

Expected to launch May 1 City to provide emergency alerts through CodeRED system

Westmount residents and businesses will soon be able to receive emergency alerts from the city via land-line and cell phones, email, texting or social media.

By adopting the CodeRED emergency notification system, the city will be taking advantage of the latest technologies to inform citizens quickly about boil-water advisories, major power outages and other emergencies, Councillor Philip Cutler told the city council meeting April 8.

The system is expected to be launched May 1. Calls will be identifiable on phone displays by the number 866.419.5000.

Citizens with listed landlines have already been registered in the system. Registration will be required for those who aren't and for citizens who also want to re-

ceive other types of notification. This includes people who frequent Westmount such as those who work here.

To register, go to the city's website.

"What's cool about this system is that it can target specific streets or areas," Cutler explained.

"It's part of our efforts to improve communication with residents," he said. "We want to make sure they receive information quickly in emergency situations."

The network is already in use in a number of other area municipalities such as Hampstead and many on the West Island and was initially proposed for Westmount by city director general Duncan Campbell following the boil-water advisory last May (see May 28, 2013, p. 10).

It will cost the city about \$12,000 a year, in- *continued on p. 10*

Developer hails Quebec election result 175 Metcalfe condos okayed by council as Martin dissents

City council paved the way April 8 for the start of the condo development at 175 Metcalfe.

In a 7-1 vote, councillors agreed to allow the demolition of the former Vanguard School building and the start of construction. A permit to start work was expected to be issued this week.

The lone dissenter, Councillor Patrick Martin, said that while "it was a good looking building," he could not vote in favour

of the project, which he felt had not been sufficiently downsized to meet a condition of the city's Demolition committee that he had chaired (see story July 9, 2013, p. 7). Sun studies had not been followed up on either.

He did, however, support a related item to reduce traffic on Metcalfe south of St. Catherine to one lane northbound; also to limit parking to the west side and for permit holders only. This will allow contractors to use the east traffic lane and sidewalk. *continued on p. 10*

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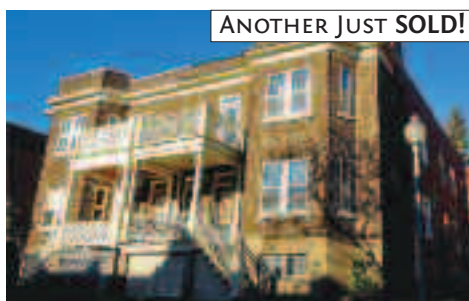
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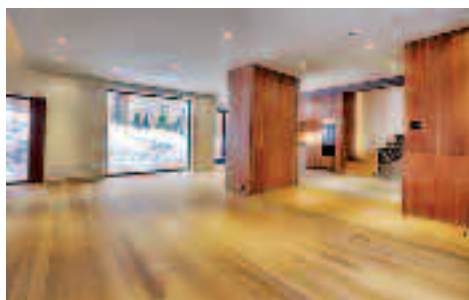
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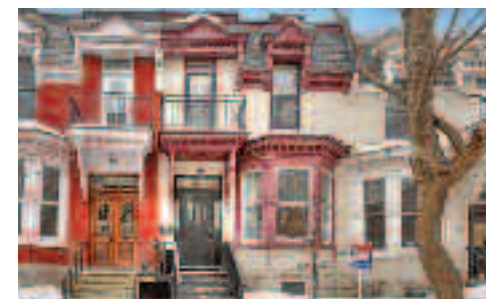

Puck goes wild, sets off arena sprinkler head

That's how Dave Lapointe, assistant director of Sports and Recreation, described what happened at a hockey practice April 3

shortly before 8:30 pm.

"It was a complete fluke, especially at that location: the last sprinkler head at the south end," he said.

The sprinklers are installed more than 20 feet above ice level.

Public Security and Public Works were called. The water was shut off and the remainder of the practice had to be cancelled, Lapointe said.

Councillor Patrick Martin said he was "looking into whether some sprinkler heads should be protected by a wire cage and if so, should this have been foreseen by the design-builder (Pomerleau)."

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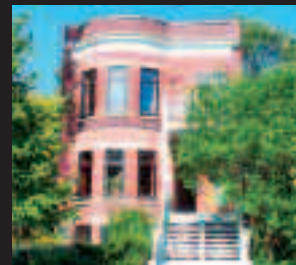
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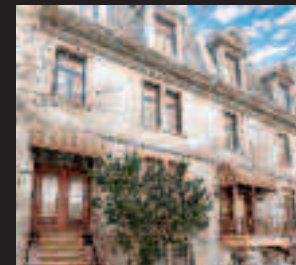


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WWCA's fake snow = dust

Council questioners asked to refrain from future 'theatrics'

A new provision is expected to be added to the city council's procedures for question period following use of a prop that went unintentionally awry at the April 8

meeting, Mayor Peter Trent said last week.

What he is suggesting is that "A questioner cannot use props, displays, costumes or other theatrical devices in an attempt to embellish his or her question."

The change stems from an effort by

several members of the Westmount Walking and Cycling Association (WWCA) to create an artificial snowbank on a table in the council chamber during the question period to emphasize what they claimed was the state of the winter bike path.

But as they starting dumping out the artificial snow from a bag, a cloud of dust from the material began filling much of the room leading to coughing, itching, wheezing and sore throats among some in the audience and even at the council table, which persisted through much of the ensuing meeting.

"I want to apologize to you all for our snowbank 'event' last evening and its consequences," wrote WWCA president Dan Lambert the next day to council members and director general Duncan Campbell with a copy to the *Independent*.

"We had no idea the artificial snow would generate so much dust, which caused breathing problems and stress for many people in the room, especially those with respiratory issues... [or that it] would disturb subsequent deliberations... and did not respect normal council decorum."

Trent told the *Independent* he accepted the apology.

Councillor Patrick Martin issued his own statement saying that "the incident was disruptive and extremely contemptuous and disrespectful of council and of the director general," who had been caught in the midst of the dust.

The 16-year-old had managed to slide open the window and partially remove the window grill.

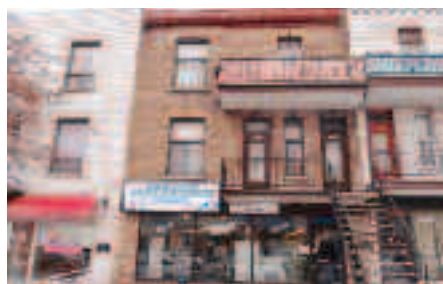
He explained he had left his wallet inside and was trying to get it. The patroller unlocked the door for him and the teen retrieved it.

He was told to call Public Security "next time."

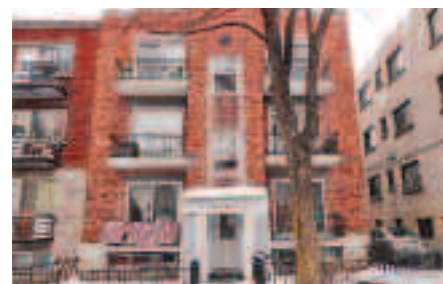
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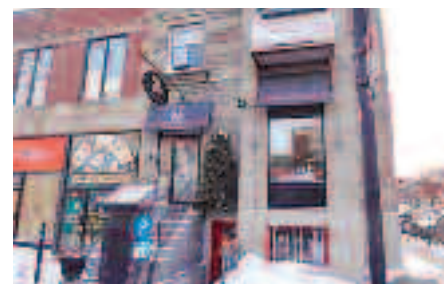
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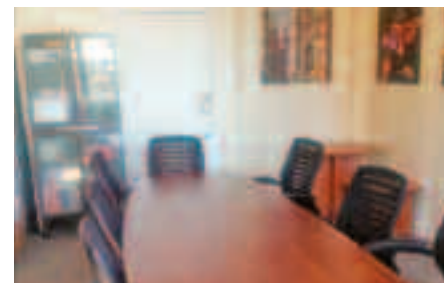

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Residents to be notified of meter replacement

City brings in promised opt-out from RF hydro meters

Westmount residents will soon be able to opt out of the city's ongoing installation of radiofrequency (RF) hydro meters under a new by-law adopted April 8. An alternative non-RF meter is expected to be available in about two months.

Providing a choice for residents has been publicly requested by various groups and citizens for some two years so that people may make personal choices regarding controversial health-impact issues related to RF equipment.

The new by-law also requires Hydro Westmount to notify customers in writing at least 30 days before replacing their meters.

The opt-out program to be offered by Hydro Westmount is conditional on the non-RF meter being positioned outside the house – at the resident's expense if relocation is required – and at an installation cost of \$99 and a monthly charge of \$5.

The installation fee is to be waived, however, in cases where an existing traditional electromechanical meter – now no longer on the market – is expiring and due

for required replacement, typically after 10 years.

Maureen Kiely, of the Westmount Municipal Association and the Healthy City Project (HCP), thanked the council at the meeting for bringing in the new policy.

Hydro Westmount has been phasing in the second-generation RF meters since 2008 because they can be read remotely from the street for improved accuracy and without requiring a meter reader to gain access to the home.

The RF emissions from this model are far lower than those from the third-generation "smart meter" used by Hydro Quebec as well as most commonly used RF equipment in the home.

Emissions 'not even a grain of salt'

In the global context of emission accumulation, they are "not even a grain of salt in a sandbox," Hydro Westmount director Benoit Hurtubise said last week.

The utility has set up its new opt-out program, he said, "to respect the freedom of choice for residents."

"We will always emphasize that the emissions from these meters are far below

the acceptable level" set by Health Canada and much lower than those of cell and wireless phones, baby monitors, WiFi-connected computers and microwave ovens.

Former councillor Tom Thompson, who chairs the Community Life committee of the Healthy City Project, said he was pleased the council had reviewed the matter and given residents an option. "It's the way it is in hundreds of US cities and the way it should be."

More monitoring

The HPC would continue to monitor emerging data on RF and share it with the council, he said.

Thompson's committee has driven the issue of an opt-out provision following initial requests and concerns raised by resident Megan Durnford, now a member of the HPC (see stories May 1, 2012, p. 11 and 13).

Its guidelines and recommendations submitted to the city called for an opt-out provision, advance notification of meter replacement and suitable locations for RF meters (see story October 23, 2012, p. 4).

RF-meter opponents express concerns

for a lack of long-term data, especially in the brain development of young children, and advocate for more stringent safety standards regarding RF levels as adopted by many European countries.

Information from Hydro Westmount about its new program and the second-generation meter is being posted on its website along with links to Health Canada and other websites.

A quiet air of confidence characterized the St. Catherine St. campaign office of Jacques Chagnon at 8:15 pm on April 7 as

he arrived to join his team and view the election results. By 8:30, it was announced that Chagnon had easily won his seat in the Westmount-St. Louis riding. Chagnon has been a provincial legislator for almost 30 years and has been returned seven times. He received 20,297 votes, while the closest rival was the PQ's Denise Larocche with 1,594. By 8:40, the CBC was forecasting a Liberal majority to the delight of the small group of campaign staff. In his acceptance speech, Chagnon thanked Connie Placido, assistant chief of staff, and his team for all their hard work and dedication. He went on to thank the people of Westmount-St. Louis for "clearly stating their confidence in the future of

Quebec."

He also gave a big thanks to "the Kelley effect," referring to Geoffrey Kelley, who represented him in the Victoria Hall candidates' debate. Chagnon remained neutral during the election because of his role as the speaker of the legislature. Kelley also won his seat in the West Island's Jacques Cartier riding by a huge margin, receiving 30,823 votes to the 2,128 votes of his closest rivals, the CAQ's Denis De-quire. Chagnon went on to say "my role as

the speaker or president of the National Assembly during the PQ term in office was unique, the first time in our history that a member of the opposition was elected to the position of speaker. This confused people in the rest of Canada who could not grasp how a separatist government could elect a Liberal speaker. It should be a lot easier for me to be elected as president this time around. If elected, it will be my third time as the president of the National Assembly."

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Election round-up

Westmount – St. Louis by the numbers

Heading into the April 7 provincial election, Liberal candidate Jacques Chagnon was always the prohibitive favourite to win another term in Westmount – St. Louis. However, with the province-wide rejection of the Parti Québécois and the disqualification of CAQ candidate François-Carl Labonté, the long-time legislator managed to score the largest drubbing in the riding's history.

Here are some of the pertinent numbers from the April 7 election:

83.20 Percentage of the vote won by Liberal candidate Jacques Chagnon, the highest tally in the riding's 22-year history and up from 67.69 in 2012. Chagnon has now successfully won at least two-thirds of the vote in each of the riding's seven votes, including a previous high-water mark of 80.23 percent in 2003.

6.53 Percentage of the vote earned by PQ's Denise Laroché, down from the 7.46 netted by Marc-André Bahl last election. As in many parts of the province, voters abandoned the PQ ship *en masse* this election. The mark represents

the party's lowest tally since the riding was created in 1992, and is less than half of what it achieved in 1994 and 1998.

0 Number of candidates other than Chagnon who managed to pass the 10-percent mark, the first time in the riding's history that the second-place finisher has failed to crack double figures.

76.67 Margin of victory for Chagnon over second-place Laroché, the widest in the riding's history and up over 22 percent from last election's differential. With no representative from the CAQ, which won 13.11 per cent of ballots in 2012, voters who had previously opted for François Legault's party appear to have flooded to the Liberal fold. Prior to this year, the largest blowout had come in 2003, when the Liberals outpaced the PQ 80.23 to 10.38.

62.03 Percentage of the riding's eligible voters who turned up to cast their ballots on April 7, up from 59.44 in 2012. The figure also represents the highest turnout rate in the riding since 1998, when 66.26 percent of the riding exercised the right to vote. However, the riding still lagged behind that of Quebec as a

whole, which witnessed a 71.44 percent voter turnout.

21.80 Percentage of the riding's electorate that cast votes during advance polling on March 30 and 31, above the provincial average of 19.27 percent. It's a significant jump for early voting in the riding, which had come in at 16.08 in 2012, 11.78 in 2008, 10.23 in 2007 and 5.53 in 2003.

252 Number of rejected ballots among the 24,395 cast in the riding.

Night-time tree fire brings out emergency crews

Dispatched for a tree that had caught fire behind 507 Roslyn on April 5, public safety officers reported finding sparks, a small amount of smoke and a few flames. A high tension electrical wire had apparently come in contact with the tree shortly before 11:56 pm. Firefighters were on the scene and remained there until the arrival of Hydro Westmount crews at 1:30 am.

Disoriented woman found by parking inspector, caregiver

A disoriented woman was spotted by a parking inspector March 25 at Somerville and Victoria at 10:41 am, Public Security officials said. When patrollers arrived on the scene they found the woman's caregiver had managed to find her and the two subsequently set off toward the woman's apartment on St. Catherine St. There had apparently been miscommunication between the 92-year-old woman and the caregiver concerning where they would meet.



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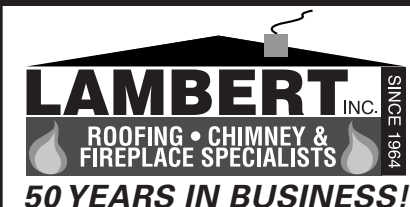

Developer Francis Charron of EMD Construction told the *Independent* he planned to prepare the site this week and start work next week. It is projected to take 14 months to complete the project.

"Yesterday was good news for us with the Liberals' win," Charron said referring to the Quebec election April 7.

"People had been scared about separation and today we had many calls to our sales office. We know we're safe now."

Concerns over the size of development and construction annoyances had been expressed by residents and medical clinics across the street. But Charron said that being the project's builders as well as its promoters, he wanted to be regarded as a good member of the neighbourhood and had been working with the city for three years "to do everything they asked."

The development is slated to have 53 units on six storeys with enclosed rooftop mechanical systems recessed from street view, he said.

There had originally been a recreational penthouse referred to as a seventh storey.

cluding basic use, Campbell said. "Our intention is to use it only for real emergencies."

Supplements reverse 911

The program will supplement the "reverse 911" service currently operating in the Montreal agglomeration, which does not provide the same options.

"The CodeRED system can send out messages on numerous platforms simultaneously, reaching thousands of citizens

within a matter of minutes," explains Public Security director Greg McBain.

"With the data base of publicly-listed phone numbers in Westmount already supplied to CodeRED, we are now in a position to initiate calls in the event of an emergency situation. Our next step is to advise the public and encourage them to register their mobile numbers and emails."

Residents have choice of 3 trees in 2014 give-away

Three varieties of trees are available this year to residents as part of the city's annual free-tree distribution. The choice was made by the city's Horticultural Advisory Committee (HAC), said Councillor Cynthia Lulham, in announcing the selection at the council meeting April 8.

Residents may obtain one tree free of charge for planting on private property in Westmount from the following selection: the green gage plum, downy serviceberry and ironwood, the last two being native to Quebec.

The plum was added this year to emphasize the city's ongoing "Incredible Edible Westmount" initiative that includes the planting of edible plants in some of the city's street planters.

Order forms are available until April 30, the deadline for submission, at city hall and Westmount Public Library as well as on the website www.westmount.org. Trees

are to be delivered during the first two weeks of May.

"It is important to note that all fruit-bearing trees require a lot of light to produce fruit," explains Jayme Gerbrandt, the city's Horticulture and Arboriculture advisor. "This plum needs about five to six hours a day of full sun and does the best in sheltered areas where the winter winds are more forgiving."

The plum has fragrant white flowers in the spring turning into medium-size fruit in the fall. The tree is hardy and self-pollinating.

Also hardy is the serviceberry, which also bears white flowers that turn into ornamental crimson fruit in the summer. It requires full sun or half shade.

The ironwood, suitable for full sun or deep shade, is a slow grower that has a greenish-white flower and red fruit.

The city has allocated \$5,000 in its 2014 budget for the tree distribution.

Woman falls on sidewalk, taken to St. Mary's

An elderly woman fell on the sidewalk at Sherbrooke and Kensington April 4 when her walker "got away from her," Public Security officials said. The woman was found, unable to get up, by a worker at Westmount Public Library at 12:24 pm. Public safety officers covered her with a blanket until Urgences Santé arrived and took her to St. Mary's Hospital. A resident of Manoir Westmount, the woman was believed to have injured a shoulder.

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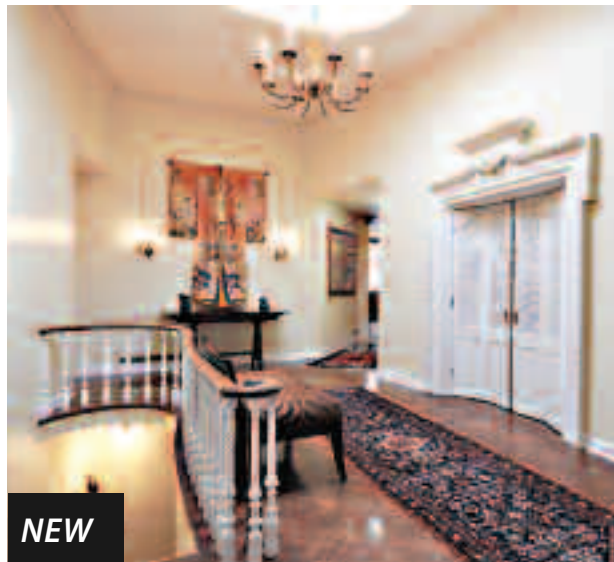
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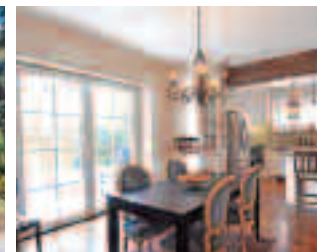
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Sherbrooke St. trees fall to Dutch elm disease

While attention has been focused recently on the emerald ash borer in Westmount and other municipalities, Dutch elm disease is still around and claiming the lives of some trees in the city.

A cluster of three high-profile American elms on the north side of Sherbrooke west of Roslyn was in the process of being removed April 4 when they were found to be "totally dead," according to Jayme Gerbrandt, the city's horticulture and arboriculture advisor.

The tall trees had grown on the private property for decades.

"Dutch elm disease kills trees very quickly once infected," she explains. As a result, it has been reported that elms have been totally eliminated from some areas.

In February, the Sherbrooke St. resident applied to Urban Planning for a permit to remove the tree cluster and a report was made by Public Works, Gerbrandt said.

"The cluster of trees was totally dead at the time that the application was made. Signs led us to believe they were infected by Dutch elm disease. DED can be spread through the root systems of adjacent elm

trees so the cluster at this address was infected quickly."

According to Gerbrandt, American elms are the most susceptible to the disease. Siberian and Chinese varieties are less susceptible but can still get it. American elms are used more frequently in urban settings due to their flute shape and lower seed production.

On the other hand, Siberian elms tend to have a less desirable structure and produce a large amount of seeds, which make them less desirable for planting in parks and in front of homes.

City has removed two in four years

"In the past four years, we have removed two city trees due to DED," she said. None are known to be infected so far this year.

Dutch elm disease is caused by a fungus that has been killing native elm trees in North America. The disease is spread by both a native elm bark beetle and an introduced European one.

Both beetles create galleries through the bark of trees, allowing

the fungus to colonize in them. In the spring when beetles emerge from the trees, fungal spores are transferred to the beetle's bodies and introduced to new trees when they feed on the branches.

The fungus can also spread by the trees root system to adjacent trees and by the movement of elm firewood or logs.

Camera catches young teens smoking

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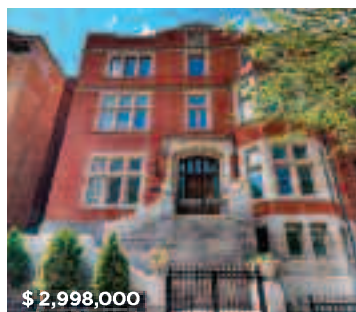
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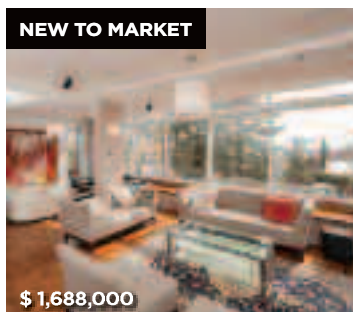
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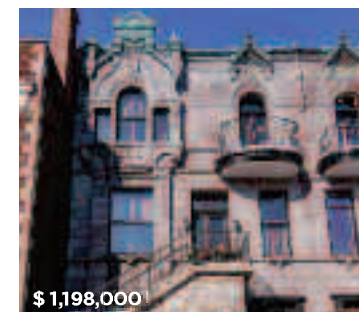
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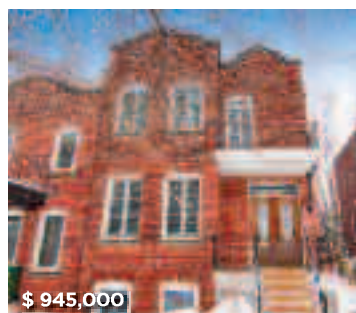
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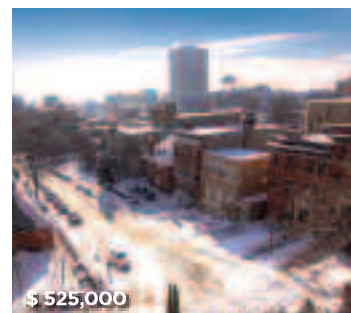
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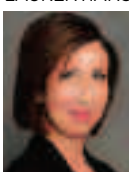
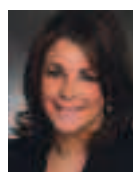
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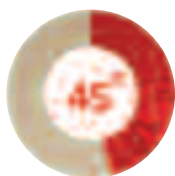


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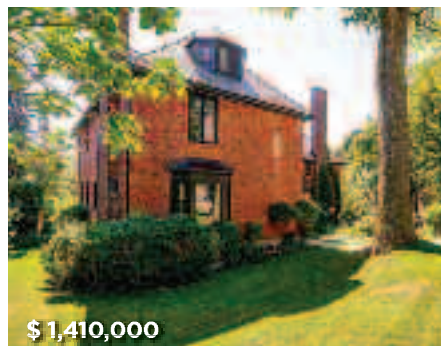
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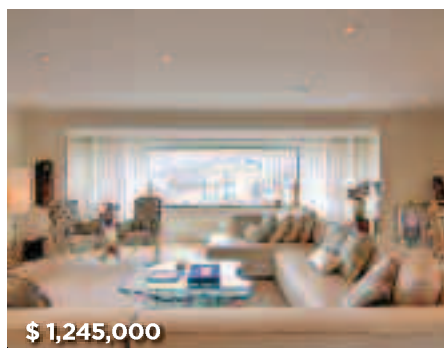
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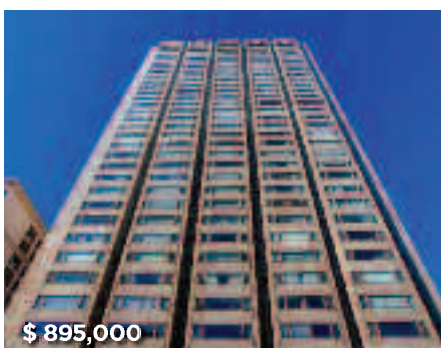
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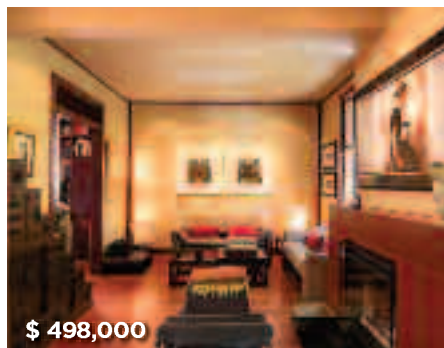
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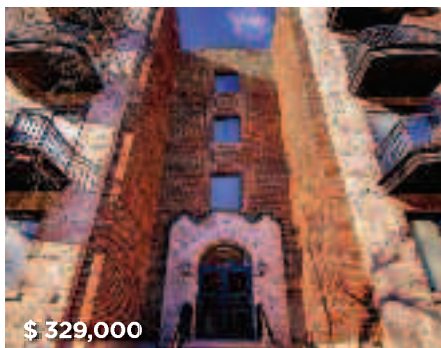
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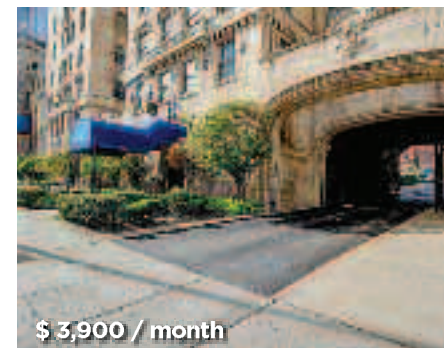
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Manoir recognizes volunteers

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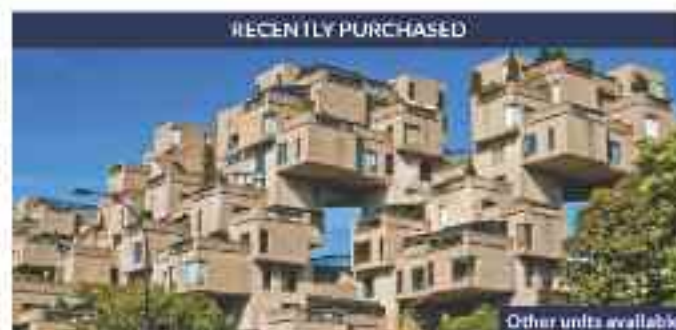

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Masters of contemporary art: Jérôme, Wesselmann, Close and Hirst

This month Westmounters have an opportunity to view work by respected artists Jean-Paul Jérôme, Tom Wesselmann, Chuck Close and Damien Hirst. All known for their contribution to contemporary art, each artist's style and technique is unique.

Faits plastiques at Galerie D'Este

The exhibition *Faits plastiques* showcases the work of Montreal painter Jean-

Paul Jérôme. A leading *plasticien* and proponent of non-figurative art, Jerome is known for his geometric precision. This retrospective showcases 20 works completed over four decades.

During his career, Jérôme's style evolved to geometrical abstraction. A complex pattern of small circles and lines dominate the muted colours of *La course sous le vent* (1974). In contrast, *Mont Joi* (1980) is a bold composition with large organic shapes painted in acrylic on a raw-linen surface.

Several paintings feature the rich primary colours with black lines that we associate with Jérôme. In *Aux hasards du voyage* (1990), dynamic angular black lines add interest to the colourful composition, while *L'architecte-villa* (1991) is a simpler arrange-

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ment of circular forms outlined in black. These shapes take on three-dimensions in *Sculpture polychrome 8* (1992) an exploration of geometric abstraction's limits.

This exhibition marks the 10th anniversary of the artist's death and coincides with the Musée d'art contemporain de Montréal's current show *A Matter of Abstraction. Faits plastiques* continues until April 20 at the gallery, located at 1329 Greene Ave.

Impressions at Galerie de Bellefeuille

The group show *Impressions* includes prints by many gallery artists. Lucien Freud's etchings, Mel Bochner's embossed lettering and Russell Young's celebrity photographs reveal the rich variety of subjects and techniques.

Rich colours dominate the silk-screen prints of American pop artist Tom Wesselmann. In *Still life with Matisse and Johns* (1993) and *Mixed Bouquet with Leger* (1993) he combines the familiar forms of his favourite artists within a new composition. The result, however, is unique and distinct from the original.

Chuck Close's unique prints are often composed of embossed squares, each a small abstract work of art. In both the

colourful *Self-Portrait*, Woodcut (2009) and the black engraving *Self-Portrait* (2009), the painted circles in each square create a prism effect. In contrast, the engraving *Phil Houndstooth* (2009), recalls pointalism while the brushstrokes of *Phil / Fin-*

gerprint (2009) are more painterly.

Damien Hirst's 2010 reflective, foil-block prints *The Souls I* (Turquoise – Oriental Gold) and *The Souls I* (Westminster Blue – Leaf Green) capture the luminous tones of butterflies. In contrast, for *Psilocybin – Lenticular* (2013) colour circles printed on plastic create a soft, diffused effect. This interesting exhibit of exceptional work continues until April 22 at 1367 Greene Ave.

Unique exploration

As Chuck Close once said, the marvel is "how somebody figured another way to rub coloured dirt on a flat surface and make space where there is no space." This is a sentiment that viewers of these exhibitions will no doubt share as, regardless of their technique, these artists make art look easy.

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March sales: Making a comeback



Mood of the Market

Note: The following article relates to offers to purchase Westmount residential dwellings that were reported by local real estate agents as having been accepted in March 2013. Because they are not final registered sales, the addresses and prices cannot be made public, but give a good idea of current trends in local real estate activity. The graph at right offers a picture of these trends over time.

Announcement of the provincial election and the fast rise of Liberal fortunes in the polls gave a boost to the Westmount real estate market in March, with 18 sales posted by agents, of which all but two were for \$1 million or more.

Only one house sold over \$3 million and one more over \$2 million, indicating that buyers were still apprehensive about spending too much money on real estate, with the future of Quebec still in limbo. The total sale price was just only 0.3 percent less than the total valuation of those

properties, marking an improvement from the 20-percent mark-down in January or the 9-percent mark-down in February.

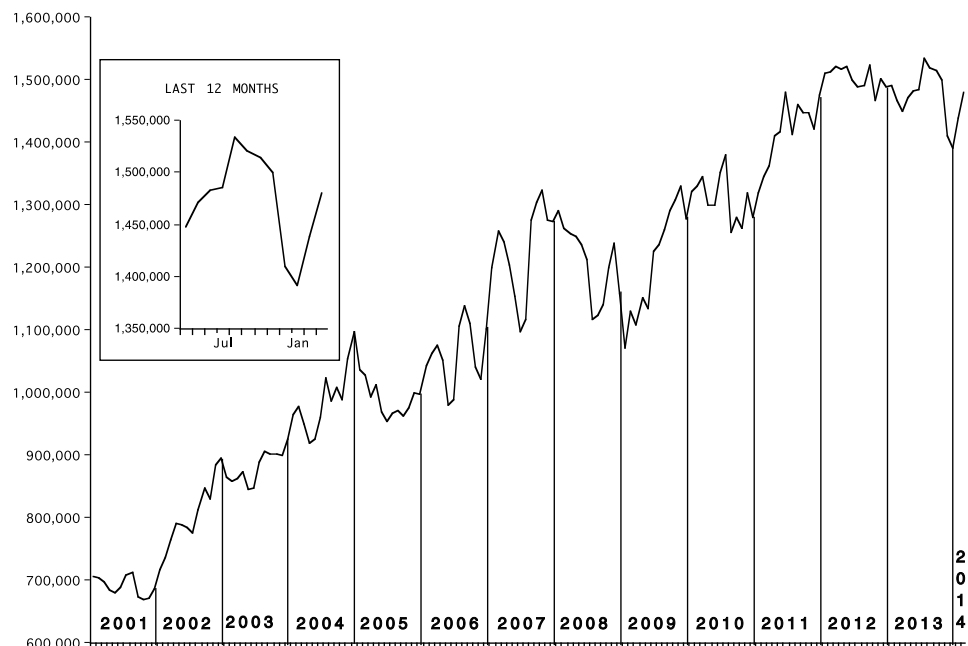
The prices ranged from 30 percent below valuation to 76 percent above; seven of the 18 one- and two-family sales were below valuation. The average time on the market was 139 days, with three listings lasting less than 3 weeks, five more than seven months.

In fact, the 18 sales in March was actually more than in March of any of the past three years and only 1.2 less than the average number for March in the past dozen or so years. Still, with the hesitancy of buyers in the first two months, volume in the first quarter of 2014 was among the lowest so far this century.

Only one more condominium sale was posted in March, bringing the total for the first quarter to eight, of which seven were apartments in larger buildings. Again, the price-valuation ratio in the quarter was 96 percent, with listings lasting from 1 to 307 days and averaging four months.

Four houses were sold in adjacent-Westmount areas last month, with significant mark-ups in two sales this year in the Square Mile. The other districts have av-

erage prices very close to municipal valuation, similar to Westmount.

Now, of course, buyers and sellers will be relieved with the relative stability of a strong majority government. There is still

much to clear out at the top of Westmount's market, and in fact two new listings over \$3 million have appeared since the election.

“[The landlord] thinks it might have been the former tenant who broke in to get stuff he left behind,” she said.

The building has no exterior video surveillance, making it difficult to prove or refute the landlord’s accusation, explained Gauthier.

Police reportedly have been unable to contact the current tenant, who had also recently been cited to the Régie du logement by the landlord.

Gauthier suspects the current tenant may have “run off,” leaving behind the empty apartment.

“It really is a strange situation,” she said.

Drug paraphernalia, including syringes, were found in the apartment,

though it’s unclear whether they were brought in during the break-in or had already been in the room, said Gauthier.

Gauthier hypothesized that the apartment could have been broken into by people looking for shelter while they used recreational drugs.

“We’ve seen the situation before where people will find a place that’s easy to get into and then they come back to do their drugs in a safe and relaxed place. They come back, come back, come back, so you need to barricade the way in,” she explained.

Police offered tips to the landlord about how to better secure the window and prevent future break-ins.
