Demo of Richelieu warehouse continues Turcot work to wipe out Westmount's mini industrial park

Demolition to pave the way for lowering the Ville Marie expressway as part of the Turcot project is expected to wipe out Westmount's little-known "industrial park" bordering St. Henri.

This is a narrow strip of east-west land wedged between the backs of buildings on Richelieu St., one block north of St. Antoine, and the expressway, which cuts it off from the rest of Westmount.

The first building to go, now 50 percent demolished, according to Urban Planning director Joanne Poirier, has dominated the strip that is virtually hidden from street view between Lacasse and Laporte, just east of Home Depot.

Long known as the H&H warehouse, the four-block-long building in its heyday



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had been entirely occupied by a steel company that made nails, among other things. Later it was characterized by other manufacturers such as Lofa Sofa, Orion Packaging, Yuletide artificial pine trees and Holt Industries, makers of moulded plastic.

But abandoned and derelict over the last 20 years, it had come to be associated with fires, squatters, graffiti writers, rave parties and a failed condo development project.

"It used to be a good industrial building, representative of its era," Poirier said last week.

Its dismantling started January 7 but as of April 8 had encountered delays related to the discovery of asphalt on top of concrete, she explained.


knocked the ladder to the ground.


Firefighters and Hydro Westmount were called and the wire was confirmed to be one used by Videotron.

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
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Council approves \$306,000 for Pomerleau in new WRC 'extras'

A total of \$306,000 in "extra" costs for the Westmount recreation centre (WRC) was approved April 8 by city council. The amount, excluding tax, includes a number of items offset by a credit from the contractor, Pomerleau Inc., said Councillor Patrick Martin. The after-tax figure of \$351,000 was used in the council's resolution.

The new items now bring the net total of approved items to \$409,210 over the design-build contract of \$33.5 million. This excludes the million-dollar 15-foot extension of the second rink for which funds were raised separately.

The credit relates to the replacement of crushed stone with sand under the rink slab, he explained.

The lion's share of the new "extras" was \$226,000 for additional excavation required for "unstable" material found in the area of the new pool and replaced by more appropriate fill, Martin explained. This had required deeper and more extensive excavation than had been foreseen. It is the area of the old stream bed over which the old arena had been built.

Also unexpected at the time of signing the Pomerleau contract was work related to the discovery and capping of the deep century-old drainage pipe beside Westmount Park Church (see November 12, 2013, p. 2).

Also over-and-above the original contract, the city decided it would be more expedient to allow Pomerleau, while controlling the site, to install 13 light standards and a fire hydrant on the newly created rooftop park. These would otherwise have been installed by Hydro Westmount and Public Works.

Another extra expense was the addition of a counter-type shelf or ledge for holding

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Council votes \$42,000 for sound barrier study

A feasibility study regarding a proposed sound barrier along the Ville Marie expressway east of Hallowell continues to move ahead with city's council's approval April 8 of \$42,000 as the city's equal share with the Quebec Transport ministry (MTQ).

The section to be studied is where sound levels are found to exceed the government's permissible level of 65 decibels and where the highway will not be lowered as a result of the Turcot project.

City director general Duncan Campbell

said last week this section is expected to extend east to just east of the first property on Prospect St. but not continue behind Weredale Park.

The study is to be conducted for the MTQ by its consultants.

It results from a meeting with the MTQ June 27, 2013, when the city agreed to move ahead with sharing the cost 50-50 though it had been holding out since June 4, 2012 for total provincial funding of the updated study (see August 20, 2013, p. 8).

Expropriations and demolitions are now under way to prepare for the start of the Turcot project (see stories p. 1 and 25).



Dinner-hour 'blackout' caused by short circuit, weather

A power outage April 9 affected residents and shoppers along Sherbrooke from Victoria to Kensington just as the city's Sports and Recreation banquet was getting under way at 6 pm at Victoria Hall, Public Security officials said. Because it was still daylight outside, the event was allowed to continue for the 150 to 200 attendees but the microphone was nonfunctional as a result (see coverage, April 15, p. 24-25).

After more than 30 minutes, a decision was made to close the library and public safety officers continued to patrol affected areas until power was restored - first to residential buildings by 7 pm and for all by 7:55 pm.

A 15-KV circuit was affected. It feeds various areas scattered along Sherbrooke, The Boulevard and Côte St. Antoine, according to Hydro Westmount director Benoit Hurtubise.

The outage was caused by a short circuit near a transition joint in one of the manholes. The combination of freezing and thawing "is very demanding on our underground network and can unfortunately

cause these situations," he explained.

"There is always some water accumulation in any underground network and the freezing-thawing period does not help."

A Westmount woman was issued a \$76 ticket April 9 when she was spotted walking her dog off leash on The Boulevard April 9, Public Security officials said. The German shepherd was seen walking beside its owner near Aberdeen at 5:42 pm by a passing patroller.

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
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Science fair news Study, Marianopolis to send students to nationals

Nicotine Overkill?

What are the effects of nicotine on the proliferation of MCF-7 breast-cancer cells compared to the human mammary epithelial cells?

This project tested the hypothesis that if nicotine could stimulate excessive cell proliferation, as it is known to do, then it would do so in MCF-7 breast-cancer cells to a greater degree than in human mammary epithelial cells.

The results of this project refuted the hypothesis as neither cells proliferated more in the presence of nicotine, leading to conclusions that nicotine does not appear to be the agent that causes excessive cell proliferation in MCF-7 breast-cancer cells, nor human mammary epithelial cells.

This project covers utilizing GPS-locating services available in modern smartphones to relay user's positional data, communicating with online databases in the form of XML data formats and handling of third party API's such as Google Maps and OpenStreetMaps to effectively access third-party software features. 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






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



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Police Report Laperrière: Another car break-in, but problem getting better

The following news story is based on information from police reports provided by a Station 12 constable in an interview with the reporter.

Despite another incident last week, Westmount's Station 12 has been receiving fewer reports of cars being broken into after the city witnessed a string of automobile robberies in March and early April, according to Constable Stephan Laperrière.

The latest incident occurred on the afternoon of April 14, when a thief reportedly stole a Louis Vuitton briefcase from a car parked the corner of Sherbrooke and Victoria.

"The suspect probably saw the victim leave their car and then, boom boom, thank you very much, they are gone with the briefcase," said Laperrière.

The automobile break-in epidemic had come to a head last month, when five cars were reportedly broken into in as many days between March 17 and 21.

According to Laperrière, the rash of robberies caught the eye of Station 12's

Module d'action par projet (MAP) taskforce, which began devoting more attention to the areas of Westmount that seemed most at risk.

The unit currently has a primary suspect for multiple break-ins who is under police surveillance, according to Laperrière.

"[The MAP unit] is currently following this person and hopefully we'll be able to catch them red handed so we can close all of these files," he said.

Laperrière says "it's a possibility" that most or even all of the break-ins have been committed by a single person.

"It's not a crime that takes a long time to do. You look, you smash, you take and you're gone," he said.

After the rash of break-ins, Station 12 officers increased its awareness campaign about limiting car break-ins, stressing that residents should not leave belongings in car, and if they do, to leave them out of sight, two tips the victim of the most recent break-in reportedly failed to heed.



Grade 6 Priory students take on toony/health challenge

As the McGill University Health Centre Foundation gathered elementary and high schools together on April 8 to share the results of their Toonie Challenge fundraisers, one of standout schools was The Priory School. The event was held at the "Glen Hall" on de Maisonneuve, near the new MUHC hospital.

During National Nutrition Month in March, grade 6 student ambassadors from The Priory held a Health Challenge as their Toonie Challenge.

The Priory students were inspired to do a health challenge after seeing Jonathan Di Tomasso, a dietician with the MUHC, give a popular interactive talk about healthy eating at the MUHC's Toonie Challenge results event last year.

"The five kids that came last year from The Priory told their headmaster they wanted to do it and he said 'Yes, if it fits with the curriculum but we shouldn't [just] be raising money, we're not about that,'" said Jill Hugessen, a population representative on the MUHC Board of Directors. "The students said they would only do it both ways," Hugessen said. "So they raised money and they did the health

(challenge). So to me, that's a star component of participation. They got it, all these grade 6 kids and they were in grade 5 last year."

Hugessen said The Priory's head of school, Tim Peters, invited Di Tomasso to their school to launch the health challenge. During his January visit Di Tomasso "gave an assembly based on some of his great nutritional tricks, like how many Oreos equals a donut and ... because of his inspiration wrote out their own health contract," she said.

"In assembly we told our school that we were going to be making a pledge form and that we'd be happy if you gave up an unhealthy habit for the week or start eating more healthy for a week," said student ambassador Aidan Price-Gallagher. The challenge? "Every time you get rid of a habit or start a new one, your parent or sponsors would give you two dollars," Price-Gallagher said. "By the end of the week everyone had handed in the amount of money they'd made from their sponsors."

While money was collected after one week, anyone who signed up was expected to do the routine for two weeks, said student ambassador Chloé Lee-Gauthier.

The student ambassadors organized the event, collected the pledges and toonies and distributed bracelets to students to remind them of their "new, healthy, habits," said Peters. The ambassadors led two school-wide assemblies to sustain the event and a total of more than 100 Priory students, teachers, parents and the principal participated, he said.

As an incentive, the class that pledged the most new healthy habits won the school prize, "an activity where they get to make edible fruit faces and other healthy food creations," said Peters. "Everyone found it really fun so this year that was the healthy prize," said Lee-Gauthier.

"There have been four new grade 5 Priory MUHC ambassadors appointed so they may continue the tradition in their senior year next year," said Peters.

"They approached me and I was more than willing," said Di Tomasso, whose kiosk at this year's MUHC Toonie Challenge results event drew crowds of curious students. "Healthy eating for kids, it's an important thing to get out there. It's really nice to see (kids) getting involved in their own health and they're rubbing off on their parents. ministry of Transport (MTQ) as a sixmonth process. Building materials are slated to be recycled, some providing fill for the Turcot project.

The only other significant building on the Westmount strip remains in operation. Duquesne Réfractaire, a cement refractory that formerly operated under the name Canadian Foundry Supplies and Equipment (CFS), has been there for many years at 4295 Richelieu.


Its distinctive blue silo-type towers have ong gone and the building is also believed to be scheduled demolished, "possibly in

December," a worker told the Independent on a visit to the area last week. Poirier, however, said she had not been so notified.

Hive of activity

In 1988, the H&H warehouse was a hive of activity. It was here that Yuletide Christmas trees - the only manufacturers in Quebec of artificial pines - was turning out 60,000 for local use and export as far away as Australia.

Here also Lofa Sofa was making futons and sofa beds while Orion was manufacturing plastic wrap and other products.

Even in the building's heyday, however, tax revenue to the city was described as almost negligible compared to what is collected by larger industrial areas.

In 1992 as activity began to wane, a fire at the Holt Industries occupancy April 6 burned into the roof of the warehouse. Preliminary damage estimates of \$250,000 were expected to soar if supplies used for stuffing by Lofa Sofa sustained smoke

damage.

The paint shop where the fire started had been vacant for some time but workers had been using acetylene torches to re-

move a large industrial smoke pipe from an oven area once used to dry paint on equipment such as tool boxes.

Not only did the building's location





generate confusion, but its addresses on Richelieu bore no logical relationship to each other and were hard to find for customers and emergency responders alike, including numbers 4101, 4103, 4107, 4243, 4247, 4249, 4251, 4255, 4259, 4263 and 4275.

Potential for trouble

In its derelict state, the warehouse was considered by city officials to present a potential for illicit activity and major disaster.

In 1994, when the building was under trusteeship and vacant – except for an artist living in an apartment there – it was targetted for what was publicized as a "massive" overnight rave party expected to attract thousands of party-goers.

To prevent a leasing company from staging the event, the city managed to obtain an emergency court injunction only hours before on September 29. Nevertheless, police, firefighters and the city's Civil Protection Unit remained in emergency preparedness all night in case the order was disregarded.

The warehouse had a list of fire code violations "an arm long," the city's director general Bruce St. Louis was quoted as saying at the time. The sprinklers were clogged with the residues of foam and other material and there was a lack of emergency lighting.

"It's like renting a big cave," he had said.

In the early 2000s, a redevelopment project was submitted to the city, Poirier recalls. It called for substantial demolition of the vacant warehouse and the creation of 400 residential units, which the city considered too high in density.

In the meantime, the owner received an initial expropriation notice a few years ago.

And what might have been a new lease on life for the old warehouse in the Westmount strip came to an abrupt end.

Westmount aspect of Turcot project started

Hydro Westmount equipment stored on its property beneath the Ville Marie expressway could be relocated as early as this week due to Turcot interchange roadwork and expropriations, city director general Duncan told the *Independent* last week.

The strip of Hydro Westmount land is to be expropriated as soon as possible by the Quebec Transport ministry (MTQ) as part of the project to lower the expressway. A new storage location is being provided by the MTQ in a secured area west of Glen Rd.

Expropriation of a few feet of cityowned land at the south end of the Public Works yard, which is located north of the expressway, is a separate issue but not imminent, Campbell said.

The update comes as demolition of the former H&H warehouse progresses in the Richelieu industrial sector of Westmount (see story p. 1) and triplexes on Selby St. await demolition. These were owned by, and home to, former longtime city councillor John de Castell.

The relocation of Hydro Westmount equipment takes place during a period of negotiations regarding the expropriation and the MTQ's takeover of the joint pumping of contaminants by the city and the Montreal transit commission in the area (see story February 25, p. 1).

The MTQ postponed a March 28 meeting with the city but set no new date, Campbell said.


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Former gatehouse at 70 Rosemount Crescent now worth over \$1M



History by the house Andy Dodge, CRA

One of the oldest still-standing houses in Westmount, at 70 Rosemount Crescent, is located at the corner of Rosemount Crescent and Mountain Ave., the former gatehouse to the huge Rosemount estate.

The tiny house was built in 1870 to house caretakers for the former mansion constructed by John Young, the first commissioner of the Port of Montreal and member of parliament for Montreal West. Rosemount Ave., it appears, started as the driveway to the Rosemount estate, which has now been divided into two properties fronting on what is now Severn Ave.

The gatehouse heralded the entrance to the huge mansion, which by the late 1870s was in the hands of Robert James Richie. He sold much of the land – gatehouse included – to Thomas H. Hodgson, who subdivided several lots south of the Rosemount estate and planned to develop them. Apparently he got into trouble with the Bank of Montreal and in 1886 the property was taken over for a cost of \$18,000 by two prominent lawyers, Norman William Trenholme and Archibald Dunbar Taylor.

The two lawyers split the property between themselves and in 1914 Trenholme, by then a judge, transferred his property, including the gatehouse and the lot just below it, to his son, George A. Trenholme, who was described as a real estate agent. By January 1920, George Trenholme had built 68 Rosemount Ave. (to become Rosemount Crescent) and sold that off to Cecil McDougall, then sold off the 70 Rosemount house to James L. Weir, a machinist, for \$7,250.

Weir died in 1931 but his widow held on to the house, which by now had its own lot number, until 1945, when she sold to

Frederick Richard Mulligan, who owned it for 20 years, paying \$6,500. He sold to Gertrude Audrey Thorne, wife of Arthur Edward Stanger, in June 1965, for \$48,000, starting a series of fast turnovers that lasted for the next 30 years or so.

Stanger held onto it for only two years before selling to Elizabeth Ballantyne Hall, widow of Wilfred Horace Clark, for the same \$48,000. Five years later, in September 1972, it went to Jennifer Elizabeth Oland, wife of Donald Gordon Paterson, for \$60,000. Only one year passed before the next sale, to Robert Hackett, a lawyer, and Daria Buczko for \$65,000. They held on to it for five years before selling to Ada Virginia Murray, wife of James Robert Humphreys, for \$78,500 in May 1978.

Value doubles

The house had been upgraded over the years and continued that way in the 1980s, selling to Peter O'Brien, another lawyer, in August 1982, for \$145,000, almost double the price of four years earlier. We find a listing in 1986, when he sold it. He was



able to get \$220,000 from Peter Charlton, who kept it for only nine months.

Here, the fast-rising market of the 1980s started to slow down. In March 1987, Peter Charlton sold to a trust account looking after the interests of William Blanchard Baskett Scully for \$265,000. Three years later, in October 1990, the trust account got only \$10,000 more in a sale to Don Newman. The market fell back in about 1992 and did not recover until well after the 1995 Quebec referendum. Even at that, in April of 1997 Newman was only able to sell it for \$272,000 – \$3,000 less than he paid for the house - when he sold to Monique Chabot, a television personality and the widow of Guy Sanche, who died in 1988.

Very little renovation took place during the next two decades – it appears it was rented in later years – until finally Maxime Vandal, an architect, purchased it for \$750,000 in January 2009. He gutted the house and dug out the basement (which had originally only been half-excavated), reusing some of the wood and transforming the kitchen and bathrooms.

Still, it was only a one-bedroom house (with upstairs office and dressing room) but its charm and history attracted Danny Ritter, a financial manager at RSM Richter in Alexis Nihon Plaza, who paid \$1,350,000 in 2009.

Since 1996 the centre has been offering a clinical program of creative art therapies to adults with developmental and related disabilities and provides internships for graduate students.



Proceeds from such fundraisers go towards completing the MUHC's Best Care for Life campaign and the event's volunteer organizers plan to continue the Toonie Challenge as an ongoing project, said Hugessen. rière also cautions that car owners need to be more vigilant, as more people on the streets equals more potential thieves.

"You have more people outside biking, more people walking on the street, thus more chance of people looking into their cars and trying to spot your things," he said.

Furthermore, Laperrière and fellow Station 12 constable Adalbert Pimentel have also been going on daily two-to-three hour patrols in the affected areas, speaking to shop owners and residents while also adding an increased sense of police presence to deter potential thieves.

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\$157,000 raised already Mavridakis back at school after accident, fundraising for spinal cause

In July last year, Westmount resident and Lower Canada College grade 8 student Emmanuel ("Manny") Mavridakis was in a near-fatal motor vehicle accident that changed his life and perspective.

Although he suffered severe head and spinal cord trauma, a collapsed lung, broken bones and had virtually no feeling from his waist to his toes, he has progressed quickly since then and last month resumed classes.

With his eyes opened by the accident and determined to make a difference, Manny is now fundraising to purchase a Lokomat, which provides robot-assisted walking therapy to help improve a person's ability to walk after a spinal cord injury.

At present, not a single Lokomat can be found anywhere in the province of Quebec.

Working in conjunction with the Fondation Melio and St. Justine's Hospital, as well as family, friends and LCC classmates, Mavridakis has managed to raise \$157,000, which is nearly half the money needed to buy the Lokomat for the hospital.
