Transport ministry's feasibility study presented

Sound barrier options taken to design, costing phase



The decades-old issue of a sound barrier in Westmount to muffle noise from the Ville Marie expressway took another step forward last week when the first part of a feasibility study from the Quebec Transport ministry (MTQ) was presented to city officials.

The MTQ study from the engineering firm of Dessau is required by the government as a preliminary step to helping fund noise abatement along provincial highways. It was funded 50-50 by Westmount and the MTQ.

The study provided several options and types of measures that could be used along the Westmount Athletic Grounds and to

the eastern city limits, said Councillor Theodora Samiotis after the presentation September 11.

'We agreed on some options and gave instructions to proceed to the second phase of the study, design and costing," she said. "The key thing is that something is possible."

This second phase is expected to take seven or eight weeks before plans can be put to affected residents for consideration. Samiotis told the *Independent*.

Presentation of the report came on the heels of a commitment by Samiotis to bring the feasibility process to the point where the sound barrier issue can finally be resolved, she told Bruce Ave. resident Bron- continued on p. 10

Bike stands for Greene square coming 'shortly'


A new model of bicycle rack is expected to be installed in the next couple of weeks for use outside the Greene public square, Public Works officials said last week. The same model had been ordered for the new Prince Albert square.

The stands enable the frame of a bike rather than only a wheel to be attached, providing improved anti-theft security, explained Councillor Cynthia Lulham at the council meeting September 2.

She was replying to a question from Susan Kazenel of Kensington Ave., who asked for more bicycle parking on Greene, near Les 5 Saisons, saying that in the absence of racks, cyclists were attaching their bikes to the city's new trees and damaging

Lulham said the new racks had been "ordered," and she was requesting protection for the trees.

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
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Requires government to open purse strings

WTAG: More needed to stem noise from added trains

As the new Train de l'Est was unveiled last week, hope that a solution to noise and vibration along the commuter line through the Westmount rail corridor may be next on the Quebec government's agenda, according to David Schachter, president of the Westmount Train Action Group (WTAG).

Despite railway work under way to install a third commuter track along the corridor to "ratchet up" the number of trains, there is still no breakthrough, he said last week.

"We just want a solution and hope the

new Quebec government opens the purse strings," he told the Independent.

Among several solutions are new and quieter equipment, as well as the potential electrification of the rail, which Mayor Peter Trent stated the city supported in a letter last February to then Transport minister Sylvain Gaudreault and to Nicolas Gipresident of the Agence métropolitaine de transport (AMT), which operates the commuter trains.

While the mayor said last week he had not yet met with either of the new ministers for Municipal Affairs (Pierre Moreau) Transport (Robert Poëti) since the Quebec continued on p. 9

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
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Hospital, Westmount officials to discuss noise

With noises being described as a highpitched whine coupled with the roar of a jet engine still infiltrating the neighbourhood bordering the McGill University Health Centre (MUHC) super-hospital's construction site, Westmount officials have demanded a meeting with the hospital's top brass to resolve the issue.

That meeting is set to happen this

is likely related to the facility's dozens of chimneys and customized cooling towers. These towers, some of the largest in Canada, are located on the easternmost portion of the site, just north of the St. Jacques St. parking garage. The Glen Yards property includes land in Westmount, but the temporary offices, currently on the Westmount section, will be replaced with green space once the hospital project is finished.

"We have received complaints from two Westmount residents," said SNC-Lavalin spokesperson Diane Rivard. "We are in the process of balancing the system of this huge hospital complex. It takes time. It cannot be done overnight. Right when the first person complained about this, we started looking at mitigation measures but, at the moment, nothing about the system has been finalized."

Rivard said the system will be fully calibrated by the end of September and, during that time, the firm has hired an acoustic expert to develop mitigation measures. Rivard said SNC-Lavalin has already submitted a report to Westmount showing that there is "no evidence that we are not respecting the by-law. But that doesn't mean that we aren't still looking




Hospital officials say these cooling towers, some of the largest in Canada, may be partially responsible for the noise some Westmount residents are hearing.

upset by the noise. She said people complain in different ways, such as contacting their local provincial legislator, the city's Urban Planning department, the director general or their city councillor. The complaints have been rolling in, she said, and the city is taking this issue very seriously.

"We are going to have a meeting, and we're hoping a solution comes out of it," said Smith. "We're very pleased that this meeting is taking place."

Montreal's NDG-district councillor, Peter McQueen, said he has not heard any complaints directly related to the hospital's ventilation system or cooling towers.

'Constant sound'

York St. resident Dorothy Lipovenko and Somerville Ave. resident Jean-Phillipe Lord both describe the noise coming from the hospital similarly. Both residents, in separate phone interviews, recognized that there are accepted noises, such as the train, that come from living in southwestern Westmount, but what they decsribe as the constant sound from the hospital is disrupting their ability to enjoy their properties

Lipovenko said that, at this point, the decibel levels might meet pre-set standards, but that doesn't make it okay. It's the constant, disruptive sound that she

says violates the city's nuisance-noise bylaw. She said it is making it impossible for her to enjoy a property she has owned for some 14 years.

Her backyard, she said, is unusable. When barefoot, she said she can feel the vibrations in her home office. She and her husband have been thankful for the cooler summer as they have been able to keep their windows closed much of the time but, regardless, she said the around-the-clock noise still makes its way into her house and disrupts their sleep to the point that she said she has trouble functioning during the day.

Representatives from SNC-Lavalin, Lipovenko noted, have visited her property and consulted with her on the issue, but the problem hasn't gone away since the ventilation system was fired up back in November 2013. She questioned the planning behind a super-hospital that puts a mega-sized, noisy ventilation system so close to a residential neighbourhood.

"This is a persistent, consistent noise of which there is virtually no prospect of it ending," said Lipovenko. "They turned it on in late November and, with the exception of a one-hour shutdown a couple weeks ago for testing, there has been no silence at all. This neighbourhood has never resumed its regular ambiance of noise that we all expect."

THANKS FOR PEDESTRIAN LIGHT AT WOOD

Thanks to the city for installing automatic pedestrian lights at the busy de Maisonneuve and Wood intersection.

A pedestrian was killed at that intersection by a left-turning truck last fall, and our association had asked the city to change the old "on-demand" pedestrian lights for automatic lights, since our surveys found that most pedestrians either did not know about the on-demand pedestrian light button or they were not prepared to wait up to a minute for the pedestrian light to appear after pushing it.

Pedestrians can now cross that intersection without having to first push a button and then wait. Since the new lights are four-way, pedestrians do not have to worry about cars being in the intersection at the same time. The Wood intersection now offers the same pedestrian safety as many other busy intersections in Westmount, like the Sherbrooke and Victoria intersection, for example.

Kudos to the city for that safety improvement.

In addition to the automatic pedestrian light, our association had asked that the busy Wood intersection be equipped with a 10-second straight-ahead green arrow during the east-west light sequence to allow cyclists (and drivers) to proceed straight ahead before vehicles can turn left across the bike path. This would help reduce the risk to cyclists from vehicles turning left across the bike path and not respecting the straight-ahead priority of cy-

Green arrows are already standard at

every left-turning intersection along the de Maisonneuve bike path through Ville Marie. The director general has said that the city is studying this request.

Westmount goes to Montreal's 'rescue' over major water leak

It was Westmount water works that went to "the rescue" of Montreal when one of its major distribution pipes burst September 5 on Greene Ave. just north of St. Antoine St. near the entrance to Selby Park, city officials said.

Public safety officers reported finding water 12 to 15 inches deep after being called to the scene at 12:12 am by a resident of Greene. The street was closed northbound, allowing St. Antoine to be reopened. The work, contracted to Canbec Construction after agreement from Montreal, took until 3 pm to complete.

While the affected pipe belonged to Montreal, said Public Works director Marianne Zalzal, "We did the intervention because we can close off the water relatively quickly."

Increase in water pressure

The cause of the problem was believed to relate to an increase in water pressure from Montreal, where work had been under way elsewhere. Several other similar incidents had also been reported nearby in Montreal, she said.

A chain reaction of breaks caused by increases in water pressure occurred several years ago along Côte St. Antoine when water repairs were under way on Decarie (see story April 26, 2011, p. 7).



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Kiely, Blackader challenge MUHC board on hospital accessibility, mobility

During an NDG-based public meeting on September 9, the McGill University Health Centre (MUHC) board of directors faced some tough questions from Westmounters wanting to know how people with reduced mobility are supposed to access the incoming super-hospital and, once there, how are they supposed to nav-

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igate the mega-sized medical facility.

"We do not have and will not have in the foreseeable future a second handicapped entrance to the Vendôme Metro that will help people who are wheelchair bound, those with limited mobility and those families with young children," said Maureen Kiely as she asked the board what temporary measures will be in place when the hospital is supposed to open in June 2015.

The second entrance, transportation officials have said, will cost some \$70 million and take at least four years to complete, but the province has yet to foot the bill. That entrance, if realized, will tunnel to the hospital under the train tracks. Until then, the Quebec government is offering a \$3.4-million upgrade to the intermodal station as it faces a predicted 35-percent increase in riders by 2017. Currently, the station sees 11.1 million riders

Kiely said those who have cars or use a taxi won't have a problem accessing the hospital, but "it is a problem for many families." continued on p. 18

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
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Election may be coming

Shaar roof fire sends Akiva to Selwyn

Students from Akiva School were relocated to nearby Selwyn House September 5 while firefighters extinguished a roof fire at the Congregation Shaar Hashomayim, Public Security officials said in relating the incident.

The building, which houses the school, was evacuated as a precaution and the students' parents were notified to pick up their children at the new location.

The fire broke out around 3 pm during roofing work on the portion of the roof over the sanctuary and caused major traffic congestion in the area. election in April, he noted that Girard remains AMT president.

Schachter said that WTAG, which now has 175 members, hoped to hold another meeting as soon as possible with representatives from all three levels of government "to advance our hope for a solution."

A previous meeting in February at AMT offices that included representatives from the offices of federal MP Marc Garneau and provincial legislator Jacques Chagnon had led to the mayor's letter.

Another meeting in July at city hall, however, did not have provincial representation but included a presentation from a Concordia study on the impact of noise pollution in the Montreal area, Schachter said.

"The priority is infrastructure" as a means to reducing noise and vibration, said Councillor Theodora Samiotis, who chaired the July meeting and represents Trent on the Train de l'Ouest committee.

She said an important "breakthrough" in the process, however, was a dialogue had been created with all three levels of government, citizens and railway officials. This had emerged in the summer of 2013 from the fight by residents and city officials to reduce construction noise on the rail bed and positioning of new signal gantries (see August 6, 2013, p. 5).


"My role as your councillor is to see this through," Samiotis stated. "I made a commitment to my residents to see this through."

Samiotis was reacting to lengthy allegations by an obviously frustrated Mantel that the city had failed to follow through on previous plans and options.

In a heated exchange with Mantel, Samiotis, Councillor Cynthia Lulham and Mayor Peter Trent explained how many scenarios had been changed, abandoned or updated as the Turcot project unfolded and Canadian Pacific (CP) refused to allow Westmount to use some of its land for a berm (see June 18, 2013, p. 22).

A lot of work had been done by the city on the issue, they explained. Much of the data collected by the city's own feasibility studies had been handed over for the MTQ study.

Once the Turcot plans had been finalized to lower the Ville Marie Expressway west of Hallowell, the council decided to move ahead on the government's terms by accepting its 50-50 terms of funding the MTQ study (see December 10, 2013). It had previously wanted Quebec to pay 100 percent.

Ronc and Monet: Inward significance

This month, Cécile Ronc's fluid landscapes create an atmospheric neverland at the McClure Gallery at the Visual Arts Centre, while André Monet's bold portraits dominate Galerie de Bellefeuille. Although different in subject matter and style, the work of both artists evokes insight into their chosen subjects.

Cécile Ronc at the McClure Gallery

In this exhibition, Ronc's large-scale canvases are ethereal and atmospheric. Entitled "Le pays où l'on n'arrive jamais," diffused shapes evoke both memories and dreams. The muted greys and subtle pastels convey reflection within a playful and painterly style.

In "Courants contraires," rich textures create a dynamic landscape, where water flows and freezes in mid air. Inspired by Iceland's northern landscape, complex lines and shapes recreate barrens and gla-

In "Serendipity," yellow paint splattered across a smooth canvas evokes meadow flowers within a cool, inhospitable beauty. A butterfly-shaped composition is cleverly titled "Hisser le papillon noir."

Ronc's calm yet dynamic paintings suggest uninhabited landscapes. A large untitled painting with dark brushstrokes as foliage against crater-like mountains recalls Chinese traditional landscape. Here, the asymmetric composition evokes an emptiness of an undetermined promised

Playful yet tranquil, these paintings evoke an evolving natural world and, for the artist, an evolution in artistic style.

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
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
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
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Access ramp marks first fruit of temple's capital campaign




Yaffe spoke of long-time temple member Gordon Lax, the lead donor for the ramp, as someone who "led quietly by example."

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
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


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Congestion on Hillside Lane

She said the inter-neighbourhood coalition, known as the Concertation Interquartiers (CIQ), is currently circulating a petition, which will be submitted to the relative authorities soon as there are "many, many people in western Montreal that are very worried about this."

MUHC director general and CEO Normand Rinfret replied, "Clearly our agenda has been to push highly on the government, municipal as well as provincial, to ensure there was going to be the right connectivity between the Vendôme Metro station at the opening time."

Rinfret said he is happy to see that there are going to be temporary measures to help control the congestion at the station. However, he said, it still won't be handicapped-accessible. There is an ongoing discussion regarding the potential of installing a shuttle bus to the station, he said, but a decision has not been made.

The second entrance, he said would allow a handicapped-accessible entrance to the Metro station's platform and the hospital. There is a design made in collaboration with the Société de transport de Montréal and the Agence métropolitaine

de transport.

"I hope this will get the priority that it should," he said. "We are still putting pressure on this, I guarantee you."

Citing the fact that many people are already going to have "enormous difficulty" getting to the hospital, Bridget Blackader asked how patients are going to circulate around such a large facility as there is so much distance between the different departments.

Rinfret said when patients go to the site, there is going to be handicappedaccess and ways of navigating the facility. Imma Franco, the MUHC's associate director for planning of programs and services, said, "Although it is a very large site, it is very localized for the different clientele and patients."

The necessary services, she said, will be "co-located." A parent with a child, she said, will go to one floor to get their x-rays and blood drawn. There are very few patients that will have to traverse from blocks A to D. It's very unlikely that such a case will happen, she said, but if it does, "our transport staff will do that with wheelchairs and other means."

9 in 10 child seats incorrectly installed

At a verification of child car seats September 8 at the daycare at Centre Greene, public safety officers reported finding nine of the 10 had been improperly installed and were re-installed.

Victoria merchant victimized by fraud scam

The following news story is based on information from police reports provided by a Station 12 constable in an interview with the reporter.

A Victoria Ave. merchant fell victim to a fraud scheme after receiving a phone call from a woman claiming to be from the Canada Revenue Agency on September 5, according to Constable Stephan Laper-

The woman allegedly claimed that she was investigating the merchant for unpaid back taxes and fines. She reportedly told the store owner that he could settle the debt by purchasing several prepaid VISA cards, giving her the authorization code

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and keeping the transaction confidential.

"It's the first time I've heard of a fraud using this type of scheme," said Laper-

According to Laperrière, the merchant purchased and handed over prepaid cards with a combined value of almost \$2,000. The store owner eventually realized he had been victimized and reported the incident to police.

Laperrière couldn't reveal whether the store is actually facing any back taxes or fines and, if so, the total amount.

Before agreeing to any payments over the phone, Laperrière encourages merchants to first verify not only the identity of the caller, but their store's finances as well to ensure the validity of the alleged investigator's claims.

"Shop owners should keep a heads-up in case they get similar calls from people saying they are from Revenue Canada. They should validate who is on the other line by calling them back [at an official number] and verify with their accountant, if they have one, before paying these things off," he said.

If a merchant suspects a potential phone scam, Laperrière recommends immediately dialling *57 after hanging up the phone, which automatically puts a trace on the last received call. If the number fails to match that of the Canada Revenue Service, merchants can contact police to launch an investigation into the number.

Parked car 'relocates'

Public safety officers helped the owner of a car locate his vehicle September 5 after he reported it had disappeared from Dorchester near Greene, where he recalled having parked it. Public Security officials said he sought assistance at 8:30 am, suspecting it had been towed due to work being done on the street. After determining that no towing had taken place, patrollers searched the area and found the car in the parking area behind 4054 Dorchester near Clandeboye.

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Noisy party brings 3 complaints

A 19-year-old woman living on Roslyn north of Sherbrooke was told September 6 she would receive a ticket for \$148 after three complaints were received about loud music and voices at her home between 1:47 am and 3:58 am, Public Security officials said. Patrollers could hear "excessive" music and after one call found a party guest lying on the grass after tripping. It wasn't the first time the address had generated complaints.

Four leaf-blowing contractors fined

Four contractors using leaf blowers out of season were issued tickets for \$269 each between September 2 and 4, Public Security officials report. All had received previous tickets for the same infraction since at least 2011. One contractor working on Grenville stated he was well aware of the city regulations but his client wanted the driveway cleaned. Others were found on Church Hill, Westmount Ave. and Upper Belmont.

ceived our inventory of the new model," Public Works director Marianne Zalzal confirmed last week. "They will be installed shortly, probably in about two weeks. We just have to find out where."

Daniel Lambert, president of the Westmount Walking and Cycling Association, who had attended the city council meeting, later told the *Independent* he was surprised that "the mention of a chipped tree seemed to prompt action on this issue." He said he had liaised with Public Works almost a year ago on this new model of bike stand and wondered why they were taking so long to be installed.

In fact, it was almost a year ago at the October meeting of city council that Lulham had assured questioners the bike racks for the newly refurbished intersection at Greene and de Maisonneuve had already been ordered (see October 8, 2013, p. 13).

Lambert said it was important for the bike stands to be installed in intervals up and down the street so that cyclists, seeking convenience and an easy watch over their bikes would use them, "otherwise they'll continue to use the trees or posts."

Bixi station still short 4

He said he also hoped a way could be found to find space for adding the four

Bixi slots that had to be removed from the docking station at Greene and de Maisonneuve when the new street design and the planting of a tree had forced the size of the stand to be reduced initially from 15 to 7.

While the city had managed to squeeze in room for four more slots, he recalled, Westmount's most-used Bixi station is still lacking four, all for the sake of a new tree, which he hopes can still be relocated.

"Provision for bicycles seems to have been an after-thought in the planning and landscaping of the intersection," he said.

"Since the city is promoting active transportation, I hope that in future projects the planning for bicycles is done in advance of construction and landscaping."

Cars still parking improperly on hills

Another incident of a parked car moving on a hill when the wheels were not turned to the curb was reported September 7, Public Security officials said. The car had been left outside 526 Victoria in parking gear but without the hand brake fully applied. It was issued a ticket for \$53 for being parked on a hill without the wheels against the curb. Despite a recent campaign on the issue, parking improperly "is still happening out there," said Public Security director Greg McBain.
