didn't suit. "We thought it was a mom issue, but it's not," Gavizon said.

With talk of a flexible work revolution, stay-at-home mothers aren't the only people seeking flexible work arrangements and a better work-life balance, Singer and Gavizon said. Generation Y (people born between 1978 and 1989) tends to embrace opportunities to balance work and life, there are semi-retired people looking for work and even moonlighters, for instance lawyers who like to blog or human resources folks who enjoy writing and who don't mind working outside their regular



work hours. Students are looking for work experience and chances to build up their CVs, Singer said, pointing to Workhoppers' ties with universities and with Youth Employment Services.

Wanting flexibility doesn't mean people work less or perform poorly, Gavizon and Singer said. "They want to work very hard," Gavizon said. "They just want to work when they can." Added Singer: "That's what sets freelancers apart, they want to do an amazing job."

Singer called Workhoppers "a dating site for freelance workers and companies



to find each other." Freelancers post online profiles listing their location, résumé, education, skills and availability (mornings, afternoons or evenings; onsite, offsite or virtual) and companies post jobs or projects stating who they're looking for. Only members can browse profiles and posts, receive matches or contact other members. "It's a community and you find each other," said Singer, stressing that Workhoppers is not a job site but a skill site. Sometimes positions aren't advertised and companies find people by browsing profiles, she said.

The site uses 10 categories and "each category has many different skills," Gavizon said. Work is geared to professionals and involves such skills as translation, HTML coding, blogging, legal work, preparing taxes, website development and marketing. But there's also shopping, data entry, continued on p. 22

Rather than repeat the same colours of the 60s era, the new version has a lighter, almost juicy glaze: aqua rather than turquoise, pale butter yellow rather than ochre, peach blush rather than orange... the retro colours are back!

Also, pattern and shape have returned. We saw a superb printed porcelain for our bathroom in a *faux* birch bark rectangle with a matte glaze. As we mentioned before, grey is the new beige. A light warm grey-taupe can be lovely, but be aware that it can be chilly and a bit unflattering to skin tones.

sparkling Swarovski coronets – and long white gloves, of course. Their partners were resplendent in white tie and tails.



organizing, bookkeeping and event planning work.

Non-profit groups are welcome to post volunteer positions, Singer said. "A lot of our Workhoppers are willing to volunteer their time," Gavizon said.

Membership is free for freelancers. As for companies, "what we offer is a 'freemium' model," Singer explained. Companies may post one job free and be seen and contacted by candidates, she said.

To post more than one job and receive "all the extra perks such as full access to the database, targeted networking of their jobs and matches based on our unique algorithm, which finds candidates to a fine degree of specification" Singer said companies pay an "extremely competitive" membership fee, that starts at \$49 for one month. That cost, Gavizon said, is a far cry from the \$600 a company pays to list on Workopolis or \$350 it costs on LinkedIn, where "it's It will be competing in the finals at the Weizmann Institute of Science in Israel on March 25 and 26. very expensive for short-term help."

Companies can rate workers and the reviews serve as recommendations and help in matching freelancers with companies. Singer said she and Gavizon vet companies to make sure they're legitimate.

And unlike answering an ad on Kijiji, where candidates often don't know who they're approaching, with Workhoppers candidates can create a profile and target companies. "We find that having a photo can help them sell themselves," Singer said. "A graphic designer can put an image of something they've done."

Unlike sites such as ODesk or Elance, where freelancers bid for contracts and work virtually, at Workhoppers companies and workers often meet in person and decide together how they want to work, Gavizon and Singer said. "When you take an Elance or ODesk job, you can't talk to the company in person." Gavizon said. "We want people to make decisions based on a connection," she said.

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
