

WMA keeps co-presidency for now

The two co-acting presidents of the Westmount Municipal Association (WMA) are expected to continue sharing the top position for another year, the *Independent* learned last week. The "acting" portion of their title will, however, disappear.

Maureen Kiely and Paul Marriott had undertaken as vice presidents to fill the void left by the resignations of president Peter Starr and past president Jean-Pierre Picard in January. They had expected a new president to be elected at the WMA's annual general meeting May 6.

The recent decision to allow their names to stand as co-presidents for the coming year will allow them to work to rebuild the citizen watchdog organization and "get it back on track," Marriott said.

Following the annual meeting, the two will simply become "co-presidents," eliminating any confusion over their evolving interim title used to describe the new function they assumed following the resigna-

Wagner told the *Independent* she had been unsure about allowing her name to stand in nomination. "But it's nice to be recognized for opening my mouth," she added with a laugh.

She believed she had been a thorn in the side of city council when she spoke up at meeting after meeting over particular concerns, including the need to allow residents to park on the street overnight. "I worked on that and pushed and pushed."

Wagner represented her neighbourhood on the CTAC during her term as president but "closed it down because the city wasn't paying any attention to us."

The train station preservation and a campaign raising \$850,000 for its restoration is especially close to her heart. She remembers how a CP railway representative sat at her kitchen table along with another member of the WHA to hear their arguments for preserving the station, which they saw as an important part of West-

mount's history. "He told us: 'Be careful what you wish for!" The station required a lot of work. It has since undergone exterior restorations but remains unused.

Over the years, Wagner said, one volunteer position led to another. Through each she met other community-minded Westmounters, including the late Don Wedge. In fact, she recalled initially driving him to the continued on p. 18

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
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Council ponders possible sound barrier on highway

Mike Mossop of Columbia Ave. asked city council April 7 if the city might consider placing a sound barrier directly on the Ville Marie expressway rather than north of the railway tracks as is currently being studied.

Since Canadian Pacific has refused to allow the city to use any of its land for a sound barrier and space is tight, "We may have to go back to putting it on the highway," Mayor Peter Trent replied. This was one of the original options discussed many years ago but since put aside.

"I would like to see all the options explored," Mossop said.

A feasibility study in the throes of completion has been looking at various options on the north side of the tracks, which

would also help muffle the sound of trains. Space restrictions have been limiting the outcome.

Councillor Theodora Samiotis who has been involved in discussions with the study consultants, told the *Independent* last week the city had mentioned the option of moving the sound barrier to the highway during their meeting March 19 along with representatives from the Quebec ministry of Transport (see March 24, p. 3).

"We need to find a solution," she said. Without one, plans to install a "living wall" to the west of the sound barrier starting at the Westmount Athletic Grounds are being held up since the two are to be connected.

The sound barrier is proposed to run east from Hallowell at the WAG to just east of Weredale Park.



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Tom Flies appointed assistant director for Urban Planning

After a long search for an assistant director of Urban Planning, city council appointed Tom Flies at its meeting April 7. He becomes second in charge of the department as it faces many zoning and planning challenges.

"I look forward to working with him," said director Joanne Poirier. "He'll be a great addition to the department."

Flies, who has been working in land-use planning with the National Capital Commission in Ottawa for the last year, will assume his new responsibilities Monday, May 11, said Councillor Theodora Samiotis in moving the motion of his appointment as commissioner of Urban Planning.

As a professional urban planner as opposed to being an architect, Flies is expected to bring insight and direction in this area at a time the city is facing challenges in the south-east particularly the whole Tupper parking lot-St. Catherine area, she said.

Flies graduated with a master's degree in Urban Planning from the University of

Montreal in 2009 after obtaining an undergraduate degree in geography (man and society) in 2006 from Université Paul Valéry Montpellier III, France, part of one of the oldest universities in Europe.

Since then he has worked on a number of different projects that involve various aspects of research and planning including the areas of transport and cycling.

In addition to English and French, he speaks and writes German, Dutch and Luxembourgish.

Three suspects arrested day after taxi robbery

The following news story is based on information from police reports provided by a Station 12 constable in an interview with the reporter.

Downtown Montreal police officers responding to an armed robbery call on March 9 arrested a trio of suspects matching the description of individuals who had held up a taxi driver at gunpoint in Westmount the previous day, according to a police report.

At approximately 1 am., a call was placed to Station 20 alleging two men and a woman had robbed a man at gunpoint near Crescent. The suspects were described as two white men just under sixfeet tall, one of whom had several facial tattoos and piercings, plus a white, 5'5"-tall woman.

Officers were called to the scene spotted the trio and gave chase as they fled, eventually catching all three in a laneway off of Mountain St.

The arrest came just 24 hours after two

male suspects and one female one matching the same description had used a gun to rob a taxi driver dropping them off in Westmount, said Station 12 constable Adalbert Pimentel.

On March 8, a taxi driver picked up the three individuals near St. Denis and, after an initial detour, took the trio to the corner of St. Catherine and Atwater. The woman and the tattooed man exited the vehicle, while the third suspect asked to be taken south to the corner of Dorchester and Atwater. While stopped near Weredale Park, the remaining man reportedly pulled out a gun and ordered the driver to turn off the engine, drop the keys and hand over his money and cell phone. The suspect then fled the vehicle with the cash and phone while the driver used the cab radio to inform his company to call police.

Though the suspects' pictures and descriptions match, Pimentel said police couldn't conclusively proclaim the trio at the centre of both incidents until an investigator had completed the examination process.

Electricity consumption drops 3.7% during Earth Hour

This year during Earth Hour, March 28, the consumption of electricity in Westmount decreased some 3.7 percent from 8:20 pm to 9:35 pm compared with the same time period last year of 2.6 percent, Hydro Westmount officials said last week.

The weather was colder this year so the overall consumption level was higher, however, said director Benoit Hurtubise. "That was no surprise," he added. Once an electric furnace kicks in, consumption increases.

While it was also reported last year to have been a cold night, the general figures

Last year, over the same time period, the decrease went from about 49 MVA to about 47.7 MVA (see story April 8, 2014, p. 7).

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Westmount lowers flags for Vimy Ridge Day

Westmount lowered its flags to halfmast at city hall and the cenotaph April 9 to mark the World War I battle of Vimy Ridge in northern France in 1917.

"Vimy Ridge Day" was so designated by federal government legislation in 2003 in recognition of the battle being the first time Canadians coast to coast fought together against a common enemy and in remembrance of close to 11,000 Canadians who died or were wounded that day.

Among them were 274 casualties from Westmount's Royal Montreal Regiment (RMR), said Lieut.-Col. Colin Robinson, a former commanding officer of the regiment and now its honorary lieutenant colonel. These included 100 fatalities.

This is believed to be one of the first times in recent years at least that the city has commemorated the event. "Vimy is one of the RMR's battle honours," explained Mayor Peter Trent, a former honorary colonel of the RMR. "And the RMR is Westmount's regiment."

The RMR was part of the first wave of at-

Dog brings \$76 ticket

tackers at Vimy Ridge and secured its objectives on time, according to author Ted Barris in his book Victory at Vimy: Canada Comes of Age. "The Royal Montrealers' advance moved like clockwork," it states.

Turning point

Robinson, who visited the Nine Elms war graves for Vimy in 2008 said he found the 88 RMR markers (some soldiers buried two to a grave) in a row, arranged by rank and alphabetical order. The alignment was "unique" among war cemeteries, he said.

A total of close to 3,600 Canadians were killed in the capture of Vimy Ridge, a battle considered to be a turning point for the country and a defining moment in the country's national identity. It was the first time during the war that all four Canadian divisions fought as a unified formation.

The RMR, whose armoury is located on St. Catherine St. adjacent to the Westmount recreation centre, marked the event with a regimental dinner and the lowering of its flags. A movie night was held by the RMR Foundation showing The Battle of Vimy Ridge.

The aim of the film event was to promote awareness of the battle, educate Canadians as to its significance and support the Vimy Foundation's project for building an education centre to be unveiled in France on April 9, 2017 on the grounds adjacent to the Canadian National Vimy Memorial. 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
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Easter bunnies came and went

fice to the city's Transportation Advisory Committee for review and recommendations, she said.

Giovanni D'Antono, who spearheaded the petition but did not attend the meeting, told the *Independent* it was residents' response to a city plan to open up 30 parking spaces on the east side of Olivier in nonwinter months to generate commercial activity on Greene (see story November, p. 8).

"We're not supposed to make parking available to everyone who wants to come to Greene Ave. for shopping," he said. "Olivier is a narrow residential street that's tight for parking. We've already had two summers of parking on both sides during construction on Greene.

"Why always Olivier? Why don't they go to Clarke, or Elm or Wood, or let people pay for parking on Sherbrooke or St. Catherine? As residents, I think we should come first."

Forbes said that parking on both sides of a street tends to act as a traffic calmer and in this case would help deter speeding.

D'Antono, who has lived on Olivier for 10 years, said the city's design and reconstruction of Greene with its wide midblock pedestrian crossings had reduced the number of parking spaces on both sides as well as at the corners.

And now he does not feel Olivier residents should have to bear the brunt of that decision.

He said he had intended to present the petition personally at the city council meeting February 2 but had mixed up the time of the meeting and arrived an hour early to find the door locked on a very cold evening. "I was freezing waiting."

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
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


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Underdog Noushka has come a long way

Several Westmount connections make life a little easier for the dog Noushka – and interesting for those in her circle.

The three-legged German shepherd got a new leash on life after she was featured in the *Independent's* Underdog Club column in December 2009. (See "Three-legged Noushka from Lebanon needs a foster home ASAP," December 1, 2009, p. 21.)

Fast forward to August 2010, and what

started as a five-week commitment to foster became lifelong when Noushka's home became that of Lezli Kirsch, a former Westmounter.

Noushka's leg was amputated in Lebanon after it was left broken and turned gangrenous. Beirut for the Ethical Treatment of Animals teamed up with the Underdog Club, which at the time had a dog portrait gallery coupled with adoption days in an empty storefront on Sherbrooke, and Noushka was brought to Canada.

"There was something about Noushka that just called out to me," said Kirsch, who explained Noushka originally looked lost and scared, but within a few weeks calmed down, continued on p. 20

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

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

Although it's been only a few years since he first started playing the piano, there are those who believe that Pinchas Antal will go far in life as a musician.

Antal, 14, started studying his instrument under piano teacher Vladimir Krassov four years ago. During this brief time, according to Krassov, Antal has managed to reach a university level in his musical ability.

Antal, who is a member of the Chabad Westmount centre, recently had the opportunity to take 10 days of master classes with classical concert pianist Valery Sigalevitch in France. He also recently won first place at the Cresendo international music competition held at Carnegie Hall in New York City.

Antal has given recitals in and around Montreal, including a short performance on March 22 at the Place Kensington sen-

ior citizens' residence on St. Catherine, where he was warmly received and enthusiastically applauded.

Antal comes from a musical family and took up studying the piano after his older brothers and sisters began learning the instrument but decided to pursue other musical studies. He often performs difficult pieces from memory without sheet music.

Krassov, who is a graduate of the Moscow Conservatory, says he recognized Antal as having prodigious talent soon after becoming his teacher. He persuaded his father, Mordechai, to spend more than \$14,000 on the purchase of a baby grand piano, which was a minimum requirement for this level of study.

Although he applied to and was accepted to one of Montreal's leading music conservatories, Antal says he plans to pursue a private regime of studies for the time being.

After learning about many different types of hardware and software variations on the market, Cutler said a "pay-by-plate" system was one that seemed best suited for Westmount to serve residents, merchants, Public Security and the city.

"It's an amazing system that is so easy to use, manage and enforce," he said. "What we're looking for is something that would take the pain out of parking - that is customer friendly. No one likes to get a ticket. It's a big deterrent for a commercial area."

Pay-by-plate parking consists of pay stations on the street into which parkers would punch their licence plate number. Payment and remote renewal of payment could be by coin, credit card or app. Enforcement involves a simple scanning of the plate.

Rather than paying "by space," as long as a plate is paid up, a car can move around to park in different spots in the city. The meters can be programmed to allow for various rates, times of day, locations and even types of permit, Cutler said. "There are so many options that can be built into it."

As well, he added, the experience of other municipalities has been that city revenues increased 20 to 60 percent after the

installation of automated parking systems, which paid for themselves within the first year of operation.

Bilingual, built for winter

"We were looking for a system that integrates hardware, software and the citation [ticket] writer," he explained. It also had to be bilingual and built for winter.

The systems he and McBain checked out were proven at minus 30°C. "That was the first question we asked. We were interested to find out some of the companies were Canadian and that their systems are in use farther north than we are."

Westmount's aging coin-operated meters are not only due for replacement but are also "definitely" outdated, he conceded.

"Parking is a big, big industry," McBain explained. The trade show "gave us an opportunity to see what's out there. We attended seminars and learned how in some places parking is a very serious problem." So many handicapped permits have been issued in some municipalities that some of their streets are lined with those cars. "It's out of control."

Both Cutler and McBain are members of the city's Transportation Advisory Committee, which is expected to study the various options and present recommendations.

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
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
